Your LinkedIn profile is often your first impression with potential employers. Here's how to make it stand out.

1. Headline That Hooks

Avoid generic titles like "Student" or "Job Seeker." Use keywords and show ambition.

Examples:

- Aspiring Data Analyst | Python & SQL | Passionate About Turning Data Into Decisions
- Graduate Software Engineer | Java, React | Building Scalable Web Apps

Tip: Include your target role, key skills, and a value statement.

2. Summary That Sells

Your "About" section should tell your story in a few short paragraphs.

Structure:

- Who you are (e.g., IT grad with a passion for cloud computing)
- What you've done (projects, internships, coursework)
- What you're looking for (roles, industries)
- What makes you unique (soft skills, interests)

Tip: Use first person ("I am..."), keep it friendly and professional.

3. Experience That Speaks

Even if you haven't had a formal IT job, include:

- University projects (e.g., Built a REST API using Flask and PostgreSQL)
- Hackathons or bootcamps
- Freelance or volunteer work

Tip: Use bullet points and action verbs like "Developed," "Collaborated," "Analyzed."

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4. Skills That Get You Found

Add technical and soft skills relevant to IT roles.

Examples:

Python, Java, SQL, Azure, AWS, Power Bl Agile, Git, REST APIs, UX Design Communication, Problem Solving, Teamwork

Tip: Match skills to job descriptions you're targeting.

5. Professional Photo

Use a clear, friendly headshot, not something from Instagram.

Dress smart-casual, use good lighting, and smile. Your photo should reflect how you'd show up to an interview.

6. Connect and Engage

Connect with people in companies you want to work for. Follow businesses and stay in the loop with their updates, job posts, and culture.

Join IT-related groups and comment on posts to build visibility.

Tip: Aim for 100+ connections to boost your profile reach.
