Enjoying Scripture: Comparing Scripture with Scripture

Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved, a worker who has no need to be ashamed, rightly handling the word of truth.

2 Timothy 2:15



Since February, my *Compass* articles have been exploring the question of how we are to fruitfully read and enjoy the Bible. We've covered topics like: our spiritual posture in reading Scripture, what the Bible is, why historical context matters, how to read with sensitivity to the different genres of Scripture, and how to pay attention to both the large flow of a passage *and* the meaning of individual words.

This month, I want to conclude this brief set of articles with a principle that comes out of the Protestant Reformation. On any matter of interpretation, if we are struggling to understand a portion of Scripture, one of the most powerful things we can do is to compare Scripture with Scripture.

Because all of Scripture is God's Word and because there is no contradiction in God, we know that the whole of the Bible fits together as a unified expression of God's truth. Not all Scripture is equally clear. Even the Apostle Peter says of Paul's epistles: "Some things in his letters are hard to understand" (2 Peter 3:16). In God's purpose, all that we need to know for life and salvation is made clear in his Word. But some parts of his Word are more easily understood than others. We should not fall into the error of imagining that the easier parts are somehow more valuable. We should treasure all of God's Word—both the difficult parts and those that seem more approachable. All is profitable

for us. But it is helpful to know that when we are wrestling with a hard portion of Scripture, we have the clear statements of Scripture that can serve as an anchor for our souls when we do not understand. All of God's truth is a unity, and therefore it can help us to compare Scripture with Scripture.

Comparing Scripture with Scripture matters in a second way. The unity of God's word is a dynamically developing unity. It is an unfolding story. We understand what is *new* with the coming of Christ by *comparing* it to the things of *old*. And likewise, we better understand the *old* by comparing it to what is eventually given in Christ as the climax of the story.

If we desire to understand the unity of God's story as well as how God's *one way of salvation* grows and develops toward the coming of Christ, we will often want to compare Scripture with Scripture. For example, comparing the Old Testament's teaching on the Passover lamb helps us understand what the New Testament means in presenting Christ as the true Passover lamb (John 1:29). Comparing what the Old Testament teaches about the "last days" helps us understand how the New Testament can say that with Christ's life and death and resurrection, the "last days" have come (Heb 1:2).

What tools are available to you if you want to grow in comparing Scripture with Scripture? One of the easiest and most useful things you can do is obtain a Bible that contains "cross-references." Many Bibles contain notes in the column or at the bottom of the page indicating similar or relevant passages you might look up to compare Scripture with Scripture. Referring to such passages can often help you in setting a phrase or verse or passage of Scripture within its larger biblical context.

Another useful tool to become familiar with is that of a concordance—whether you use book concordance or an online tool (like stepbible.org). A concordance will allow you to look up other verses where a *particular word* is used. As a result, a concordance can often allow you to find other relevant passages of Scripture that speak to a particular topic.

Comparing Scripture with Scripture is a practice for

Bible study that rests on some of the most basic things we affirmed at the start of this *Compass* series. All of the Bible is God's Word and therefore a unified expression of God's truth for us. And all of the Bible fits together as God's unified story of redemption. We are drawn then into the whole counsel of God to read and enjoy and profit from God's Word to us today (Acts 20:27).

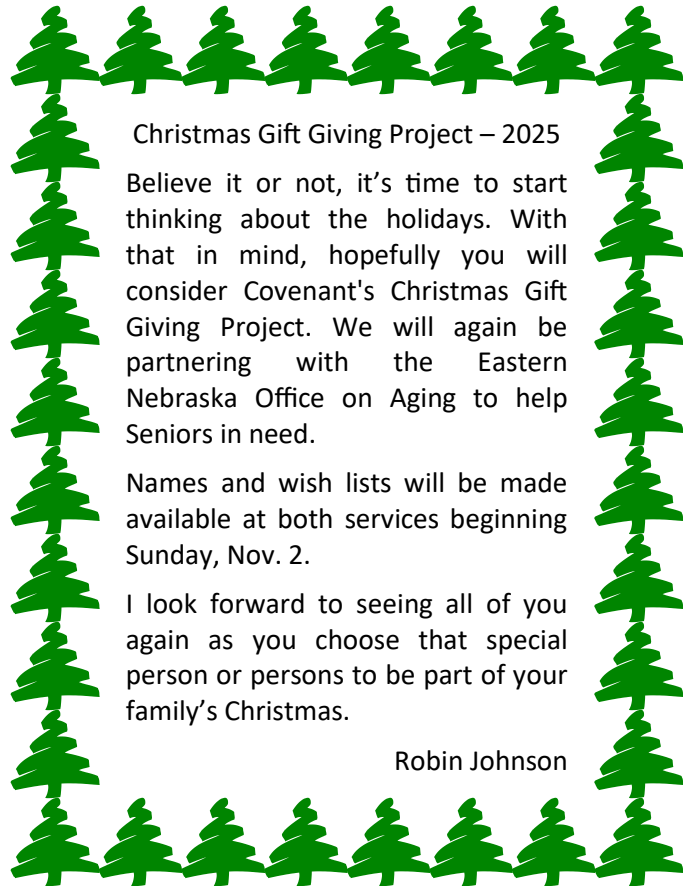

Think People, Think!

