Covenant Church: The Covenant of Works

We are Covenant Presbyterian Church. But what does that mean? All over Scripture, God makes ‘covenants’ with his people. In fact, it is largely the covenants of Scripture that hold together the story of Scripture. But sometimes we don’t know what to make of this word ‘covenant.’ Frankly, we do not use it in everyday speech. In last month’s Compass Article, I shared that the coming *Compass* articles will be devoted to exploring the “Covenant Theology” found in Scripture and in our church’s confession of faith—a wonderful, old document called the *Westminster Confession of Faith*.

We saw last month that it is through God’s covenants that we know God and receive life from God. This month, we explore the first covenant that appears in Scripture. That covenant is in the Garden of Eden. It has been commonly called the Covenant of Works. The Westminster Shorter Catechism calls it a “Covenant of Life.”

Question 12 says this: “When God had created mankind, he entered into a *covenant of life* with him, *upon condition of perfect obedience*; forbidding him to eat of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, upon pain of death.”

The story of Adam and Eve is familiar to many. But maybe you’ve never considered it as a covenant. Scripture does not itself use the word ‘covenant’ in telling the story. And yet, throughout the story, the language that Genesis uses to tell of Adam and Eve is the same language that Scripture uses to describe the God’s later covenant with Scripture. Like Israel, Adam and Eve are in a special land. Like Israel, Adam and Eve are given God’s law—his commandment. Like Israel, Adam and Eve are told that obedience to God’s laws would bring life, disobedience would bring death.

There is a significant difference, however. The

covenants after Adam and Eve are founded upon God’s gracious plan of *salvation*. But for Adam and Eve, the way that they were to experience the life and blessing of knowing God was through *works*. If they would obey, they would eat from the tree of life. If they would disobey—as they did—they and their children would experience exile from the Garden and death. That is why it is called a *covenant of works*. Perfect obedience was the requirement. Life was the reward.

The fact that history begins with a Covenant of Works reveals what we as creatures owe to God—obedience in the way of God’s commands. But when Adam and Eve sinned, God placed an angel with a flaming sword at the entrance to the Garden of Eden. Among other things, God communicates that he has blocked that original way held out to Adam and Eve. Blessedness and life cannot come through *our* personal works and obedience to God’s commands, sinful as we are.

The Covenant of Works shows us what we owe to God and what we are unable to offer to God, namely, earn our own salvation. But it also leads us to worship Christ for what he has done. It can lead us to rejoice that *there is one who has obeyed perfectly on our behalf*. Jesus was tempted—not in a garden—but in the miserable conditions of the wilderness. Throughout his temptation Jesus responds by saying, “It is written.” In other words, he responds by holding fast to the Word of God. He remains faithful in knowing and keeping God’s commands. He did that not only in the wilderness of

temptation but all the way up to his greatest hour of testing as he willingly went to the cross to take away our sin. By his personal and perfect and perpetual obedience—even to the point of death—we enter into the life and blessedness of knowing God.

The Covenant of Works shows us what we owe to God. It shows us what we are unable to give to God. But it also leads us to rejoice in our great savior whose righteousness has brought us life and whose Spirit now places God’s law within our hearts.

