Enjoying Scripture: God's Word in History

And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen his glory, glory as of the only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth.

John 1:14

In recent *Compass* articles, I have been exploring how we can best read and enjoy the Bible. Last month, I highlighted that God has spoken "at many times and in many different ways." Because of that, to understand the Bible, it is helpful to understand the historical context and the literary context of each passage of Scripture. This month, we can consider how historical context plays a role in interpretation.

It's a remarkable truth that the eternal Son of God, the eternal Word, became flesh. He took on our human nature at a particular time and in a particular place in order to reveal God to us. In a way, the incarnation of the Son of God is an escalation of what God has done from the beginning. To his creatures, existing in time and space, God speaks and reveals himself in time and space. Because God speaks within our history, we understand his speech by paying attention to that history.

All human speech is understood best *in context*. If you enter a foreign culture—an unfamiliar context—there is likely to be misunderstanding.

For us, entering the world of the Bible is like entering a foreign culture. Whether we consider the geography of the Bible, or the cultural practices of its times, or the politics that shaped its world, there are endless ways that our understanding of the Bible can be strengthened by understanding the world in which it was written.

When entering a foreign culture, it can also be helpful to have a guide. You may find it useful at times to refer to a trusted Study Bible, a Bible Dictionary, or Encyclopedia—able to inform you how much a denarius is worth, or able to instruct you about the unique cultures associated with ancient places like Corinth or Philippi.

Ultimately, when entering a foreign culture, the best way to become fluent is through immersion. Some Bible reading habits keep us from ever experiencing immersion because we only ever focus on small portions of Scripture, taken out of context. But immersion in the Bible's own history is what we need to become familiar with the world of the Bible.

Through immersion, we become familiar with the agrarian world of the patriarchs; much later, we encounter the political world of Israel's kings, accompanied by urbanization and the development of various technologies. Eventually, we encounter the sorrow of exile for both Israel and Judah, but also, Judah's eventual return. As a result, with the turn of our Scriptures from the Old to the New Testament, we encounter God's people back in God's land awaiting God's redemption. By immersion in this history, we gain fluency reading the Bible within these contexts.

Learning a culture takes patience and humility. It requires willingness to enter spaces knowing we will make mistakes, knowing we will only half-understand at best at first—but in time, understanding comes.

The most significant reason that we should want to understand the historical context of Scripture is that it helps us to ask the question—what was God saying to his people then? What was his purpose when he spoke at that time and in that place? And it is by understanding the answer to those questions, that we also are able to ask, what then is God saying to me now?

I started working in a small-town emergency room three years ago. I immediately took a liking to Jeff, a paramedic who worked full time with me. We bonded for many reasons. Most days I worked with three nurses, two technicians, and one registrar. All were females. Don't get me wrong. I love females! I married one, but sometimes a man needs another man to chat with, to relate to, to understand! We bonded because of more than being men. I used to be a paramedic. We could rehash our ambulance days. He used to work at a prison. I was interested in his prison stories. But most importantly, Jeff was a Christian. He recently completed his master's degree in theology, frequently preaches from the pulpit on Sunday mornings, and we could talk of our love for Christ.

Jeff frequently talked about his youngest daughter's pregnancy. She was soon to have a child, and Jeff was so excited about this future grandchild. We often heard about the morning sickness, the preparation of the nursery, the frequent obstetrician visits, and other pregnancy issues as the time drew closer.

She went into labor. The baby was born. And died the same day. I was in Arizona when my nurses texted me the sad news. I didn't know what to say to my Christian brother.

I came home. Deb and I went to a *Mercy Me* concert in Lincoln. *Mercy Me* is one of our favorite Christian bands. We volunteered that night for the band, helping with the Children's International program. We told concert goers of an opportunity to sponsor a child from

one of 12 countries, providing health care, education, food, housing, and job training.

Halfway through the concert I received a text from Jeff. "Are you here at the concert?" he asked. I didn't respond. I didn't know what to say. I wanted to give my condolences in person and not via texting. I found it encouraging he was at the concert and listening to the band pour out their love and dedication to Christ.

I went to work the next day and Jeff was there. It was a crazy busy day, and we had little time to chat. Finally at the end of the day I told him how sorry I was for his loss and couldn't begin to understand what he was going through. Jeff smiled. "My daughter and I are OK," he started. "This world is so messed up with crime, political strife, indifference, disinformation, misinformmation, and countless other issues. My granddaughter wasn't going to be strong enough to deal with all that and Christ knew this. In His infinite love, He immediately took her home where she would always know peace. Most importantly, she's spending her entire life in the arms of Jesus. That fact was reinforced to me last night at the concert. I can't begin to imagine a more amazing, more beautiful life.

