

On Mass intentions

Every Sunday when the community gathers to celebrate the Eucharist, the priest is obligated by Church Law to offer one Mass on Sunday and on Holy Days of obligation for the intentions of all parishioners known as *Pro Populo*. At Immaculate, since the community celebrates only one Sunday Mass, it follows then that the Sunday Mass at Immaculate is always *Pro Populo* (for the intentions of all parishioners).

The Church also celebrates Mass offered for a special intention for the living and the deceased. To have this kind of Mass celebrated, parishioners need to contact the parish office, and Mass will be celebrated within our parish family at any daily Mass Monday through Saturday. Please note that with the number of parishioners and Mass requests being made within our parish family, the specific date and time is not guaranteed but Mass will definitely be offered.

Your short and painful life Showed us your strength and humility, Pary that we may become Forever humble like you.


Like the bright and shining starts at night, We pray that your light may forever shine down Upon us, giving light, hope, peacefulness And serenity in our darkest moments.




St. Kateri, pray for us. **St. Kateri**, walk with us.

The icon of St. Kateri Tekakwitha by Patricia Brintle was commissioned for St. James Cathedral in 2025. This permanent addition to the Cathedral's collection of images recognizes St. Kateri's connection with this region: the miracle that led to St. Kateri's canonization took place in Seattle with the miraculous healing of Jake Finkbonner, a descendant of the Lummi Nation. The icon honors the presence of Native American Catholics in the Archdiocese of Seattle from the very beginning, and invites all the draw closer St. Kateri, the patron of indigenous people and of the environment.





Mass to Honor Our Lady of Guadalupe, Mother of the Americas in the Jubilee Year

Join us for the 31st Celebration of the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe on <u>Saturday</u>, <u>December 6</u> for holy hour, rosary, Mañanitas, procession and Mass at St. James Cathedral led by Bishop Eusebio Elizondo.

The Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe honors the Virgin Mary, who appeared to an Aztec peasant, Juan Diego, for the first time on a hill called Tepeyac on Dec. 9, 1531, in Mexico City. Mary told the Christian convert, in his native language of Nahuatl, that she wanted a church built in her honor on the site of her apparition.

Our Lady of Guadalupe was declared Patroness of the Americas in 1945 by Pope Pius XII, and her Feast Day was elevated to an obligatory memorial by Pope John Paul II in 1999. She is also the Patroness of the Philippines.

This Advent, use this guide to help you and your family anticipate and prepare for the coming of Jesus.

Advent Family Traditions

Advent, the liturgical season before Christmas, is a great opportunity for families to enjoy joyful, faith-based traditions that keep the focus of the season on the anticipation of Jesus. This isn't easy when retailers start Christmas the day after Halloween. Even if you didn't grow up with many Advent traditions, are there one or two traditions on this list that you can try this year?

Advent Wreath

The Advent wreath is rich with the symbolism of the season: four candles for the four weeks of Advent and the flames representing the light of Christ to come. The lighting of each candle is an opportunity for the family to gather in prayer and read the daily scripture or reflection from an Advent book. Try turning off the lights and sing a song like, "O Come, O Come Emmanuel" or "Light the Advent Candle" as the candles are lit.

Advent Calendar

The point of an Advent calendar is to inspire hopeful anticipation of the coming of Jesus and to emphasize the spirit of waiting over the spirit of receiving. Although the chocolate and Lego calendars are fun, try a faith inspired Advent calendar this year, which are easy to purchase online. Many have daily scripture quotes from Advent to keep you in the Advent frame of mind.

Christmas Anticipation Prayer

Also known as the St. Andrew Christmas Novena (not a typical 9-day novena), this beautiful, short daily prayer is traditionally prayed 15 times a day during Advent, starting on the Feast of St. Andrew on November 30. But for most busy families, praying it together once a day is a win. The words of the prayer are a reminder of the humble and historical event of the incarnation. Try saying the prayer after lighting the Advent wreath or as part of your prayers before dinner.

Straw for Baby Jesus

This tradition is when you put out a "manger" (a small cardboard box will do) and a bowl of "straw" in a common area (such as the kitchen table), and the idea is to create a full bed of straw for baby Jesus by Christmas Eve by adding a piece of straw when a good deed or small sacrifice is done for Jesus. Everyone can participate, even parents! On Christmas Eve, you lay baby Jesus (or a doll to symbolize) on the (hopefully) full bed of straw and sing "Away in a Manger" or "Silent Night."

Blessings for the Advent Wreath, Nativity set and Christmas Tree

You can find blessings for the Advent Wreath, Nativity set and Christmas Tree in many Catholic prayer books or online (such as archseattle.org/advent). Taking a moment to pause and pray a blessing is a great way to reflect on the meaning of these traditions. These blessings invite us to enjoy them with intention and gratitude.

Jesse Tree

This tradition traces salvation history from the Old Testament through the birth of Christ. Much like the Advent calendar but more involved with longer daily readings and song, it's a daily activity rich with symbolism and a great way for all ages to participate.

Decorating in stages

Instead of putting up all the Christmas decorations the morning after Thanksgiving, consider putting them up in stages to emphasize the season of waiting for the light of Christ. This will help put more focus on your Advent traditions. One idea is to wait to light and decorate the Christmas tree until Guadete (Rejoice) Sunday, the third Sunday of Advent. Remember, the Christmas season starts on Christmas and lasts all the way through the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord in January.

"O" Antiphons

The "O" Antiphons are beautiful, short chants used at vespers (evening prayers) for the last seven days of Advent from December 18–24, each starting with "O" and each highlighting a title for the Messiah (O Wisdom, O Lord,...), which increases the anticipation of Christ's coming. You can add these to your evening prayers around the Advent wreath or in front of the Nativity set.

St. Andrew Christmas Novena

Traditionally prayed November 30 to Christmas Eve.

Hail and blessed be the hour and moment in which the Son of God was born of the most pure Virgin Mary, at midnight, in Bethlehem, in the piercing cold. In that hour vouchsafe, I beseech Thee, O my God, to hear my prayer and grant my desires through the merits of Our Savior Jesus Christ, and of His Blessed Mother. Amen