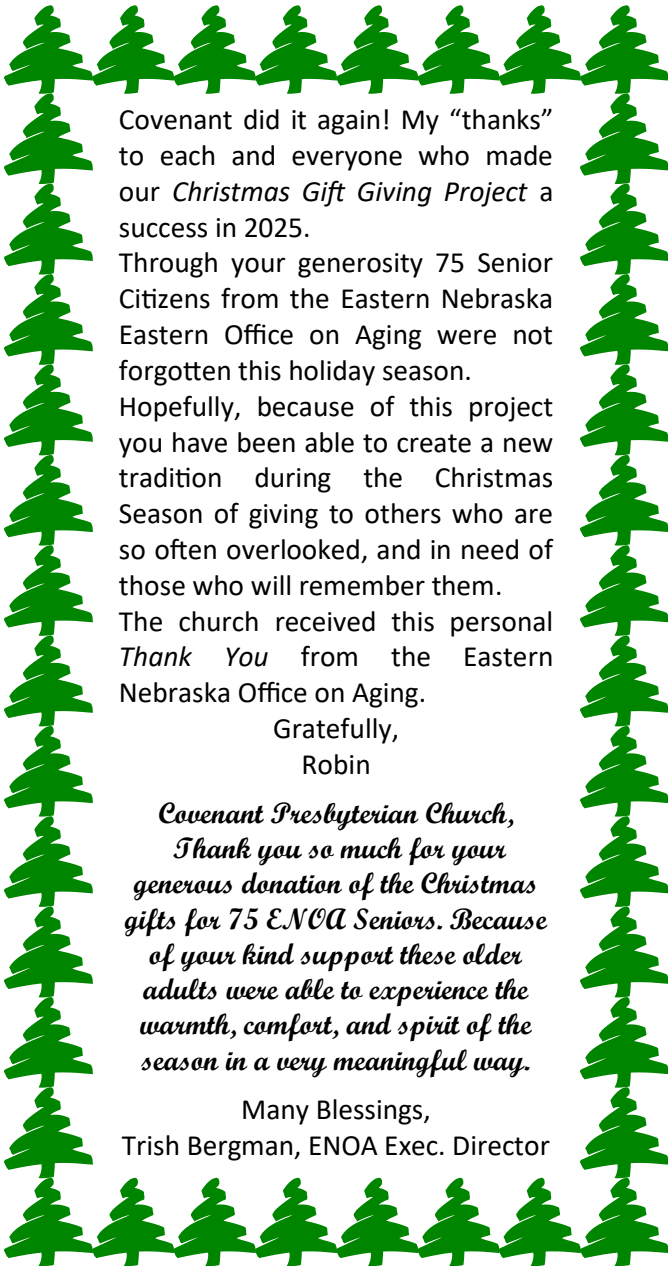

Extravagant Worship

WORSHIP (verb): 1. To honor or show reverence for as a divine being or supernatural power

2. To regard with great or extravagant respect, honor, or devotion.



What comes to mind when you think about worship? Do you think about coming to church on Sunday morning or finding a moment in your day to really focus on God? Does worship

bring other things to mind, like when someone talks about idol worship of things of this world? I am sure there are many directions that simple word can take us. Scripture tells us that our lives should be spent in worship of our God. Romans 12:1 says, *Therefore, I urge you, brothers and sisters, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God – this is your true and proper worship.* It is being purposeful with every moment of our lives to show God reverence and honor. I would like to take a moment to think about corporate worship or what we do on Sunday morning together as a church family.

Corporate worship is just an extension of the worship that should already be part of the Christian's life. It is a time to come together, being of one mind, and focusing our honor and respect (in an extravagant way) on the one and only true God. Our goal is to come into God's presence to hear from Him and commune with Him. It is not about me or even about how I think worship should happen. The goal is to create a space where God's Spirit can freely flow and speak to every individual at the service. We all have different tastes in music, different thoughts about how something should happen and even different views on how we interpret scripture. That is what makes corporate worship so difficult and at times it can even seem divisive.

How can we keep this from happening? First and foremost is making sure that the 24/7 worship is occurring in our own life. We come to corporate worship already focusing on giving God the glory and honor He deserves and demands. Second, it takes humility from all of us. We recognize that there are multiple ways to express honor and respect to God. Even when we do something, or sing something that is

not our choice, there is someone here that God is using that element of worship to draw closer to Him. When I look at corporate worship in that manner, I can join in and be part of that moment and know God is being honored. In the end, what truly matters is that we are coming together as the body of Christ to offer God our praise and worship.

I want to encourage you today. Keep striving to worship God every moment of every day. And continue to come to corporate worship ready to hear God, sing to God and commune with God. As we all grow closer to Jesus, the added benefit is that we also grow closer to one another and the body of Christ is strengthened. Let's make 2026 a year of extravagant worship to the one and only true God!

