God's Covenant with Abraham

“And I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you and make your name great, so that you will be a blessing. I will bless those who bless you, and him who dishonors you I will curse, and in you all the families of the earth shall be blessed.”

—Genesis 12:2–3

We have been exploring salvation history to understand the process by which God introduced his gracious covenant into a world of sin and death. So far, we have seen the failed covenant that existed in the beginning with Adam. We have seen God's initial promise of salvation in Genesis 3:15 and we have witnessed a picture of that promised salvation in God's covenant with Noah to bring him through the flood.

When we come to Abraham, a crucial new period begins in God's work of redemption. Sometimes in reading the story of Abraham we see his significance primarily as the physical ancestor of the people of Israel. But his significance is in fact much greater. God's deeds and promises for Abraham are significant not just for a people naturally descended from him but for humanity as a whole.

One way to see that is to read Genesis 12 where God first calls Abraham (then called, Abram) to himself. God, in that moment, makes promises to Abraham. God would later bind himself with a covenant to fulfill those promises. But what are the promises?

Where sin has brought various “curses” into the world, God will now bring “blessing.”

Sin brings pain and misery into humanity's task of being fruitful and to multiplying. But God will now restore Abraham and his family to that task, blessing them, and making them a great nation.

Sin brings pain and misery into humanity's task of working and caring for God's creating as God's image-

bearer. Humanity in sin now lives for its own glory—seeking to make a name for itself (see Gen 11:1–9). But God will now restore Abraham to humanity's original glorious commission. Abraham will be given a “great name”—a glorious identity which he has in no way earned or worked for.

Sin brings division within the one human family—setting brother against brother, creating enmity and division (see Gen 4). But through Abraham, those divisions will one day be healed—the families of the earth will be blessed.

When we read Abraham's story in the light of God's big purpose for creation, we realize that God's promises to Abraham were not just about a people physically descended from him. Abraham is God's way of putting the whole creation back on track.

That's why when we come to the New Testament, the Apostle Paul can speak with audacious language of the covenant made with Abraham, describing it as a promise that, “Abraham and his offspring... would be *heir of the world*” (Romans 4:13). Note—not just a specific plot of land in the Middle East—but “the world”! The promised land was but a foreshadowing of *a new world*—a new creation—which God promised to Abraham, which God has begun in Christ, and which he will one day bring to completion.

This large significance of the promises to Abraham is also why Paul can speak to the church—made up of Jews and Gentiles together—and say to them, “Abraham is the father of us all” (Romans 4:16). We belong in Abraham's family if we share the faith of Abraham—resting as he did in the God who keeps covenant forever.

This month we are highlighting two new areas of volunteering! Ushers and office help.



The ushers at Covenant fill a necessary function in making our worship services run smoothly. Obviously, it is essential to be a friendly host and helpful in your role as usher. An usher turns out the lights in the Fellowship area to signal it's time for worship; they make certain that the monitors are left on. The doors to the sanctuary are left closed during fellowship time but open to signal it's time to enter for worship, and closed once again as worship begins. The front interior front doors are locked during worship but at least one usher stays in the Fellowship area to welcome latecomers. In addition, someone needs to check to make sure the lower level doors are locked as well.

The ushers pass the plates for offering, usually after the pastoral prayer and during the song. The offering boxes are still used by the main doors. The ushers collect and count after each worship service.

We have a diabetic supply kit in the Fellowship Area for anyone having a diabetic episode, an usher can easily retrieve it for the individual. (There is also a diabetic kit in the downstairs kitchen.)

This is an overview of most of the responsibilities for the four-member team for Sunday services.

We have a rotating team of volunteers who help with greeting visitors and answering the phone weekly during staff meetings. Occasionally, all the volunteer team members are busy when needed to help in the office. We are looking for a few people to join that team so that the office is always covered. 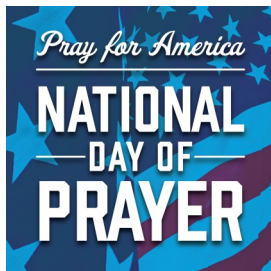

Willful Ignorance

My wife and I went to Arizona in mid March to enjoy the weather and to ride our bicycles, an avid passion of ours. Before every ride I ask the Lord to protect us during our adventure. As we age, our reflexes slow, response times lag, and we're more prone to injury. Actually, I worry more about the cars that pass us as often the drivers are distracted for various reasons. I also worry about road hazards I won't see until it's too late.

While riding one day on a path, I noticed a bicyclist ahead had stopped. As we approached, she motioned for us to stop. In doing so, we immediately noted her anxiety. She pointed ahead to a large rattle snake stretched across the trail. We'd often heard of rattlers in this portion of the country but until this day, had never seen one.

I watched the snake until it got to the edge of the trail and decided to continue my ride. As I approached, the snake lifted its head off the trail, went into an S shaped, coiled position, which I later learned is what they do when threatened and prepared to strike. Luckily, I made it safely past the rattler. Eventually my wife and our new friend caught up with me. They'd waited to proceed until the snake was well off the path.

That evening, as I prepared for bed, I thought back to the ride and wondered what I was thinking in moving ahead instead of waiting for the snake to be completely off the trail. "Good Lord, Chuck," my conscience said, "You have made a living caring for people who make poor decisions. Drinking alcohol and getting behind the wheel, only to be in a serious

accident. Having a one-night stand and contracting a sexually transmitted disease. Attempting ridiculous physical stunts and breaking bones. Have you learned nothing in 36 years of practicing emergency medicine?"