How was I to respond to that? Here was a man who knows more about Jesus and the Bible in one of his pinky fingers than I would ever know. He had just buried his granddaughter, and he was OK because he knew she was with Jesus. I responded in the only way I knew how. "Amen my brother, amen."



The gallery (Room 115) will open on Saturday, July 26 when we kick-off the celebration with a choral concert at 7:00 p.m. The concert will feature the choir from the Covenant Choral Festival that will take place on that same day. The gallery will remain open throughout the next week and following Sunday, August 3. The deadline for submitting artwork in July 10.

Art Gallery Guidelines

- 1. You may submit more than two works.
- Maximum 2-3 pieces of artwork per artist will be selected from those submitted.
- 3. Complete submission form for each piece of art.
- 4. Provide a digital photo of the artwork submitted.
- 5. SUBMISSION DEADLINE is JULY 10.
- 6. Gallery will be set-up on Thursday, July 24.
- 7. Artwork will be displayed July 26 until August 3.
 - a. Gallery will be in Room 115 and will be locked and secured when the gallery is not official open.
 - Selected artwork can be dropped off at the church July 21 through 23 during church office hours or by arrangement

- 8. All artworks should be created by members of Covenant or have a tie to the church.
- 9. 2025 Theme is *Seasons: A Time for Everything* (Ecclesiastes 3:1-8).



Monthly Update



A social work student recently contacted me. Her assignment was to interview a social worker and write a paper. This can be a valuable learning experience and can provide insight into the field and career path. I was humbled by her request and took the opportunity to answer her questions honestly and thoughtfully. I wanted to share with her more of why social work is a Christian calling for me. Unless you personally know a social worker, you have only a fuzzy idea of social work as a profession. Most assume social work is primarily employment in public service programs such as child welfare or temporary financial assistance.

- 1. What led you to pursue a career in social work? I was working in the business field. Then my (late) husband was diagnosed with cancer. Watching my husband being consumed and slowly dying over the year and a half from the cancer, and all the social workers that helped him changed me. I wanted to help people.
- 2. Where have you worked since obtaining your degree? Director of Congregational Care at Covenant Presbyterian Church.
- 3. How long have you worked in your current field of practice? 17 years
- 4. **Describe what you do in your current position?** Counseling, including dysfunctional families, families with LGBTQ+, anxiety, depression, marriage, self-esteem, and more. Social work includes: Everything from assisting the older church members transition from their home to senior living, to hospice. Helping with Medicare, end of life, estate planning, assist families with hoarders, and connecting various needs to resources. I also do groups.
- 5. What do you find most rewarding about your job? That every day is different and challenging. I am blessed that people let me into their lives and trust me to share what is going on and let me help them to improve their quality of life.
- 6. What do you find most challenging about your current job? Because I am part time, the most challenging thing is to balance and prioritize needs with time.
- 7. What has been most stressful in this job? That social work is a thankless job most people do not understand because it is confidential. Often spending long hours

working, demanding caseloads, and the sometimes emotional toll of helping people with significant challenges. I know I make a difference, but the feeling of being undervalued by others is discouraging.

- 8. Do you have criticism of the profession and how can the profession improve? None
- 9. What do you see as the most pressing social problems confronting your clients? I assist church members and people in the community. Most pressing is housing, poverty, living barely paycheck to paycheck, employment, abuse, addictions.
- 10. What ethical challenges have you had to face in your job? Confidentiality vs. duty to report, mandatory reporting, conflict between morals, self-determination, and religion.
- 11. What advice would you have for a new social worker considering going into this field of practice? Stay true to yourself and what you have learned in your social work classes. Others may never understand how vast the role of a social worker is, or how many issues and needs you can help with. They may never see what you did or how you helped change someone's life, but the person you helped knows and will remember how you listened and how you made them feel.
- 12. What about the NASW (National Association of Social Workers) Code of Ethics excites you, makes you proud of being a social worker? It accurately describes social workers' ethics and values and is a guideline for every day. It also reassures the client of my ethics and principles. This is who I am, this is how I will represent you and make you the priority and reassures the client.
