Final Art DRI Art Installation Completed

Department of Public Works

The Department of Public Works has wrapped up another successful summer and fall season and is now prepared for the winter months here in the City of Hornell. With plow trucks ready and road salt stocked, the DPW is set for when Old Man Winter comes to town!

A friendly reminder to all residents to not place snow in the road. Depositing grass, debris, or snow into the roadway is illegal and can result in a ticket. It also creates drainage problems and hazards for everyone using the road.

While we understand limitations with parking, we ask that residents remove vehicles parked on the street during snow and ice events when able. This will improve clearing the snow from the roadways, as well as decrease risk to your vehicle during slippery and snowy conditions.

Arbor Day is approaching in April. If you would like information about having a tree planted in front of your home, please contact the City Clerk's Office to learn more and to possibly be added to the list.

Progress Continues with WPCP Phase 1B

The \$6.5 million Phase 1B project at the Water Pollution Control Plant (WPCP) continues to make progress.

The WPCP recently installed a new emergency generator that is capable of running all of the equipment at the sewage plant. Inside the plant, updates to the doors and ventilation system are nearly complete, and when finished will provide a safe and healthy working environment for the operators at the plant.

Next up for Phase 1b, we are expecting delivery of the raw sewage pumps in late fall or early winter. These three pumps will replace some 50 year old equipment and should be a significant improvement from our current equipment. The operators at the plant have been busy working with the construction crew to devise an alternate pumping system to be deployed while each pump, motor, and valve in the system is replaced.

To make the alternative system work, the mechanical contractor J.W. Danforth will rent 2 very large pumps which will run outside the plant, and keep the wastewater moving, while the old pumps are removed and replaced with new pumps individually. Each pump replacement is scheduled to take a month to complete. We are hopeful to complete the \$6.5 million project by February 2026.

From the Fire Department

The Hornell Fire Department wishes everyone a safe and fun holiday season. As we close in for the winter, we have compiled some helpful tips.

To ensure winter house safety and prevent fires, please be mindful to keep heat sources away from flammable materials. Also, be sure to check that you have working carbon monoxide and smoke detectors, and winterize your home to prevent frozen pipes and improve insulation. We recommend everyone prepare an emergency kit with food, water, and necessary supplies in the event of power outages. Below are additional winter fire prevention tips:

Winter Fire Prevention Tips

- Keep space heaters, fireplaces, and wood burning stoves at least three feet away from anything that can burn, such as curtains, furniture, and bedding.
- Never use a gas or charcoal grill indoors, or use a stove/oven to heat your home.
- Always use a glass or metal screen for fireplaces and never leave a fire unattended.
- Turn off space heaters before going to sleep or leaving a room.
- Ensure furnaces, chimneys, and vents are professionally inspected and cleaned annually.
- Generators should only be used outdoors and far from windows and doors.
- During the holiday season, please be careful with electrical devices, especially with the use of plug strips. Make sure they are UL approved and rated for their use.

Carbon Monoxide and Smoke Detectors

- Install and test carbon monoxide and smoke detectors on every level of your home, **especially near sleeping areas.**
- Ensure detectors have battery backups and check their batteries regularly.

Congratulations to Firefighter Austin Wheatcraft on his fire academy graduation from the New York State Fire Academy. Wheatcraft's 12 weeks of training will be put in service on Shift #1 as Firefighter/EMT.

Finally, the Hornell Fire and EMS completed their fall training as part of their ongoing certifications. The fall training focus was on vehicle fires, as well as vehicle rescue and extrication. As vehicles change and update, new challenges are faced every year and this training is helpful to remain prepared. The Fire department also completed a hazmat drill with St. James Hospital monitored by Dr. P. Toomey of University of Rochester Emergency Medicine.

City of Hornell Receives A+ Financial Audit

The Common Council met for their September meeting and received the annual audit review from Erica Handley of Drescher & Malecki LLC. The review encompassed the City's governmental funds, including the City's Water and General funds. Overall, the City was provided with an A+ letter grade assigned to the audit

Mayor John Buckley noted, "Residents expect local government to manage finances successfully, and we are proud of our series of clean audits. The health of the City's finances is in good shape, with revenues slightly exceeding expenditures. I would like to extend my appreciation to Michele Smith, City Chamberlain, as well as the Finance Committee, City department heads, and the Common Council for their hard work day in and day out to ensure we maintain a sound financial outlook."

During the audit presentation, Handley provided a tenyear lookback of the City's general fund revenues and expenditures. The review showed a significant rise in expenditures beginning in 2021 following the pandemic. The City was able to keep pace with those expenses and add to the fund balance. This includes the unrestricted fund balance, which is a crucial piece to ensure the City remains financially strong, stable, and able to weather unexpected challenges.