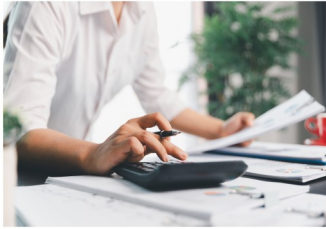

PSA - New Tax for Charitable Giving

Eliminate the Lists

For Christmas, my youngest daughter gave me a book titled *Four Thousand Weeks. Time Management for Mortals*. Four thousand weeks is roughly the average lifespan of an American. I wondered why she chose this book. I soon discovered why.

I found I am a productivity geek – someone who is passionate about crossing items off their to do list. I have maintained a long to do list on my ipad for decades. On January 1, the name of my list changed from “December tasks to January tasks.” It never ends.

The author stated people like me make these lists in an attempt to obtain a feeling of control over their life. It’s a method that always fails.

The author suggested that instead of attempting to master control over my life, I should surrender my craving for mastery and dive into the unknown instead. In doing so, I could “optimize” myself into the kind of person who could accomplish much without keeping lists and could be completely satisfied and happy with each and every day. Someone who could sleep well at night despite knowing I had much more to do. The obvious question then became – how do I dive into the unknown in the 3,400th week of my life?

The author wrote over 200 pages answering that question. His answers were genuine and plausible, but I simply could not accept any of them. That nagging voice in my head said, “there’s a better answer out there.”

I told Christ I respected the writings of this New York Times bestseller but I needed guidance from Him. My constant production of a list, crossing off the tasks, and adding more had become a form of idolatry.

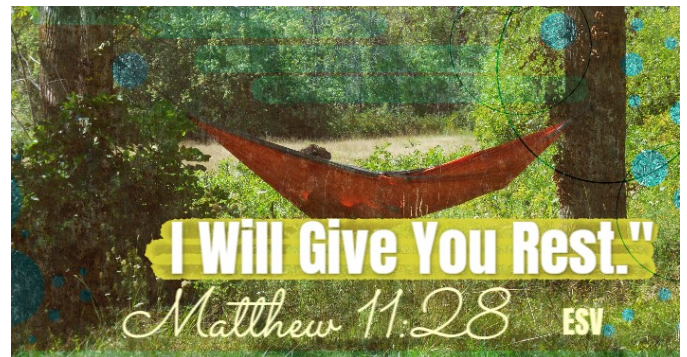
Matthew 11:28-30 – “Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my

yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light.”

Take my yoke upon you is an invitation to trade your heavy, self-made burdens for His partnership, submit to His guidance, learn from His humility, and to find true rest, peace, and freedom from stress and sin’s weight. My busyness is a distraction that draws me away from God. The enemy loves distraction and uses it to pull me away from the things God has for me and calls me to.

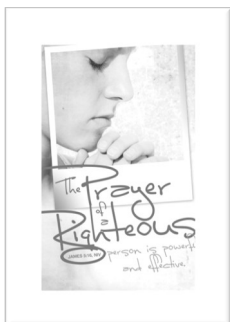
A long and careful review of my lists revealed I was prioritizing myself over spending time with God and loving His people. Thus, I made one New Year’s resolution. Awaken every day and ask Christ what I can do that day to honor and glorify Him. Some days I get to my ipad lists and other days I don’t.

The biggest difference I immediately noticed? As Matthew 11:29 says, “You will find rest for your soul.” It’s this rest I’ve found that’s priceless. I look forward to the next 600 weeks as I lessen my often- meaningless daily tasks and await God’s tasks.

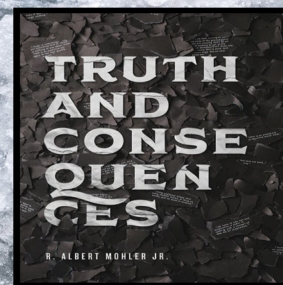
