Gananoque man charged after drug bust

A 39-year-old man has been charged after a drug investigation led to a police search and seizure at a Gananoque home on Thursday.

In early 2026, the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) East Region Community Street Crime Unit (CSCU) began an investigation into suspected drug trafficking in the Leeds County and Gananoque area, OPP reported.

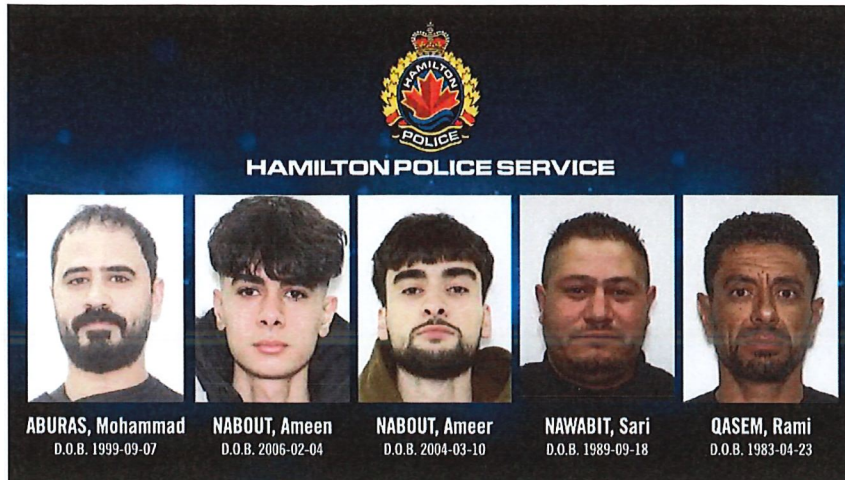
On Thursday, as a result of the investigation, the CSCU carried out search warrants at a residence on North Street in Gananoque, and on a related vehicle, with the help of the OPP Emergency Response Team (ERT), and the Gananoque Police Service.

Officers seized a replica handgun, .22 calibre rifle, and almost 50 grams of suspected cocaine, said police. They also seized cash, “as well as items typically associated with drug trafficking.”

A 39-year-old Gananoque man has been charged with possession of a firearm or ammunition contrary to prohibition order, and possession of a Schedule I substance for the purpose of trafficking.

Police were holding the accused in custody pending a bail hearing.





Hamilton Police have arrested five individuals in connection with the homicide of 16-year-old Faizaan Awan.

On Thursday, March 6, 2025, at approximately 4:20 a.m., Hamilton Police responded to reports of a shooting in the area of Highway 8 and Fruitland Road in Stoney Creek. Two vehicles were located at the scene, a white Kia sedan and a red Acura SUV. The driver of the SUV, 16-year-old Faizaan Awan, was found to be suffering from multiple gunshot wounds. He was transported to hospital, where he later died as a result of his injuries.

Since Faizaan's death, the Homicide Unit has been working to determine who was responsible.

Yesterday, Hamilton Police executed five search warrants at five addresses in Hamilton and Ottawa, resulting in the arrest of five individuals who have been charged with First Degree Murder and Attempted Murder in relation to the two other passengers in Faizaan's vehicle.

Those charged are:

- Mohammad Aburas, 26 years, of Ottawa
- Ameer Nabout, 22 years, of Hamilton
- Ameen Nabout, 20 years, of Hamilton
- Rami Qasem, 42 years, of Hamilton
- Sari Nawabit, 36 years, of Hamilton

The investigation has determined that this was a targeted attack involving multiple individuals and multiple firearms.

This has been a complex investigation involving witness interviews, the collection of physical evidence, and the analysis of video and digital evidence. The continued discovery and analysis of new evidence over the course of the investigation has led to these arrests.

The Hamilton Police Service would like to acknowledge the support of its policing partners who assisted in this investigation, including the Niagara Regional Police Service, Peel Regional Police, Brockville Police Service, Barrie Police Service, and the Ottawa Police Service.

We are pleased to inform you that the Ministry of the Solicitor General is proceeding with the Court Security and Prisoner Transportation (CSPT) Program and will provide a maximum total of \$125M to assist municipalities in offsetting their CSPT costs in 2026.

2026 Transfer Payment Agreement

Similar to previous years, an expenditure-based model has been used to determine the 2026 allocations. Funding is allocated based on each municipality's relative share of the total provincial CSPT cost in 2024. For example, if a municipality's CSPT cost represents one percent of the total provincial CSPT cost, it will be allocated one percent of the available funding.

Subject to the enclosed agreement being finalized, your municipality's allocation for 2026 is **\$78,717.00**. The payment schedule is outlined under Schedule D – Payment Plan and Reporting Schedule of the enclosed agreement.

Please note that Schedule E – CSPT Services and Activities Eligible for Funding has been updated to clarify which activities are considered ineligible. This update is intended to provide greater transparency and assist municipalities in preparing their reporting and expenditure submissions.

If possible, please acknowledge receipt of the agreement and indicate your intent to proceed by March 31, 2026. We understand this is a short timeframe and appreciate your attention to this matter.

Please have the authorized signatory for the recipient sign the agreement where indicated and return it by email to Fionne.Yip@ontario.ca by **April 30, 2026**, along with proof of \$5M general liability insurance, indemnifying “His Majesty the King in Right of Ontario, his Ministers, Agents, Appointees and Employees”, as per section A10.2 of the agreement. A fully executed copy of the agreement will be returned to you for your records.

2026 Financial and Performance Measurement Report

Recipients are required to complete the 2026 Financial and Performance Measurement Report (enclosed as “Schedule F – 2026 Financial and Performance Measurement Report”), which is due to the ministry by March 31, 2027.

As part of the reporting requirements, recipients must provide a breakdown of eligible CSPT costs, as outlined in the 2026 agreement. To demonstrate proof of expenditure for 2026, recipients must submit either:

- an Audited Financial Statement; or
- a Statement of Account approved and signed by an individual with delegated authority who is accountable for the information reported information, covering expenditures incurred from January 1, 2026 to December 31, 2026.

The Audited Financial Statement or Statement of Account must identify the approved grant funding provided to the recipient and include a detailed listing of the expenses incurred. Please ensure that all invoices and receipts supporting reported expense are retained and readily available to demonstrate proof of expenditure upon ministry request for verification or follow up.