Do you remember the end of “The Music Man?” Professor Harold Hill stands in front of all the kids in town, each one brandishing a band instrument. The parents have discovered Harold Hill is not a band director but in fact is a con man. They are about to tar and feather him, unless he shows them that his “Think System” for teaching kids music works. He pleads with the kids, “Think, men....think!” As the kids play their instruments (quite horribly) the parents are overcome with pride, and all ends well.

Sometimes I think God sits up in heaven looking down at His kids saying, “Think, people. think!” The older I get the more it seems that very few people take the time to think for themselves and discover for themselves what God has to say. We like to be told what to think. We would rather take the easy way out and trust what someone else says. The trouble with aimlessly following a human, is humans are fallible. Even the best and most godly people will make mistakes occasionally. It is imperative that we ourselves are students of Scripture. We need to study to be able to show ourselves approved workers for God. (2 Timothy 2:15)

I don’t know about you, but this can be a little scary. I am not a scholar. I am not a genius. I am not a theologian. If you have read any of my articles you would be aware of that by now. However, I do not think that gives me reason to let someone else study for me. The Christian life requires everything, my heart, soul and MIND. I must continue to think and question and seek God for every answer to every question that plagues me. As God stands before us and pleads, “Think, people, think!” We may not play every note right or understand how to do everything perfectly, but like the parents watching their kids play, God will be proud that the thoughts we have are His thoughts. The more we understand and search the Scripture, the more we learn and understand and can proclaim the Truths of God.

Special Finance Update

Each of us is drawn to Covenant from our love for the Lord, and because of that shared love for Christ, we also love Christ's Church. It is our joy, then, to give and participate in the cause of the Gospel.

Covenant has seen its share of challenges in recent years. For some time, Covenant has operated with expenses and staffing commensurate to a larger congregation. Because of this, in 2023, Covenant's elders set a goal to arrive at a balanced budget by the year-end of 2026. To reach that goal, the elders have made a series of sometimes difficult decisions which have already significantly reduced our expenses:

- In 2023, restructuring Children's ministry to operate with fewer staff members;
- In 2024, eliminating the radio broadcast;
- In 2025, changing IT services providers; and, most recently, eliminating the Congregational Care and Full-time Custodial staff positions.

Along the way, we have also made significant budget reductions with respect to building projects. And, we have sought to encourage the Covenant congregation in volunteer opportunities where it is not necessary to rely upon paid services.

We continue to move toward our goal of a balanced budget, but your elders want you to understand that we yet have further progress to make together. Many members are giving generously, and we give thanks to God! Our pledged giving, however, remains far short of

covering our overall budget. Meanwhile, our non-pledged giving has decreased. The simple truth, at this time, is that our regular congregational giving does not cover our expenses.

Soon we will begin our 2026 budgeting process for the church. Even though our staff and ministry teams have been very diligent in watching their expenses, we will be asking for all ministry areas to cut additional expenses where possible for 2026.

Your elders want to encourage you. We desire to avoid the kind of difficult cuts that have been necessary in recent days. That means we do need to increase our giving. It is our desire to make ministry decisions motivated by what we value and see as strategic—not merely because of what is necessary.

To that end, we hope you'll commit with us to finish 2025 with strength. We see God at work. We see many individuals growing in Christ, and we rejoice to also see a full New Members Class. **If you've not previously given regularly to ministry here at Covenant, would you consider linking arms with us in the cause of the Gospel?** Help us ensure that the ministry and witness that we love at Covenant will continue for many years to come. Let's together respond in thanksgiving to God, giving generously as God enables us.

Singing comes in the morning. Or, otherwise known as “joy comes in the morning.”

This familiar saying is derived from Scripture. This is where David



proclaims that after a night of weeping, then joy or singing comes in the morning. It's an elegant verse, beautifully written by the "sweet psalmist of Israel," and often used in Christian counseling to encourage one with life's trials. It's also popular in the secular world as titles to novels and movies.

But this famous quote is found in the Bible as one of the verses David wrote as an entire song or psalm for the dedication of the temple. In a deeper spiritual sense, the temple is a foretaste of Christ—our only hope in this world from God's wrath—who will eventually wipe away our tears. “For His anger is but for a moment, His favor is for life. Weeping may endure for a night, but joy comes in the morning” (Psalm 30:5 KJV).

Can we apply this verse while waiting for the trumpet to sound? I believe we can. For the trials here on earth, it's a promise they themselves are temporary. But what if joy doesn't come in the morning? Oh, but it will. It's more of a season in our lives and not an overnight experience. Night describes the weeping time. And morning, the joyful time. It's more of a promise that joy always follows sadness, the way morning always follows night. We can be confident that just as the sun rises every morning, that joy will rise in our hearts.

