Matrimony is a Sacrament

Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you.

And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age. Matthew 28: 19-20

This is our mission. And this is Christ's promise to us.

As Catholics we believe that Christ is truly present to us throughout our lives but most explicitly in the sacraments which we celebrate. When we come together as Church, the Body of Christ, for the celebration of a sacrament, we believe that Christ is really present sharing his life, his word, his love and his spirit as we receive that sacrament. **Sacraments belong to the Church not to an individual**.

Sacraments make known **who we are**; they are **expressive**. We are sinners. We are sick. We are hungry. We are alone; etc.

- Sacraments make us who we are meant to be...they are constitutive
- We confess, are absolved and become those forgiven by God, reconciled to the Church and welcomed to the table of the Eucharist.
- We are anointed with blessed oil and become those who trust in God and share in Christ's redemptive suffering.
- We are fed and become the Body of Christ.
- We are married and become a community of persons, a sign of God's agape (love) in our midst.

However, reception of a sacrament is not an end in itself. It is the beginning of a growing, maturing process that makes us more like Christ. In a Lenten Message 2015, the bishops of Kenya writing about the Sacrament of Marriage said:

"....many (young people) concentrate on their wedding day and forget the life-long commitment they are about to enter into."

They need to be encouraged to see the sacrament not as a single moment that then becomes a part of the past and its memories, but rather as a reality that

permanently influences the whole of married life. (Pius XI Encyclical Letter *Casti Connubii*)

Marriage as a Sacrament

At Vatican II, in the document Gaudium et Spes (#48) we read:

"God himself is the author of Marriage." God created humankind in his image; in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them. God blessed them, saying, Be fertile and multiply; fill the earth... (Gn 1: 26-28)

Man and woman were created for each other. "It is not good for the man to be alone. I will make a suitable partner for him...The two of them become one body" (Gn 2: 18; 24). Woman and man are equal in human dignity, and in marriage both are united in an unbreakable bond. (USCCB Catholic Catechism for Adults, p. 279)

But original sin had grave consequences for married life. "...there was a rupture of the original communion between man and woman. Their relations were distorted by mutual recriminations; their mutual attraction, the Creator's own gift, changed into a relationship of domination and lust; and the beautiful vocation of man and woman to be fruitful, multiply, and subdue the earth was burdened by the pain of childbirth and the toil of work. (CCC, #1607)

Jesus restored marriage and the family to their original form (Matthew 19: 3-6) and raised marriage to the sacramental sign of his love for the Church. It is through the Church that "marriage and the family receive the grace of the Holy Spirit from Christ, in order to bear witness to the Gospel of God's love." (*Amoris Laetitia*, 71).

Pope Francis, in his Apostolic Exhortation, *Amoris Laetitia*, teaches us about the Sacrament of Matrimony. He writes:

The sacrament of marriage is not a social convention, an empty ritual or merely the outward sign of a commitment. The sacrament is a gift given for the **sanctification** and **salvation of the spouses**, since "their mutual belonging is a real representation, through the sacramental sign, of the same relationship between Christ and the Church. The married couple is therefore a permanent reminder for the Church of what took place on the cross; they are for one another

and for their children **witnesses of the salvation** in which they share through the sacrament". (#72)

...The sacrament is not a "thing" or a "power", for in it Christ himself "now encounters Christian spouses...He dwells with them, gives them the strength to take up their crosses and so follow him, to rise again after they have fallen, to forgive one another, to bear one another's burdens". Christian marriage is a sign of how much Christ loved his Church in the covenant sealed on the cross, yet it also makes that love present in the communion of the spouses. (#73)

...the sacrament of marriage flows from the incarnation and the paschal mystery whereby God showed the fullness of his love for humanity by becoming one with us. Neither of the spouses will be alone in facing whatever challenges may come their way. Both are called to respond to God's gift with commitment, creativity, perseverance and daily effort. They can always invoke the assistance of the Holy Spirit who consecrated their union, so that his grace may be felt in every new situation that they encounter. (#74)

...Lovers do not see their relationship as merely temporary. Those who marry do not expect their excitement to fade. Those who witness the celebration of a loving union, however fragile, trust that it will pass the test of time. Children not only want their parents to love one another, but also to be faithful and remain together. (#123)

Men and women marry and they have done so since the beginning of time. Today's media has created its vision of what happens or should happen at the marriage ceremony. And through the years, customs have been invented and spread like wildfire, each bride and groom investing a huge amount of time and money to make their ceremony unique and memorable. But none of these trends toward individuality can claim to be a sacrament.

When a couple comes to the Church and enters the process of preparing for their marriage they are preparing to celebrate a Sacrament in the context of the Christian community.

The Sacrament of Matrimony at Christ the Redeemer Parish

We take our responsibility for your sacramental preparation very seriously, just as we do the preparation necessary before any sacrament is celebrated. This booklet provides an overview of the timeline, requirements, and details of your preparation to be married in the presence of God and the Church.

