Covenant Church: What's in a Name?

Know that the LORD, he is God! It is he who made us, and we are his; we are his people, and the sheep of his pasture.

—Psalm 100:3

As we turn the corner into 2026, I want to invite you into a new *Compass* series that I am calling: “Covenant Church: What’s in a Name?” Because we belong to “Covenant Church”, we often use the word “Covenant,” but how would you describe what “Covenant” means? What is the significance of our church’s name, anyway?

We miss out on a great deal when this word “Covenant” remains unfamiliar to us. *God’s covenants run all the way through Scripture.* In a lot of ways, it is God’s activity of making covenants that decides how the whole story of Scripture will run. So, in this series, I want to introduce you to what theologians sometimes call ‘Covenant Theology.’

Covenant Theology is just a way of trying to describe what Scripture itself teaches. As a result, even in the early Church Fathers and Mothers, you can find beliefs that resemble Covenant Theology, although described in different language. But it is in churches—like our own—that arose out of the Reformation Movement that Covenant Theology has been especially significant. In this series, I will point you to Scripture. I will also point you to the Westminster Confession, our church’s confession of faith. Its statements greatly clarify what we believe about God’s covenants. You might even want to read those words for yourself. You can find a copy at <https://epc.org/beliefs/> or if you are reading this on a digital device by following [this link](#).

Chapter 7 of our Confession concerns God’s Covenants and begins with these wonderful words: “The distance between God and his creation is so great, that, although reasoning creatures owe him obedience as their creator, they nonetheless could never realize any

blessedness or reward from him without his willingly condescending to them. And so it pleased God to provide for man by means of covenants.”

That is a powerful statement. It gives this simple truth: *God is so exalted that we could never know him or have life in him unless he first comes down to us.*

Who is like God? How could any creature know and understand the God of heaven and earth? Isaiah 40:15 says that “Even the nations are like a drop from a bucket and are accounted as the dust on the scales.” We have more in common with an ant or a worm than we do with the God of the universe. As creatures, we know that God exists. But we could not *know* God personally except that God has *desired* to be known by us. He has come down and chosen freely to set his love on his creatures—to make them “his people” and “the sheep of his pasture.” God enters into covenant relationship with his people to be known by them.



Likewise, we could never receive life or blessedness or reward from God apart from his covenant love. Creatures are not able to merit any reward from the

God of the universe. In Luke's gospel, Jesus tells us that at the end of the day, our confession before the Lord is this: "We are simply unworthy servants; we have only done what was our duty" (Luke 17:10).

Everything we have is *from God*. How could we ever do anything to merit or earn his favor? If we try, at every step we place ourselves in debt to his gifts. James 1:17 reminds us, "Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change." And in Romans 11:36, Paul draws us to worship God by declaring, "From him and through him and to him are all things. To him be glory forever.

Amen." We could never *merit* any life or blessedness or reward from *God*. But God desires to crown his creatures with life and blessedness and even 'reward.' And so he graciously comes down in covenant love.

What's in a name? The name 'Covenant Church' reminds us that everything we have is from God and by his grace. Our knowledge of God is by his grace. Any life and blessedness and reward that we experience is from God and by his grace. Our life together as God's people—that too is from God according to his grace.

Let me know if you would be interested in doing




this. Don't forget to bring your shopping bags! There is a clear tote in the corner of the Fellowship area where you can leave your bags.

Proverbs 16:9 tells us, “...in their hearts humans plan their course, but the Lord establishes their steps.” May God continue to guide and bless you in 2026.





From the Heart of a Stephen Minister Christine Lind, Member



My sister Carol is a professional thrift store shopper. It has nothing to do with money and everything to do with the thrill of the hunt. What she hunts for is usually never for herself and most definitely for the sake of others. And what makes her so special (if you happen to be one of the recipients in her little black book of clients) is that her taste is exquisite. You never

have to worry about, "what am I going to do with this?" She's your self-appointed personal shopper scouting for gems, customized to your needs, wants and wishes.

She's constantly on the lookout for books to fill my burgeoning library. I have a book lust and have treasures on my bookshelves handpicked by her from *Gone With The Wind* to the *Prayers of Abraham Lincoln*. Every book she handpicks for me is beautiful to look at: lightly worn vintage or impeccable hardbacks with classic illustrations. Even though I love and cherish every book she has given me over the years, there is one that stands out as my favorite. It's a small, manly, used paperback copy of a barely known but profoundly well-written book by Rev. Cacey Lute entitled: "But God..."

She gave me the book over two years ago. I can't tell you how many times in deep distress I've applied those two words to calm myself and put life here on earth in perspective. On the first page of the first paragraph of the introduction the author quotes the late James Montgomery Boice: "May I put it quite simply? If you understand those two words – *but God* – they will save your soul. If you recall them daily and live by them, they will transform your life completely."

This little book provides great depth about these two words as they are attached to every doctrine in the Bible, from Christ's foundation throughout the Old Testament to his resurrection in the New Testament. What I love in these two words is the consistent promise from scripture when we apply them personally to our own lives. My favorite verse among many is: "My flesh and my heart may fail, *but God* is the strength of my heart and my portion forever" (Psalm 73:26).

My sister probably thought the book looked interesting and because of her own love for God's word thought it should be on my bookshelf. It's never on a shelf at my house, but usually sitting out displayed with its contemporary cover on my end table next to my Bible. When I sit down to pray with my flesh and my heart failing, I then remember those powerful two little words and my heart is strengthened. "But God..."; what a promise, what a comfort.

It's a week before Christmas as I write this. I'm sitting at a friend's home in Hawaii, having just finished a 48 hour shift in the emergency room. As usual, it was a great shift as I slept all night, both nights. I now will relax, head to the beach this afternoon and fly home tonight.

I asked the locals how Christmas is different in Hawaii as compared to the mainland. I received many answers.

They don't say Merry Christmas. They say "Mele Kalikimaka". The traditional Christmas meal consists of smoked Kalua pig, poi, and coconut pudding. And Santa Claus doesn't arrive in a sleigh. He loads his presents onto a canoe or kayak and paddles across the Pacific to deliver the gifts. When they go caroling, someone always plays a ukulele to make the occasion more vibrant.

The hospital I work at in a town called Honoka'a sits high atop a hill. I walked around the property late last night and could see the countless Christmas decorations throughout the town. The most amazing? The tall coconut trees with beautiful Christmas lights tightly strung around the trunk and extending dozens of feet to the top.


The different Christmas traditions between Hawaii and Nebraska at this time of year are stark.

The locals however, have something in common with us. They all said they are celebrating the birth of our Lord and Savior. "The reason for the season is Jesus Christ," so many said. They attend Christmas Eve services and light candles to symbolize Jesus as the Light of the World. They pass the flame from person to person, representing the sharing of their faith with others. It was so inspiring talking with the locals.

As I sat outside last night and looked at a cloud-less sky, I saw so many bright, shining, beautiful stars over the ocean. I couldn't help but think of the infamous Star of Bethlehem that guided the wise men towards the birth site of Jesus. And all I could do was bow my head and thank Christ for His birth, His mercy, His resurrection, and our eternal life with Him. And I thanked Him for showing me the different, and similar Christmas traditions.

Wednesday Bible Study