Is it nighttime for you? Then remember morning is on its way. Your favor as a child of God is eternal. Don't forget your position because of the pain. Singing is where we all want to be, but David describes it more strategically. We are in a state of movement from weeping and enduring to learning, while forever in God's favor.

In the meantime, keep practicing your musical scales. In verse 11, David continues: *You have turned for me my mourning into dancing; You have put off my sackcloth and clothed me with gladness.* It's singing time.

Jesus Would Love Even Me

I recently wrote about a week in Hawaii where I worked 120 hours in emergency rooms. I learned that my stamina isn't what it used to be. I was dog tired at the end of the week. To recover, my wife and I flew from Hawaii to Montana to spend the week with a dear friend. We intended to relax, hike, sleep late, and simply chill out.

Our friend invited us to an open air concert one evening in Big Sky. We arrived early and set up our lawn chairs. Soon hundreds of concert goers did the same. I immediately recognized I was the oldest person there. Many of the attendees were scantily clothed, were heavily tattooed, or had multiple body piercings. Several were openly smoking marijuana or drinking alcohol. "This is a freak show," I said to my wife. "I doubt we'll enjoy this night." I continued to make disparaging comments about these concert attendees as more and more showed up.

The lead singer made an announcement before the first song. "Let's have fun tonight," he started. "For the next couple hours let's try to forget our struggles and worries, enjoy each other's company, and realize we're not that different and have much in common."

"Forget our worries?" I thought. "Easy for him to say. I spend a good portion of my day worrying about family, finances, health, the country, the world, and countless other issues. How can I have fun with those heavy burdens? And I have nothing in common with anyone around me here tonight."

The concert started and I soon realized I was out of my comfort zone as I saw the people dance and essentially go crazy. I had to make a decision. Listen to my gut instinct or the lead singer? At the beginning of the third song I said to my wife, "Let's go!" She assumed I meant we had to leave and go home. I grabbed her hand and pulled her into the mosh pit in front of the stage. We danced, we sang, we chatted with the young groupies. We fist pumped our fellow dancers. We frequently bounced off their bodies as the dancing was chaotic and intense. We were not drunk or stoned. Those around us were most kind and respectful. And we had an amazing time.

As we walked to our car at the conclusion of the concert, many others stayed and continued to party. Some said good night to their elder constituents. And I felt shame. The lead singer was right. I know these kids

have worries and struggles. Probably more so than me. But for a couple hours we did what the band leader suggested and found we probably do have more in common than I envisioned.



As I lay in bed later that night I wondered what Christ thought of these kids. The answer that came to me was, "They are my children and are perfect. They make me proud, and I wouldn't change a thing." That thought made me smile. I then wondered what Christ thought of me that night. The answer from a most merciful God was, "I love even you, Chuck."

Colossians 3:14 – And above all these things, put on love, which is the bond of perfection.

This verse encourages believers to prioritize love above all else, as it is the key to a fulfilling Christian life. It acts as the glue that holds all other virtues together.

Yes, He loves even a sinner like me.

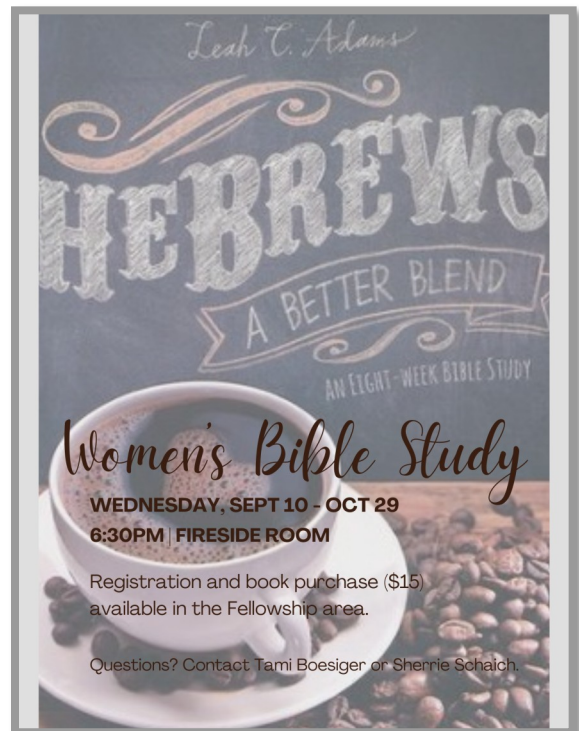

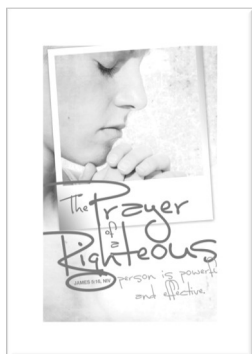
