Twenty-First Sunday in Ordinary Time Is. 66: 18-21; Heb 12:5-7, 11-13; Lk 13:22-30.

Today's Gospel passage focuses on the urgency of entering God's kingdom and the warning that not everyone will be able to do so. The passage presents a powerful and challenging message about salvation, effort, and the surprising nature of God's final judgment.

The passage begins with Jesus traveling toward Jerusalem, teaching as he goes. Someone asks

him, "Lord, will those who are saved be few?" Jesus does not give a direct number. Instead, he shifts the focus from a theological debate about quantity to a personal challenge about effort: "Strive to enter through the narrow door." The Greek word for "strive" is *agonizomai*, from which we get the word "agonize." It implies a struggle, a fight, and a serious effort. This isn't a passive request; it's a call to active, persistent

effort in following God's will. The door is "narrow" because it requires self-denial and a commitment to a life that may be contrary to the world's values.

Jesus warns that "many will seek to enter and will not be able." This is a stark warning against procrastination and the assumption that salvation is automatic. The people he is speaking to likely believe they are already "in" because they are part of God's chosen people. This takes away all kinds of presumption that being the member of the Catholic Church would guarantee the eternal life. Jesus shatters this presumption by telling a parable about a master of the house who locks the door. Those who knock on the door, saying, "We ate and drank with you, and you taught in our streets," are rejected.

This is a powerful indictment of superficial faith. It's not enough to be in the presence of Jesus or to participate in religious activities. The master's response—"I do not know where you come from"— is a terrifying statement. It's not about a lack of recognition but a lack of relationship. They had an acquaintance with him, but not a true, transformative connection. This highlights the difference between

an external, religious association and an internal, personal commitment. Jesus always looks for a personal relationship.

The passage concludes with a dramatic reversal of expectations. Jesus says, "people will come from east and west, and from north and south, and recline at table in the kingdom of God." This clearly speaks about the inclusion of people from all nations in the kingdom of God. The final line is the most

shocking: "And behold, some are last who will be first, and some are first who will be last."

This statement turns the social and religious order of the time on its head. Jesus is attacking the so called religious leaders who believed that they are God's chosen people for eternal life. Those who were considered "first", the religiously privileged Jews, might find themselves "last," while those who were "last", the marginalized and Gentiles might be "first." This serves as a powerful reminder that God's kingdom is not based on heritage or social status, but on a genuine relationship with God and a life of faithful obedience. The final judgment will reveal a surprising and humbling truth about who truly belongs to God's family.
