The Covenant of Grace

I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and her offspring; he shall bruise your head, and you shall bruise his heel.

—Gen 3:15

In our exploration of Covenant Theology, last month, we saw that the Bible opens with a Covenant of Works. Adam and Eve were given a command and told that failure to keep that command would bring death. Only by faithfully passing through the test would they receive the reward of the Tree of Life. Their enjoyment of God’s blessing was conditional upon their *works*.

When Adam and Eve disobeyed, a remarkable thing happened. God came, of course, in judgment, and he proclaimed curse upon them and the creation. Sin and death had entered the world. *But*, even as God pronounced judgment, he also gave a word of grace. That is because God announced judgment not only on Adam and Eve and on the created world but *also* on the serpent through whom sin and death had come! In Genesis 3:15, we read that, one day, an offspring of the woman will crush the head of the serpent.

The Westminster Shorter Catechism thus asks a wonderful question. In question 20 it asks, “Did God leave all mankind to perish in the estate of sin and misery?” We take for granted that the answer is ‘no.’ But it’s only due to God’s amazing grace! “God having, out of his *mere good pleasure*, from all eternity, elected some to everlasting life, *did enter into a covenant of grace*, to deliver them out of the estate of sin and misery, and to bring them into the estate of salvation, by a Redeemer.”

God responds to the sin and misery of humanity with the wonders of his grace. Because of that the story of Scripture from Genesis 3 onward is one of God’s unfolding “Covenant of Grace.”

This is important to see. Many Christians operate with

an unhelpful division between their Old and New Testament. The Old Covenant they imagine is all about works. The New Covenant is about grace instead. This is why Covenant Theology often gets contrasted with what is called “Dispensationalism.” *Dispensationalism separates the Bible into different periods in which God relates to people in contrary ways.* According to Dispensationalism, God requires works for Israel, but he gives grace to the church; God makes physical promises to Israel, but he gives spiritual promises to the church.

But the Bible presents itself as one grand story. Israel is God’s people by God’s rescuing grace (not because of their performance!). And Israel’s law is not a way to earn salvation. It is a grateful response to God’s deliverance (read Exodus 20 but don’t skip verses 1-2). And when Jesus comes he comes *fulfilling* all the promises that had been given to Israel.

Yes, there are differences between the Old and New Covenant. The Westminster Confession puts it this way: “This covenant [of grace] was *differently administered* in the time of the law [i.e. the Old Covenant], and in the time of the gospel [New Covenant]” (WCF 7.5). The great theologian of the early church, Augustine, put it this way: “What is in the Old *concealed*, is in the new *revealed*.” Under the Old Covenant, God’s promises were given in types and shadows—prophecies, circumcision, sacrifices, etc. In the New Covenant, Christ has come. The reality has come.

Yet, all throughout, God’s purpose is to draw people to the saving grace that would come in Jesus. “There are not, therefore, two covenants of grace differing in substance, *but one and the same* under various dispensations” (WCF 7.6). The language of ‘dispensations’ can admittedly be confusing here.

Modern 'Dispensationalism' uses the same word but compromises what the Confession teaches here that all of Scripture from Genesis 3 on is one unfolding Covenant of Grace.

In the coming months, we will give our attention to the *unfolding* Covenant of Grace. We will study its progress with Abraham, Moses, David, and so on. We will see God's unfolding faithfulness and steadfast love—all

drawing us toward our Savior, all teaching us what it means to have life in him.

“And now abide faith, hope, love, these three; but the greatest of these is love” (1 Cor. 13:13 NKJ).



This popular verse taken out of context from the Love Chapter pops up everywhere from wedding invitations to Facebook

affirmations adorned with mythical unicorns. The Beatles reduced it to a human level in their song: “All You Need Is Love,” while Tina Turner lost all hope in ever finding it.

The Apostle Paul is talking about a different love—it’s God’s agape love through us as we minister to others with our gift. Not only for the gifts bestowed on us by the Holy Spirit, but the responsibility to exercise them through the blood of Jesus Christ. How then do we show this love through our gifts?

Though I speak with the tongues of men and of angels, but have not love, I have become sounding brass or a clanging cymbal (1 Cor. 13:1 NKJ).

We moved a lot. My husband built custom homes—we would live in the model till it sold and off we’d go to the next one. In selling the current house and building another—invariably we would stay with my parents or find other accommodations. As a young mother with three children, it could get incredibly hectic—frankly, I’m not sure how I did it!

I’ll never forget one move. This particular “tour of duty” we settled into a furnished apartment in the neighborhood where the new home was under construction. We’d only been there two days when I discovered roaches darting across the kitchen floor. I alerted the office manager, and they promised to send an exterminator out that afternoon. I cleared out the cabinets of dishes, pots and pans, etc., and placed them on the furniture in the living room.

Not wanting my children exposed to the bug spray, we left for the day. We returned later to our bug-free apartment, tired from a day at the swimming pool and marketing. I’d stacked my groceries on the kitchen table and floor and had just removed my eighteen-month-old’s wet red polka-dot bathing suit and hung it on the back of a chair, when I heard a knock at the

door.

Through the peephole I saw a man and two women. Assuming they were apartment managers I opened the door. “Yes?” I said, the latch still chained to the door. “We’re from Community Church welcoming new people to the area,” the man said.

I invited them in! We had been members of the church years before, and even though my apartment was a disaster and the children had now run amuck, I longed for some adult company. Anna still in a soggy wet diaper, romped along on the floor scooting on a watermelon. My four-year-old son and eight-year-old daughter decided it would be fun to hide in a cramped linen closet in the living room from the people knocking on the door, the youngest one teetering atop the older one.