City Chamberlain Michele Smith emphasized the broader importance of the audit results, stating, "Responsible financial management is essential to ensuring residents can rely on stable services today, as well as into the future. This successful audit review reflects the dedication of everyone who helps keep the City's finances strong for the community."

A Message from the City Chamberlain

City Receives Clean Audit for Fiscal Year Ending March 31, 2025

Drescher & Malecki, LLP recently completed the City's annual independent audit for the fiscal year ending March 31, 2025. The audit resulted in a clean, unmodified opinion, indicating that the City's financial statements fairly present its financial position in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

The audit found no major issues or weaknesses, demonstrating the City's continued commitment to fiscal responsibility, sound financial management, and public transparency. The City has also maintained a stable fund balance, reflecting prudent financial planning and oversight.

City Chamberlain's Office - Tax and Payment Information

The City Chamberlain's Office is responsible for collecting taxes, water bills, garbage bills, and other payments. Please review the following important dates and payment options:

Tax Collection Dates

- The 2026 County tax bills will be mailed by the end of December and are due by January 31, 2026 without penalty.
- The last day to pay the 2025-2026 School tax in our office is December 31, 2025.
- The 2025-2026 City tax bill is being collected in our office until March 16, 2026.

Water Bills

 Metered water bills for commercial properties have been recently mailed and are due by December 31, 2025 without penalty.

Payments can be made in the following ways:

- Drop box located on the Seneca Street side of City Hall
- By phone with debit/credit card*

 Online tax payments are only available until the due date,
 before any penalties have been added. Online water and solid waste payments are available at any time.

*Any payment made using debit/credit card or E-check is subject to a convenience fee collected by the third-party payment provider.

Police Update

On November 11, 2025, the Hornell Police Department, along with many other agencies throughout Steuben County, transitioned to a new computer-based report-writing system. This system allows the Hornell Police to interface with and share law enforcement information across the county. It replaces our prior system with one that is more efficient, resulting in more detailed and accurate reports. The new system also integrates with many existing departmental programs.

The department would like to thank Sgt. Ryan Harrison and Sgt. Daniel Murray, who led the implementation of the new system and conducted staff training that made this change possible.

We are also moving forward with the updating of our new community-wide camera program. This program will replace more than a dozen cameras throughout the City with new day and night-vision, which will be monitored at our dispatch center. Special thanks to our IT Specialist Ed Flaitz, who has been instrumental in both of these initiatives.



Codes Office Update

The Codes Office would like to remind residents it is **illegal to shovel snow into the road** and **sidewalks must be cleared of**any snow and ice following a winter storm.

We would also like to remind all residents, that any contractors performing work within the City must first obtain a Contractor's Permit. All permits expire on December 31, 2025, and contractors are encouraged to complete their applications for the 2026 year.

We are excited to share that updates to the City's Code have been recently completed. Many updates involve the repeal of antiquated practices, while others involve updated language to reflect modern times. All of the City's codes can be found online at: https://ecode360.com/HO1346. The new updates are being processed and will be available online in the new year.

News from the Assessor's Office

City of Hornell Assessor, Cindy Burdell, announces that *Renewal Applications* for the Partial Tax Exemption for Senior Citizens and Disabled property owners with limited income have been mailed to Hornell City residents.

Applications were mailed in September and must be returned to the Assessor's Office by January 1, 2026.

To request an application, please call: **607-324-7421 Ext. 466** during City Hall business hours.

Reminder for Enhanced STAR:

- If your primary residence is in the City of Hornell, you will become 65 anytime in 2026, and your 2025 income is \$107,000 or less, you may qualify for the Enhanced STAR exemption. This exemption only applies to your school taxes; it does not apply to County or City taxes.
- If you already have an existing STAR Basic exemption, you do not need to reapply for Enhanced STAR. The State of New York will provide an update to you in 2026 if you qualify.

A reminder that new STAR recipients will receive a check directly from New York State instead of receiving a school property tax exemption. The amount of the benefit is the same. To be eligible for a STAR check, you must register with the New York State Tax Department by visiting http://www.tax.ny.gov or by calling **518-457-2036**.

The Hornell City Assessment update will be completed by the end of 2025, with notices mailed in January 2026.

Contractor's Permit Reminder

The City Clerk would also like to remind all residents and business owners that any contractor performing work within City limits must first obtain a Contractor's Permit.

To secure a permit, contractors are required to:

- Complete a Contractor's Permit Application. This is available on our City website at: https://www.cityofhornell.gov/permits-and-licenses
- Provide a valid photo identification.
- Undergo police background check
- Submit proof of liability insurance and Workers' Compensation Insurance
- Pay the \$5.00 Annual Permit Fee

Please note that all Contractor's Permits expire on December 31 each year. Contractors are encourage to renew promptly to stay in compliance with City regulations.
