"Fatherhood" By Albert T. Brownlee

When I consider the entirety of my life's journey and all the things I've been blessed to accomplish and experience, being a husband and a father are truly my greatest achievements. In fact, I consider it a gift. The joy that comes in helping to cultivate and shape the lives of my children and grandchildren is an abundant tidal wave of jubilation that causes my spirit to leap, my heart to sing, and my purpose to be fulfilled. Like most fathers of multiple children, my oldest child taught me the ropes. In retrospect, I didn't know what I was doing at all, but with God's grace, I leaned into the task before me, through trial and error I learned, and we grew together as father and son. He was my "practice child" which I say humorously, but also honestly. The son that made fatherhood much easier by the time my next two baby boys arrived and eventually, some seventeen years later, my little girl. With each new life placed into my hands, I became a better father than I was the child before, aging like a fine wine that increases in value and taste over time.

Often, in life and fatherhood, people wrongfully expect perfection. But I have found that it was not the absence of mistakes which refined me, but rather the lessons gained every time I faltered. As a father, I have apologized to my children in times when I've come to realize that I've been "too hard on them," this especially applies to the boys. I have also apologized when I've failed to model correct things before them. The concept of do as I say and not as I do does not work. So, we must learn to be open and transparent about the things we've gotten right and also, the things we've gotten wrong if we, truly, want our children to excel to their highest and greatest capacity. In this way, a child can learn from my previous mistakes versus reliving them. In 1 Corinthians 4:15, the Apostle Paul writes, "Ye have many masters, but not many fathers." In this passage, the word master can be best defined as a teacher. A teacher is one who trains, mentors, and instructs. But what separates a teacher from a father who, in essence, does or should do the same things? The difference lies here: a teacher or instructor can be seen as ANY-ONE who provides guidance to another person. But a father takes a personal, nurturing, and foundational role in the ongoing development of one's life that starts with their birth and ends with his death. Thus, no matter how old my children become, I will always be their father, meaning I will perpetually train, mentor, and instruct them with both my words and actions until I take my final breath on this earth. And that, well, that is priceless.

My father, Gene Edward Brownlee, Sr., left this world on June 30, 2017. I was blessed to know and love him for 42 years. Prior to his cancer diagnosis in 2015, you couldn't have paid me to

think that he would not be here with us today. Blessedly, in his leaving, I still have a God who fathers me. And not only that, I have other elders in my family and community which also father me. My point? The role of a good father should never be taken for granted or easily discarded. Regardless of our individual ages and vast life experiences, each of us still needs a father. A good father serves as priest, protector, and provider for his family and children. The job profile requires self-discipline, tenacity, patience, love, and forgiveness of self, as well as others. Creating a life is so much easier than fathering one. So, gentlemen, let's challenge ourselves to be the best version of ourselves for our wives, partners, families, and community. Showing up, showing out, and making a true difference in the lives of others.
