Good morning all,

OSPS is currently undergoing its final Primary site certification with Bell Canada (this week and next week hoping to finish, we are scheduled for 2 solid weeks with Bell). That will count as OSPS being Onboarded for our primary site by end of this month. We will swiftly also do the backup site if Bell allows us (books us in time). We will be prepping our backup site to be ready for certification for when the main site reaches completion in the coming days. Our cutover date to migrate off of E911 at our primary site is in approximately 60 days. Training and BFD/BPS onboarding will happen soon after we finish our site(s). We will be sending a contractor to BFD/GanPS to replace their network routers with new ones. They are identical model but have improved failover redundancy capability so a few wires will be moved over. They will still provide your E911 services as they do now. You will receive documentation for the updated design for your records and any security submissions you may require for police/fire to your respective partners/auditers.

We have completed call recordings for our main site for all calls (regardless of agency and whether in a queue or not). This will allow us to provide you with copies of calls in the event your local recorder has failed.

At this time with the given security requirements we are not looking to provide administrative calling but it is still in discussions and possible solutions but with Bell agreements we do not want to run afoul of any signed terms. This is ingoing but as signed in our agreements with yourselves, NG911 voice and data is the key deliverable and administrative calling remains a future roadmap item which we may sign separate agreements for.

Please note I will be sending out an updated appendix for support. OSPS will be providing the antivirus/patching on your devices and we have updated the terms that we ask your start date (whether using it or not) for each site to begin 60 days after onboarding (certification) is completed. This is due some of our vendors have started charging us as soon as we begin your onboarding. We ask that you begin your term in a timely manner as to not cause undue delays in any cutovers for your agency or any other. This timing affects renewal/contracts with providers and ability to deliver services to your agency. We will work with your agency throughout the certification process to ensure your onboarding goes as smoothly as possible including answering questions from any third party vendors.

Provincial Bail Compliance Dashboard (PBCD) Summary

Provincial Bail Compliance Dashboard (PBCD) enhances police operations by providing real-time data on individuals released on bail for firearm offenses.

Executive Summary

- PBCD is a situational awareness tool for policing partners regarding bail compliance for firearm offenses.
- It aims to improve public safety and support bail compliance checks.
- The initiative follows the passage of Bill C-48, which amended the Criminal Code for bail reform.

Current Status

- Early onboarding of 16 police agencies began on April 3, 2024, with successful testing of processes.
- Onboarding expanded to all police agencies in September 2024.
- The onboarding process includes API integration, user identity management, and application testing.

Roles + Responsibilities

- OPP is responsible for developing and maintaining the PBCD solution, while partner agencies must adhere to data and security requirements.
- Testing involves supporting agencies in API, user identity, and application testing.
- Engagement includes providing training materials and user support.

Project Role Matrix

- Each agency should allocate resources to specific roles for smooth onboarding.
- Recommended roles include Project Manager, API Integration Lead, and Training Lead.

Operations Business Process Lead

- PBCD is part of the Offender Management Apprehension Program.
- Agencies must determine necessary operational adjustments for PBCD integration.

Application Roles

- User permissions are managed through access packages set up by OPP.
- Two access packages: General User and Administrator, each with specific access rights.

Onboarding Process

- UAT onboarding roadmap outlines steps from kickoff to production.
- Agencies must complete pre-onboarding requirements and testing.

MOU Agreement

- All agencies must execute a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) before production onboarding.
- The MOU is a legally binding document requiring signatures from agency leadership.

OPP Key Contacts

Next Steps

- Agencies must complete onboarding registration and security attestation surveys.
- Scheduled onboarding review sessions and technical support forums will be available.

Appendix Documentation

- Starting documentation includes integration guides, onboarding surveys, and MOU drafts.
- Upcoming documentation will cover identity packages and application testing materials.

Appendix B FAQs

- PBCD is a geospatial tool for managing bail compliance.
- It integrates with existing systems and requires up-to-date RMS compatibility.
- Security measures include advanced encryption and regular audits to protect data.

SIU probes use of anti-riot weapons during Gananoque incident involving OPP

Ontario's Special Investigations Unit said Sunday it is probing an incident that saw two **Ontario Provincial Police** officers discharge anti-riot weapons at a Gananoque man, leaving him injured.

The SIU announced the investigation on its website, saying in a statement that three SIU investigators and one forensic investigator have been assigned to the case.

A 42-year-old Gananoque man was transported to hospital for treatment after OPP officers discharged their weapons at him inside his home, the SIU said, without disclosing his injuries.

The SIU is an independent Ontario government agency that investigates the conduct of municipal, regional and provincial police officers.

According to the SIU, "preliminary information" suggests officers with the Gananoque Police Service were dispatched to the area of Second Street and Victoria Avenue at around 4:30 p.m. on Aug. 15, for reports of "a disturbance in the neighborhood."

Officers discovered that a man had allegedly barricaded himself inside a residence. OPP officers were dispatched to assist, the SIU said.

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Shortly before midnight, the SIU said, OPP officers entered the residence and were met by the man who was allegedly armed with "edged weapons."

Two officers discharged their anti-riot weapons (ARWENs) and released their service dog. ARWENS are described as non-lethal weapons.

According to the statement, the man was transported to hospital for treatment of unspecified injuries.

An SIU spokeswoman said the man remains in hospital Sunday afternoon.

"Investigators are awaiting confirmation as to the nature of his injuries," the SIU spokeswoman said.

The SIU is called to investigate incidents involving the discharge of a firearm at a person by police in Ontario, as well as incidents that may have resulted in death, serious injury, or sexual assault.

All investigations are conducted by civilian SIU investigators. Under the Special Investigations Unit Act, once a probe is finished, the SIU director must consider whether the officers committed a criminal offence in connection with the incident investigated.

Depending on the evidence, the SIU decides whether a criminal charge should be laid where grounds exist for doing so, or close the file without any charges being laid.


The SIU must publicly report the results of all investigations.
