From the Minister's Desk...



I recently visited Jasper a year after the fire destroyed 1/3 of the town including the United and Anglican churches, many people's homes and businesses. What encouraged me the most as I walked around the town and visited with friends is the resilience and spirit of hope that I encountered in the people who call Jasper home. Most of the fire debris has been cleaned up (a huge undertaking in itself!), and repairs and new builds are beginning to take shape. Walking around nearby Lake Annette, I noted the stark destruction of the burnt forest on one side that sits in sharp contrast to the living forest; and yet there was startling beauty in the charred stumps and the new growth of fireweed and asters! It is a humbling experience to sit in the midst of all this and feel God's presence!!

As we enter a new school year and celebrate the Season of Creation in our church, we are once again challenged to live in God's World with hope and resilience. The world has a different feel to it when hatred and lies become the norm... as Christians, much is required of us in this time and place as we work to share God's vision of love... Micah 6:8 notes: "What does God require of us? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with our God.". May God's Spirit guide us into this new season.





The darker evenings make it more appealing for me to relax with a good book before I go to bed. I would like to introduce to you a book written by Dani Pettrey. Dani captivates readers with an intense blend of suspense, love and faith in her book entitled, "One Wrong Move". She writes at a wicked pace, has snappy dialogue, and provides us with the most likeable characters. I think you are going to love this one.

"Christian O'Brady was pulled into a life of crime at a young age by his con artist parents. Now making amends for his corrupt past, he has become one of the country's foremost security experts. When a string of Southwestern art heists targets one of the galleries Christian secured, he is paired up with a gifted insurance investigator who has her own checkered past.

I have heard it say that everyone is a reader ... some just haven't found their favourite book yet. If I can help, please let me know.



September 30 is Orange Shirt Day

Orange Shirt Day is an invitation to everyone to wear an orange shirt to show their compassion for the survivors of the Indian Residential Schools and to say that all children matter.

Orange Shirt Day began with Phyllis (Jack) Webstad's story, a Northern Secwpemc (Shuswap) woman from the Stswecem'c Xgat'tem First Nation who went to St. Joseph Mission Residential



School. On her first day of school, Phyllis's grandmother dressed her in an orange shirt. When Phyllis entered the school, she was stripped of her orange shirt and she wasn't able to go home for a very long time – over 300 sleeps by her count. As a child, Phyllis cried herself to sleep every night along with other children who could not go home. No one listened to their pain or showed compassion.

<u>Let us pray</u> for the Residential School survivors who are still struggling. Let us pray for all the intergenerational survivors dealing with the trauma that was passed on.
