



Hornell Public Library

Donated to the City of Hornell by industrialist Andrew Carnegie, the Hornell Public Library was open to the public on March 28, 1911. The Hornell Public Library is one of the 750 remaining (out of 1,689) historic Carnegie Libraries built in the United States.

The Library building was designed by Edward Lippincot Tilton, a national and international award winning architect who designed many of the Library buildings for the Andrew Carnegie Foundation. Interestingly, the Carnegie Foundation contract specified that local Hornell area companies, lumber yards, and craftsman were to be purposely hired to construct the Library. The quality and enduring beauty of the work done by local craftsmen is evident throughout the structure.
