

Loving God, thank you for the rest and relaxation we enjoyed over the summer.


Today, we pray for our children as they begin their new school year.



Twentieth Sunday in Ordinary Time Jer. 38:4-6, 8-10; Heb 12:1-4; Lk 12:49-53

Today's Gospel gives us a challenging passage that demands our attention and serious reflection. It contains some of the most startling and seemingly contrary statements attributed.

When Jesus says, "I have come to bring fire on the earth, and how I wish it were already kindled," he is not speaking of a literal, physical fire to consume the world. Rather, this "fire" is a metaphor for a profound and transformative event. In the Old

Testament, fire often symbolizes divine judgment and purification. The prophet Malachi, for example, speaks of the coming Messiah as "a refiner's fire and a launderer's soap" (Malachi 3:2).

This "fire" is the challenging, sometimes painful, reality of the gospel. It consumes what is false and worldly, purifying us from sin and self-deception. Jesus is expressing a deep longing for this process to begin, for the kingdom of

God to be fully established and for the world to be transformed by its purifying power.

Jesus' statement about a "baptism to undergo" points directly to his impending suffering and death on the cross. This is not a reference to water baptism, but a metaphorical "baptism" into suffering, a complete immersion in the agony and darkness of the world's sin. He feels a sense of urgency and "constraint" until this mission is completed. This highlights his unwavering commitment to his salvific work.

The "fire" of judgment and purification is not an abstract force; it is inextricably linked to Jesus' own suffering. He does not just inflict the fire; he is consumed by it. He bears the full weight of sin and its consequences, offering himself as the ultimate sacrifice. This profound connection between judgment and suffering is central to the Christian understanding of atonement.

The "peace" Jesus offers is not a superficial, worldly peace that avoids conflict at all costs. His peace is a profound spiritual peace with God, which can only be achieved by confronting and overcoming sin and the powers of darkness. This spiritual peace often comes at the cost of worldly peace.

The division Jesus describes is the inevitable result of a person's decision to follow him. It demands an absolute commitment that can be at odds

with the values and priorities of the world, and even with the expectations of one's own family. This division is not something Jesus desires for its own sake, but it is a necessary consequence of the choice between the kingdom of God and the kingdoms of this world.

Ultimately, this passage is a powerful call to radical discipleship. It forces us to confront the reality that following Jesus is not a comfortable or easy path. It

may require us to stand against the tide of popular opinion, and even to face opposition from those we love most.

Jesus is warning his followers that their loyalty to him must supersede all other loyalties—even the most sacred of family ties. This is not a call to abandon or disrespect our families, but to ensure that our primary allegiance is to Christ. This is a powerful and uncomfortable reminder that the gospel demands our all, and that the "peace" we seek is found not in avoiding conflict, but in faithfully following the one who embraced suffering for our salvation.
