Archive Snapshots

Sister John Francis Moore of Tiffin entered the Ursuline Convent in 1926 and began teaching at St. Agnes in Toledo. She received her Bachelor's degree from Mary Manse and went on to The University of Notre Dame for a Master's degree in Physics. While still going to college and universities, Sister John Francis continued teaching at St. Angela Hall, Nazareth Hall,



Our Lady of Perpetual Help, St. Thomas Aquinas, St. Joseph, Tiffin, St. Rose, Perrysburg, and then returned to Our Lady of Perpetual Help as principal in 1950. She taught at Lima Central Catholic High School for one year then went to Mary Manse College to teach Physics from 1958 until the college closed in 1975. She then took a position at Madonna College in Livonia, Michigan and taught there until she retired in 1992 when she was over 87 years of age. Sister John Francis earned many honors and received many National Science Foundation grants to further her study in Physics and applied sciences. She died at the Ursuline Center in 2003 at age 94.



June 2023-June 2024: The Parish Year Eucharistic Revival

During the pandemic, I acquired a renewed appreciation of Jesus in the Holy Eucharist. I had such a longing to receive Jesus, especially when watching the Mass on TV. When I was finally able to receive Holy Communion again, I could not hold back the tears. I recall that experience whenever I feel that my reception of Holy Communion is becoming routine.

Since I retired from teaching, I have been taking Holy Communion to people, in their homes or in care facilities, who are no longer able to go to Mass. It brings me such joy to be able to do this. I consider it a special blessing when I realize that I gave someone Holy Communion for the last time before he/she went to meet Our Lord.

Only Heaven Knows Where We Are Going

or the first three weeks following the assembly, every time I woke up – and I mean every time it was to the refrain from the song, "Woyaya" that Dr. Glen Thomas Rideout, liturgy collaborator, used throughout our days together:

"We are going, heaven knows where we are going but we know within.

And we will get there, heaven knows how we will get there, but we know we will."

This melody brings a smile to my lips every time I hear it. The lyrics bring confidence to my heart and ease my entrance into the new day.

Sometimes awakening from a dream leaves us with just bits and pieces from which we try to make meaning. This is true in so many kinds of awakenings! When we start again – a new day, a new ministry, a new relationship, a new home - we begin from where we left off. And, as T.S. Eliot famously noted: "What we call the beginning is often the end. And to make an end is to make a beginning. The end is where we start from." As our perceptions of an evolving religious life continue to emerge, we affirm that beginnings and endings and beginnings-again are the work of our Creator God. It is no different for us as individuals or as congregations of women religious. "Heaven knows where we are going, but we know within."



We live and move in a container, the universe, that knows endings and yet is ever expanding, uncircumscribed. The universe is alive, pulsing. In the magnificent images from the Webb telescope used at the assembly, we experienced both the already and the not yet. Our loved ones in the communion of saints beckon to us from a future that we know has already begun to breathe new life into us.

In her powerful preaching "Almost Home" Ann Willits, a Dominican Sister of Sinsinawa, relates the story of an elderly sister who, after exiting her room and making her way down a confusing, unfamiliar hallway anxiously asked: "Oh dear! Am I coming or going?" To which Ann replied, "I don't

know, my dear, but one thing I do know for sure is that you are almost home."

We have so much wisdom to guide us! And there is so much courage to sustain us. Pierre Teilhard de Chardin counseled that, while "we are impatient of being on the way to something unknown, something new," we should give God the benefit of believing that God's hand is leading us.

What could it mean to be going, knowing we'll get there? To KNOW, within? It means God's hand is leading us.

"And we will get there, heaven knows how we will get there, but we know we will."



News from the UN

September 21: International Day of Peace

Established in 1981, this day is dedicated to non-violence across the globe. The UN General



United Nations Secretary-General António Guterres said, "Peace is needed today more than ever. War and conflict are unleashing devastation, poverty, and hunger, and driving tens of millions of people from their homes. Climate chaos is all around. And even peaceful countries are gripped by gaping inequalities and political polarization."


October 2: International Day of Non-Violence

The International Day of Non-Violence is observed October 2, the birthday of Mahatma Gandhi, leader of the Indian independence movement and pioneer of the philosophy and strategy of non-violence. The International Day is an occasion to "disseminate the message of non-violence, including through education and public awareness." The resolution reaffirms "the universal relevance of the principle of non-violence" and the desire "to secure a culture of peace, tolerance, understanding and non-violence."

October 10: World Mental Health Day

The United National and the World Health Organization (WHO) have designated October 10 as World Mental Health Day, recognizing "Mental health is a universal human right." This recognition underscores the vital role mental health plays in the overall health and well-being of each human person. Estimates from the WHO estimate that one in eight people globally are living with mental health risks and conditions impacting global health and human dignity.

This day is a time to advocate for equal access to mental health care, resources, and protection from mental



October 11: International Day of the Girl

The International Day of the Girl Child focuses attention on the need to address the challenges girls face and to promote girls' empowerment and the fulfilment of their human rights. While more resources have been made available globally for the investment in the rights of girls, the impact of natural disasters, COVID-19, and humanitarian conflict disproportionately affects the human development of girls around the world.

Girls continue to face unprecedented challenges to their education, physical and mental wellness, and the protections needed for a life without violence. This day honors the importance of education and well-being of girls and necessity for advocacy on behalf of girls throughout the world.
