The Gananoque Police Service completed its 156th year of service to the Town of Gananoque in 2019, and as the Chief of Police I am proud to share the 2019 Annual Report on behalf of all members of the Gananoque Police Service.

The report will highlight many of the successes of the Service over the year. All these successes would not have been possible without the commitment and dedication of all members of the Service.

2019 was an exceptionally busy year for the Gananoque Police Service as we recorded a 20% increase in calls for service over 2018. This obviously added significant extra workload to the members of the service, even more so given that we were operating 10 months of the year with 2 members unable to complete front line duties.

I would like to commend the staff for their exceptional dedication to their community in performing their duties under pressure, always answering the call to attend work to backfill vacant positions morning and night.

As part of the Health IM initiative the Gananoque Police Service continues providing a mental health crisis worker for 16 hours per week to assist the officers when dealing with persons suffering from a mental health crisis. This has proven to be of great benefit in reducing time officers are spending in the field dealing with distressed persons. This program continues to be funded through a provincial grant program through 2022.

In 2019 there was a continued focus on reducing crime through a commitment to being more proactive and as a result of this effort our clearance rate for crimes solved was 58%. This would not have been possible without the continued support that the Service receives from its community members and the dedication of our staff.

I would also like to mention the retirement of our longest serving member of the Gananoque Police Service. Sgt Rhonda Sherboneau called it a career in late 2019 after serving with the RCMP and the Gananoque Police Service for 28 years. Her professionalism and knowledge were appreciated by all who served with her and the community alike. I would like to wish her well as she moves on to the next chapter.

Finally, the successes of the Gananoque Police Service would not be possible without the committed efforts of the Gananoque Police Services Board and the continued support of all our community stakeholders. It ensures that the Gananoque Police Service remains the best police service in Ontario Our police service is only as strong as the community it proudly serves.





In April 2019, Police Communicator Nancy Delaney completed her final shift at Gananoque Police and retired after being with the Service for 20 years.

Sgt. Rhonda Sherboneau also retired at the end of 2019 after 20 years with the Service.

Two of our Special Constables resigned their positions to pursue other interests. Mary Shultz and Chad Mandigo continue to serve as Special Constables, along with two Special Constables from Brockville Police filling in when needed.

In 2019, the Gananoque Police Service began using Axon Evidence Management, a cloud-based digital evidence management solution, used by agencies across the world to easily create, store, search and share case files. — minus the hassle of

paperwork, couriering DVDs and evidence bags. Axon software can find and blur commonly redacted objects to cut the time it takes to redact videos. Looking forward, there may be a time when we can eliminate policing paperwork altogether, which would free officers to spend more time doing what they signed up for – being on the street and protecting their

able to send community members a link where they can add digital evidence such as pictures, screen shots, voice messages and videos, with all of the information is protected for police use only. Officers are now taking recorded witness statement on scene, using the mobile Axon app and taking pictures of evidence, crucial to investigations and the process of cases through court trial.

Case files are created in niche RMS and sent to the Courts electronically through a program called SCOPE. SCOPE allows the Ministry of Attorney General (MAG's) 54 Court locations to receive electronic disclosure which is part of a larger eSolutions initiative that also includes Criminal e-intake. SCOPE rolled out to us here at Gananoque Police Service in June 2019 and this allowed GPS to file Electronic Briefs (E-Briefs) submissions directly to the Crown Attorney's Office. The transition to E-Briefs is a Province-wide initiative involving MAG, Niche RMS and Versadex agencies. GPS had to prepare its service infrastructure for the project along with training officers and certain civilian staff. We successfully submitted 140 e-briefs through SCOPE to the Brockville Crown Attorney's office from our start date of June through to December 2019. SCOPE has now become a vital process for both the Gananoque Police and the Crown Attorney's Office.

The Gananoque Police Service is actively engaged in numerous community policing initiatives. The Gananoque Police Service conducts several crime prevention initiatives throughout the year in relation to fraud prevention, youth engagement, and elder abuse.

