When Ellie, a young boxer mix, arrived from a partner shelter in June 2020, we expected this sweet girl to be quickly adopted. We were right – within a month, Ellie was in a new home. But sadly, circumstances forced her adopters to return her only two weeks later.

After her return, Ellie began acting anxious and fearful around would-be adopters. We worked hard to help her with her fear, but progress was slow. A generous donor sponsored her adoption fee, but still, months went by. Then, Andrew of "Good K-9 Academy" spotted Ellie on Facebook and offered to help. Good K-9 Academy specializes in helping dogs overcome fear, and Andrew agreed to foster and work with her.

Stephen R. and his family (clients of Andrew's) were looking for a companion for their young Staffordshire terrier, Madi, who had been trained by Good K-9 Academy. "Andrew ... thought Ellie would be perfect for [Madi]", Steven says. When they met her, they "fell in love in five minutes." Just before the holidays, Ellie went home!

"Ellie loves being chased by Madi" Stephen says, adding that Madi is teaching Ellie to "be a dog again." Ellie loves all animals and most people (she's a little afraid of tall men), and loves to give kisses. "I can't believe she wasn't adopted before [now]," Stephen says. "She's so wonderful, and really warms your heart."


Manny loves his mouse toys
