SELICHOTSaturday, September 13 at 7:00 PM

The climax of the Hebrew month of Elul comes during the service of Selichot, an exercise in spiritual preparation for the Days of Awe. Traditionally held at midnight on the Saturday night/ Sunday before Rosh Hashanah, Jews around the world gather together for what is, truly, the first of the High Holy Day services, a brief but intense experience during which the music and liturgy of the season are used for the first time. The service is filled with drama and awe, as in the dark of the night we begin to bare our souls, and plead for forgiveness.

In the twilight of the year, we begin our observance at Beth Israel on Saturday, September 13 at 8:00 PM with Coffee, Cake and Conversation. We then enter the darkened Sanctuary at 8:00 PM as our teens, dressed in white, carry the newly redressed Torah scrolls to the ark and lead us in Havdalah, the candle-lit ceremony separating Shabbat from the rest of the week. The actual Selichot Service follows Havdalah. The evening should end by 9:30 PM. Please join us for this very powerful service.



Yesterday and Tomorrow

Message from Rabbi Michael L. Feshbach



Recently I was asked to give three answers to security questions, to set up one online account or another. The final question took me a moment. What is your favorite song? There were many I could come up with, but I wanted a single word, and something I could remember. What came into my head, then, was "Yesterday." And, then, I recalled the plot of a movie of the same name from a few years back.

We begin with Jack Malick, a stylistically-challenged kind of clueless decidedly unsuccessful aspiring British singersongwriter of Indian descent, played by the (by contrast) quite talented actor Himesh Patel. After a few opening scenes, Malick decides to give up on his dreams. He is ready to retire from the music world.

But then he is in an accident while riding his bike. He flies through the air, and hits his head.

On being picked up by his manager, he throws off a line from an old Beatles song. She reacts as if the lyric was brilliant – and new. He gives her a puzzled look, mentions the Beatles, and is greeted with: "who?"

Confused, he goes straight to Google. On entering the term "Beatles," the results focus only on insects.

And then things get interesting. Malick, of course, cannot resist the temptation... He scrambles to write down as many Beatles songs as he can from memory (since there are no records, and no record of any of the lyrics in this world where the Beatles never existed). He begins playing the songs.

At first people react with ongoing indifference. But then, since this is a movie, things take off. His career explodes. And Jack Malick, passing the songs off as his own creations, reintroduces the Beatles to a world which knew them not.

And this, of course, made me think about the High Holy Days.

There is an initially obvious connection. Is this a sin, what he did? If so, how would he go about repenting? The movie does address that, but that is not what I meant.

No, for me the question is: let's say you have something truly great. It could be an idea, a product – or something inside you, even a character trait, part of who you are. It is something that clicked, that flourished, that worked really well, that had a tremendous impact on the world.

Now, change the circumstances, the opportunities, the back story. This piece of greatness... will it still work? Does it still succeed? Does it have the same impact?

The question I am trying to ask is this: is quality inherent, something which will emerge in different settings? Or is everything shaped and bound and inextricably linked to and constrained by chance and circumstance?

How is that a question for the High Holy Days? This is a season of looking around, and looking inside. What have we done, and where are we going? And who are we, really, wherever we may be at the moment?

This last, then, is perhaps the key spiritual question of the season: who are we, at our core, no matter where we are? What traits, what qualities stay true, and shine through, no matter the situation or circumstances? What is it about ourselves that we want to keep? And what do we want to let go?


May this be a time, for all of us, of being in touch with quality of life and the qualities of our lives. May we distinguish between what is lasting, and what is passing. May we write our own words, sing our own songs... and may we take our yesterdays, and make them into the tomorrows we want.

And, like signing up for all those online accounts, maybe the other point of the season has to do with all those questions. And the ways we prove we are not a robot (ironically, of course, generated, asked and screened by robots). What are the right questions? What are our answers? And how can we, truly, be more secure?

This has been an incredibly busy but fast summer. It seems like I was just enjoying July, when suddenly August appeared and brought the promise of September. New beginnings, new classes, new teachers, new programs and always hopes of success. One would think that after the many years I have sat at this desk, I would feel a bit bored or tired of all the newness. But somehow it just excites me and makes me anxious as if it were my first school opening.



Yes, I am the person that does not sleep very well on the Saturday before the first Sunday school. There are always new faces to greet and more children to get to know.

Our children will be participating, and we will have a special Oneg following services.

As we begin again, it is time to welcome the High Holidays. There will be concurrent programming during services for children ages 3 to grade 4. 


