In and Out; Us and Them: Two Takes on an Old Tale

Message from Rabbi Michael L. Feshbach



With appropriate timing as we approach a day of remembrance for MLK, the book of Exodus opens with the first recorded episode of civil disobedience in world literature. Here, we hear of Shifra and Pu'ah, “*ham'yaldot ha'ivriyot*,” the “Hebrew midwives” who, at obvious risk, defy immoral orders issued by their government, and allow Israelite boys to live. Hauled before Pharoah and grilled about their audacious act, they provide the flimsy and fabricated excuse that “the Israelite women are not like Egyptians; they are like wild animals! Before the midwives can even arrive, they have given birth and hidden their boys from harm.”

The thing is, how you view these women – and who you think they are – leads to a vastly different interpretation of this story, and the lesson for our own lives.

The classic Jewish view is that the midwives are, themselves, Israelites. “Hebrew midwives” describes their *identity* as well as their *occupation*. Centuries after the story was written, the rabbis of the Talmud, uncomfortable with cameo appearances and otherwise unidentified individuals, asserts that Shifra and Pu'ah are none other than... Miriam and Yochevet. The sister and mother of Moses.

This, then, is a tale of vulnerable women from a persecuted minority using wile and wit to act in a moral manner. We are standing up for ourselves. It is a classic case of self-defense, and a lesson to always look out for our own interests.

But two things have always bothered me about this traditional reading. First: it is hard to imagine Israelite women being so flippant with Pharoah. And second: it is also bizarre to hear them describe their own kin as being like “wild animals.”

I want to suggest a different reading. What if the term “Hebrew midwives” is entirely about their work? What if these were Egyptian women whose job was to be *midwives to the Israelites*?

This view of the women addresses the issue of their attitude - and their ease with Pharoah. But the lesson of the story would be quite different. It is still about morality, but here it is about doing the right thing by standing up for others! It is not about self-defense, but, rather, defending those who cannot stand up for themselves.



Even if taught to us by Egyptian women - or maybe especially if so - this is a moral entirely consistent with Jewish teaching and tradition. Defend the weak, protect the vulnerable, give voice to those who are silent and suppressed.

And it is a reminder, at this season when we remember the struggle for civil rights, freedom, liberty and equality, that is falls to each of us... to look out for all of us.

Both possibilities are important here. Standing up for ourselves and speaking up for others are both vital virtues. Which is it and what are we to take away? Maybe the ambiguity is built in. Maybe it was supposed to be both lessons, all along. In and out. Us and Them

Birthday of the Trees

What is Tu B'Shevat?

Tu B'Shevat is Jewish Arbor Day, the Jewish “birthday” of the trees. “Tu” is actually a number, but not the number “two.” It is an abbreviation for the Hebrew number 15. “Tu B'Shevat” simply means the 15th of the Hebrew month of Shevat.

Why is there a birthday for trees?

There are certain Jewish laws which tell us to leave fruit to fall on its own for the first three years, to dedicate (contribute) the fruit of the fourth year. But are you going to keep track of which day you planted which tree? So trees are like horses; they turn the next age together, on the same day, no matter when each one was planted.

How is Tu B'Shevat observed?

This changed over time. In the 16th century Jewish mystics in the city of Tzefat (Safed) developed a “seder” for the holiday, using different kinds of fruit. Modern Zionists in the early 20th century turned it into an occasion to plant trees, to “re-forest” the land. More recently it has become an occasion for general awareness of the environment, the importance of stewardship, and the new dangers we face from climate change we have caused.

When is Tu B'Shevat this year?

This year the holiday begins on Sunday **night, February 1**. We will touch on the themes of the holiday at Tot Shabbat with a Tu B'Shevat Tot Slumber Party (see next page) on January 21, as well as during Religious School on February 1.