The Youth In Policing Initiative, also known as "YIPI", which is a summer job program funded by the Ministry of Children and Youth Services for teens 15 to 18 years of age, who are attending school full time in the fall. In 2019 the program



hired 4 students for the summer of 2019. The program provides and promotes participation and exposure to the work environment through diverse, educational and productive work assignment while helping bridge the gap between the police agency and the young person. The YIPI program has been a successful program for the last 10 years in Gananogue. The Gananogue Police hire the students for the 8 weeks of the summer and they work alongside police staff. They work as Town Ambassadors assisting with local events, participating in fundraising initiatives as well as getting exposure to a career in policing.

Municipal Drug Strategy The Gananoque Police Service is actively engaged in the Towns Municipal Drug Strategy (MDS). The MDS is Municipal based strategy that coordinate

multi-sectoral initiatives that are based in a four pillar approach; Prevention, Harm Reduction, Treatment & Enforcement. The MDS aims to reduce the harms associated with alcohol and drugs, including prescription drugs.



Several public education events and youth engagement around the 4 pillars were achieved during 2019.

2019 police continued in building community partnerships. Officers with The Gananoque Police Service organized and travelled with students in grades 7-12 from Gananoque to Brockville to attend Stingers. Stingers is youth centre with a focus on recreation and a safe and healthy lifestyle. The youth participation was so overwhelming, funding was secured from a grant to assist in the payment of transportation.


The D.A.R.E program consist of the following:

Ride to Remember

Once again, Gananoque Police Service has participated in "The Ride to Remember" – an organized bicycle event in which participants pay tribute to Canadian Peace Officers that have fallen in the line of duty. The ride starts out at the Ontario Police College in Aylmer Ontario, spans over 700 kilometers, ending up on Parliament Hill in Ottawa on the eve of the National Peace Officers Memorial. Participants consist of members of Law Enforcement agencies across Canada. Gananoque Police Service has participated in the event in 2016, 2017, and 2019. The event began with 3 founding police officers 20 years ago and has grown to approximately 175 riders. Each year the event raises a significant amount of money donated to the charity fund which helps support family of the fallen officers.






Community Outreach Program

Created in 2018, Gananoque Police Service continues to work in partnership with Lanark Leeds and Grenville Addictions and Mental Health in providing a Community Outreach Program. The program responded to 57 referrals in 2019. Many of these referrals result in assisting community members with addictions counselling, mental health support, housing support, hoarding solutions, and many other types of counselling and support. This partnership has been well received by community members in their times of need. It has been funded by a provincial grant which allows for a Mental Health and Addictions counsellor to work along side police officers 2 days a week.



There were 5 Use of Force reports generated in 2019 for 3 separate incidents: These incidents included a Suicidal Subject who was combative, a High Risk Motor Vehicle stop involving 2 suspects with a firearm present, and a foot pursuit of a suspect who fled after a vehicle pursuit. Of the Types of Force used, 2 involved pointing of firearm, and 3 involved use of CEW.

In 2018, 7 reports were generated, and in 2017, 1 report was generated.

Use Of Force

Special Constables

The Special Constables are used to assist officers in security duties such as prisoner escorts to court and hospitals, as well as attending bail and remand hearings at court. In 2019, the Specials logged 2686.5 hours in completing these tasks. In 2018 they logged 2027.5 hours, and in 2017 - 2125.5 hours. The Gananoque Police has an agreement with Brockville Police in sharing the Special Constables for these tasks.



Communications

The Gananoque Police Communications Centre is a 9-1-1 Call Centre for the Gananoque area. The Communicators also handle radio dispatch for the Town's




Police, Fire, Board of Works and Public Works. There are 5 Full-time and 3 Part-Time Communications staff who are responsible for handling all telephone and front counter traffic for the Emergency Services Building. also handle all radio They communications, building surveillance, initial report generation and data management of various computer systems.

In 2019, the Communications Centre generated 6851 calls-for-service for the Town of Gananoque. These consisted of 3291 non-emergency calls and 2209

emergency calls. Of the 2209 emergency calls, 1351 were from 9-1-1 calls.