I told my guests we had just moved in and sorry for the chaos and couldn’t even offer them iced tea or coffee. They found a place to sit down and stared at baby Anna with her diaper barely attached to her chubby thighs sitting on our melon staple for the Fourth of July. They began their spiel with no preliminary chit-chat. To my great surprise they witnessed to me, warning me I was a sinner and that I needed Christ. Blind-sided, I muttered I was a Christian. But they didn’t believe me. They continued to look around the room—as if having a bad day coincided with salvation. Defensive, I started name dropping. I told them we were acquainted with their pastor, and that we knew many of the people who attended their church. Then one of the women, sober looking with large octagon glasses, asked me: “If you died today, do you know with full assurance you would go to heaven?”

Just then I heard giggling and rumbling from the closet. My two older children fell through the bi-fold closet doors and crashed onto the floor rolling in laughter. I told them they had to go. Not my children, the man and his two sidekicks.

They handed me tracks that looked like comic books with frightening pictures of people on fire. They looked around one more time at my surroundings with depressed looks on their faces. Poor woman. Unruly children, roaches, and going to hell!

At first, I was just relieved to see them go. But then like Paul, who exercised his rights as a Roman citizen, I

called the church and asked to speak to the pastor. He wasn't in, so I reported my appalling visit from their Outreach Committee to the church secretary. "They had better go back to the drawing board and reinvent their approach," I cried.

example, then let me at least be a horrible warning." Paul warned us all. And what a great analogy: clanging cymbals and resounding brass. In one translation it reads noisy gongs.

What a missed opportunity—I sure could have used some love that day.

I Don't Understand, But I Do Know...

One of my favorite nurses I work with is a twenty-something year old who recently celebrated the birth of her second child. Towards the end of her pregnancy, she developed abdominal pain and an ultrasound showed gallstones. She was told it would be best to delay removal of the gallbladder until after her child was born.

Three months after delivery, she went to the operating room for the elective procedure. The surgeon, being very thorough, examined the entire abdomen after removing the gallbladder and thought the appendix looked abnormal. He removed this also, and the pathology showed this young lady had cancer of the appendix.

She had an upcoming oncology appointment that couldn't come soon enough because of sleepless nights, from both anxiety and the newborn. "I don't understand why this is happening to me" she said after returning to work following surgery. Often these nurses seek my advice when a crisis hits, as most call me "Dad" instead of doctor. (A title I highly prefer, by the way.)

How does one counsel a young mom with two young children, a promising career, and a faithful and supportive husband who was just given a potential death sentence? Luckily, she's a Christian.

We read Psalm 40:1-2 – *I waited patiently for the Lord; He turned to me and heard my cry. He lifted me out of the slimy pit, out of the mud and mire; He set my feet on a rock and gave me a firm place to stand.* In these verses, David emphasizes patience while waiting for God to act.

I said, "Likewise, I don't understand, but I do know that you must trust God is in control when you don't

understand. God's perspective is higher than human understanding. We have to rely upon God's character, goodness, and faithfulness, rather than trying to make sense of every situation. This perspective, although difficult to implement, offers peace, comfort, and often a more positive outcome even in difficult, confusing times."


After a few more weeks, she finally saw the cancer doctor.

The oncologist ordered a PET scan. A few days later, she called me and was crying hysterically as I answered. I patiently waited for her to calm down. "The PET scan was normal. The cancer was limited to my appendix and I am cancer free. No further therapy is needed."

I remained silent as I waited for her to regain her composure. "I don't understand why you went through the tribulation you did," I started, "but I do know that our God is so very good, and in that we can rejoice."

How about those of you who are similarly struggling with some type of crisis, big or small? Most likely that's everyone reading these words. Are you patiently waiting for Christ to act? Are you resting in comfort, knowing that the One who knows all, hears all, and conquers all certainly knows the answer to your problems and His perfect will can be trusted?

Likewise, I struggle every day with issues too numerous to count. I remember James 1:2-3 - *Consider it pure joy, my brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of many kinds, because you know that the testing of your faith produces perseverance.* I don't understand why we have endless tribulations, but I do know God is in control. That's the comfort that should allow us to endure every day.

Deacons Projects



With the family-oriented holidays of Thanksgiving and Christmas, as well as the focus on love in the month of February just passed, perhaps this is a good time to make the congregation aware of some of the acts of love that we do as a team.

Member support: Several subcommittees within the Deacons take care of our members who are unable to attend regular worship at Covenant:

Our homebound members are phoned or visited regularly by a Deacon, who serves communion when desired. Our college and military members receive gift cards two times a year. People who appeal for prayers on the Prayer Chain receive greeting cards to let them know that we are thinking of and praying for them. Courtesy meals are provided to members returning home from a hospital stay or experiencing bereavement. Once per month a team provides a worship service in three local nursing homes: Parson's House, Remington Heights, and Sunridge Village.

Worship Assistance: Deacons and Session members rotate through an annual schedule of assisting with Communion on the first Sunday of each month at Covenant.

Fellowship: The Deacons plan and serve the Easter brunch and the Christmas luncheon.

Mission participation: The subcommittee of *Chat, Knit, and Sew* uses their skills to support a variety of projects, such as the making of plastic cushions out of grocery bags for the people who frequent the Open Door Mission.

Deacon's Assistance Fund: By maintaining a balance of the donations which we receive quarterly, we can give financial aid to members who find themselves in a financial crisis, (providing they meet the fund guidelines).

We enjoy helping in the previously mentioned manners. If you find yourself realizing your blessings and wanting to donate to those less fortunate, look for special donation envelopes in the pew racks. Thank you in advance.

Women's Circle