Words that came to mind in describing my behavior that day included pride, arrogance, ignorance, stubbornness, and impatience. I think ignorance fits me the best.

As I thanked God that night for getting me safely home, I couldn't help thinking of the willful ignorance in my Christian life. This is when I actively refuse to use the knowledge I have about Christ to avoid responsibility. Theologians call this a "hardened heart." Examples include lustful thoughts when seeing an attractive person of the opposite sex, throwing rude and vulgar statements at drivers who, in my opinion, need to not be on the road, or bragging to friends about a life accomplishment, and stretching the truth in doing so. I could provide many more examples.

I can't help but wonder if I avoid the truth God is showing me because they challenge my comfort. I know that choosing ignorance is choosing darkness. Choosing truth is choosing life. *My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge; because thou has rejected knowledge.* Hosea 4:6

I awakened the next morning and lifted up some very sincere prayers. I asked for my hardened heart to be softened, realizing it would take time to do so, and asked Christ for patience and guidance until this occurred. I also asked for another day of safe riding, and to be smart when any and all dangers were presented.

Mother's Day and Other Sad Events

We had all returned home from church on a bright sunny day in May, Mother's Day, 1989. So far, the only gift I had received was a tiny notepad and pen in the shape of a rose during the morning service. I began to think about what to make for dinner since there was no mention of taking me out to the IHop for their Mother's Day special, when my husband announced that he was taking the children to the mall. Aha!



I had barely set the table when they all arrived home toting large Sear's bags. The children ran to their rooms returning promptly, proudly displaying their new tennis shoes. When my husband showed me his new Nikes, I fled the house in tears. Driving nowhere in particular, I noticed the gas gauge pointing downward, so I pulled into the nearest gas station where the nozzle, upon my lifting, caused an air pocket in the tank and gasoline erupted directly in my face. I rounded out Mother's Day having my eyes irrigated with saline solution, with my lids taped open for two hours at a nearby emergency room, as my husband and children waited in the corridor in their new shoes.

My husband didn't give me anything on that Mother's Day, nor has he since. I know you may think him cruel and stupid. But if you met my husband, you would know that he is neither; he just doesn't give me anything on designated Hallmark days. It makes perfect sense to him, so there's no talking to him about it. He also doesn't give me anything on my birthday because our birthdays are on the same day. And even though Hallmark's not involved, and one would think I was in the clear, we both wake up, say happy birthday, and it goes downhill from there.

But my husband does celebrate our wedding anniversary. A designated date he celebrates with bells on. So, this year I ventured out and asked him why he only celebrates our anniversary. He explained to me his reason behind it and as lame as it was, it did make sense in a weird sort of way. I will pass on his profound answer later; but before I do, here's a list of what my

husband has done in the past on non-designated days of no importance:

On a regular day in March, between St. Patrick's Day and the first day of spring, I found diamond earrings in the kitchen towel drawer. On a hot afternoon in July a couple days before the Fourth, a paper airplane landed in my knitting basket with red, white and blue hearts drawn on it. He once slid a sheet of paper under my office door with the word "Hi" typed in large bold black letters, on a no-Hallmark-day-in-sight Saturday, exhausting the ink in his printer. A mushy rhyming poem on his letterhead business paper appeared under the coffee pot, on a Thursday in February after the Valentine candies were safely stacked on the clearance shelves at Walgreens. And my favorite: A handful of Cadbury Eggs in the bottom of a plastic Home Depot bag, along with a paint brush he forgot he bought, jammed in my purse a week after Easter.

But our anniversary he celebrates with great gusto. He plans for it and has never forgotten it. He even carries on a conversation with me while we're out on the town having our annual dinner. He reminisces about our lives, our marriage, etc. So, as I'm sitting across from him in a booth at our favorite restaurant, I asked him why this is the only day he recognizes. He told me it's because *he thought of it*. He put the date on the calendar. I don't know if I was caught up in the moment or what, but I accepted the answer as he went on fondly downloading all his loving thoughts about me, he'd stored up for the year.

Do I wish my husband would remember Mother's Day and other events? Ideally, yes. I love to celebrate many occasions and go all out. But I'm not always celebrated in the way I want, so with this sad issue, I've dug deep. When I was a young woman, a great emphasis on Proverbs 31 inspired me to be the best wife and mother, as these were cherished roles to me. But I had placed this portion of scripture upon the throne of my life as my identity. So, I read it again: It says your children will rise up and call you blessed and your husband will praise you. In other words, it means your family will appreciate you. But it doesn't say how or when. I decided Hallmark would never determine my worth or identity again.

My adult children do well by me on Mother's Day, and

That is until the day after when a paper airplane lands on my desk, with a message there's a box of my favorite chocolates in the filing cabinet. So, of course, I am truly blessed. 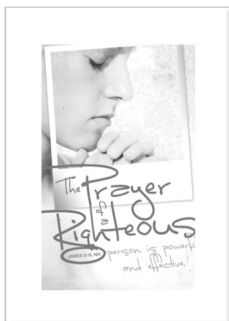

Biblical Thought: *Write the vision, and make it plain upon tables...* Habakkuk 2:2

Explanation: Setting clear goals is a Biblical principle for planning.

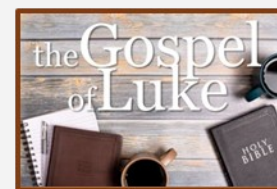