Requirements

Either the bride or groom must be a Baptized Catholic and a member of our parish. Recent Baptismal certificates (dated within six months of the wedding date) are required from Catholics and any record of Baptism for non-Catholic Christians.

- The couple must be eligible to marry in accord with the 1983 Code of Canon Law of the Roman Catholic Church. If either party has been married previously, their freedom to marry must be determined by processes that may take up to one year. If a previous marriage ended in death, the death certificate must be made available. If a previous marriage ended by divorce and was annulled by the church, the Declaration of Nullity must be available.
- The couple must participate in the marriage preparation process as outlined in this booklet.
- The couple intends to practice their faith as part of our worshipping community throughout the preparation process.

Marriage Preparation Process

During the first meeting with Fr. William Promesso, the couple will provide information for the pre-marriage investigation paperwork, such as residency, birth date, Baptism, and previous marriages.

When the requirements of church law have been satisfied, we will make every effort to see that your desired wedding date is available. Weddings with or without Holy Communion are scheduled for Fridays (usually 5PM) and Saturdays (usually 2PM) except during Advent and Lent. The Rite of Marriage may also be celebrated during our weekend liturgies with the larger community gathered.

Pre-Marriage Evaluation

At your first meeting with Fr. Bill, he will discuss use of the pre-marriage relationship evaluation tool. **PREPARE** is a multiple-choice questionnaire designed to reveal the strengths and weaknesses of a relationship and assist you in addressing potential problems and delight in relationship strengths. Your **PREPARE** relationship evaluation tool is administered online, through use of your personal email and credit card. Once we receive notification that you've completed the tool, you will be contacted by Deacon John Santeramo to discuss the results during one or two meetings with him. Those results and his observations become part of your pre-marriage file.

Sponsor Couples

Many parishes have developed excellent pre-marriage seminars and workshops that help couples to dig more deeply into the spirituality of marriage and the role of faith in a couple's life together. Here at CTR we are blessed to have several couples with many years of successful marriage meet with individual engaged couples to discuss the challenges and blessings of Christian marriage. You will be assigned a Sponsor Couple who will meet with you several times then submit a certificate of completion along with any observations for your pre-marriage file

Liturgy Preparation

In this packet you will find all the preparation options for your wedding liturgy: Scripture readings, intercessions, and music. When two Catholics marry, we usually celebrate Marriage within a Mass. When a Catholic marries a non-Catholic or a non-Christian, Eucharist is usually not celebrated since the non-Catholic person cannot receive communion. Before the wedding day, you'll need to meet with Fr. Bill and Mari Reyes, our Director of Worship & Music, to finalize these details and choices. See the Wedding Data Form inside.

Musicians

All music for the Liturgy is provided by Mari Reyes, our Director of Worship & Music. Mari can perform in a solitary capacity, being both the organist/pianist and singer for your wedding, or one of our talented cantors (solo vocalists) may be obtained to sing. Instrumentalists are also available to be added to the music, from a single additional musician to ensembles of multiple instrumentalists. All

musicians are scheduled through Mari. If you are interested in additional musicians, please contact her regarding scheduling and fees.

Marriage License

If either the bride or groom lives in Oakland County, information on obtaining a marriage license may be found at www.oakgov.com. Other counties also have websites with information regarding their licensing.

Rehearsal

Most weddings are rehearsed one or two days before the wedding. This takes about 45 minutes and is meant to familiarize the wedding party with the words, rituals, and processions that are part of a wedding liturgy. Fr. Bill will set the day and time with you as soon as the wedding day is scheduled.

The Wedding Day: Flowers, Bows, and other Decorations

An aisle runner is not used. You are welcome to have your florist bring one or two FRESH flower arrangements to church for the wedding. We hope you'll leave the flowers in church so the whole community can celebrate with you throughout the weekend. We have white bows which will be placed on selected chairs for the wedding party. We do not permit candelabras, floral or balloon arches, nor anything that would impede the movement or visibility of the liturgy, wedding party or people in attendance. There must be no throwing of flower petals, rice, confetti, seed, nor blowing of bubbles before, during, or after the wedding, whether indoors or outdoors.

If you choose to have a Unity Candle, please do not place it within a flower arrangement. The parish provides the two smaller candles and we have the large "Unity" candle available for purchase from the parish office.

If you are unsure, please consult with Mari Reyes before finalizing your plans.

Greeting your Guests

A receiving line is not permitted. Immediately after the wedding, you have 30 minutes for photography. We encourage you to greet your guests at the reception.

Photos and Videos

We recognize your desire to capture this special day on film and video and encourage the tasteful use to photography and videography. Please inform your photographer and/or videographer to consult with Fr. Bill before the liturgy to review our rules for them, including 30 minutes for photography after the wedding.

Fees and Costs

While there is no actual fee for the celebration of a sacrament, there are costs associated with the preparation, for the required ministers, and for the use of the building. To make it easier for you, here's a breakdown of the expenses you can anticipate:
