The Mission Statement of St. Paul the Apostle Catholic Church As disciples of Jesus Christ, we strive to grow in relationship with Him, live the Faith, and share His Good News with others.

### Eighteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time Eccl. 1:2, 2:21-23; Col 3:1-5, 9-11; Lk 12:13-21

Today's Gospel presents a powerful reflection on the dangers of covetousness and the deceptive nature of material wealth. In this passage, Jesus is approached by someone in the crowd who asks him to tell his brother to divide an inheritance. Jesus refused to act as a judge in this worldly dispute. He uses this opportunity for a deeper teaching, and to warn the crowd saying "Watch out! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; life

does not consist in an abundance of possessions".

This warning is then vividly illustrated through the parable of the rich fool. The man in the parable is blessed with an abundant harvest, so much so that his existing barns are insufficient. His solution is to tear down his old barns and build larger ones, congratulating himself on his foresight and promising himself years of ease, eating, drinking,

and merriment. He speaks to his soul as if it were a separate entity, something to be appeased and satisfied with earthly comforts.

However, his self-congratulation is unexpectedly shattered by the voice of God, who calls him a "fool." The rich man's meticulous planning for his future on earth is rendered utterly meaningless by the sudden intervention of death: "You fool! This very night your life will be demanded from you. Then who will get what you have prepared for yourself?" His vast accumulation of wealth, intended to secure his future, becomes utterly worthless in the face of eternity. He has no lasting legacy, no spiritual capital, and no true riches.

The parable concludes with Jesus' profound statement: "This is how it will be with whoever stores up things for themselves but is not rich toward God." This final verse is the crux of the passage. It's not the possession of wealth itself that is condemned, but the attitude toward it. The obsessive accumulation for oneself, the reliance on it for security, and the failure to recognize one's dependence on God and one's responsibility to use resources for His purposes make one's life meaningless.

> Why did God call the rich man 'fool'? He believed his wealth guaranteed him a secure future, which was an illusion. True security is found not in possessions but in a right relationship with God. The eternal truth is that death can come at any moment, and it brings an end to all earthly ambitions and possessions. Our focus should be on preparing for eternity rather than just for a comfortable earthly existence. Here Jesus challenges our common understanding of wealth. True

riches are not material but spiritual – a life lived in accordance with God's will, characterized by generosity, faith, and love. Being "rich toward God" means investing in eternal values, using our resources to build His kingdom and care for others.

Today's Gospel gives us a timeless and essential warning. It calls us to examine our priorities, to guard our hearts against the insidiousness of greed, and to remember that our true worth and ultimate destiny are found not in what we possess, but in who we are in relation to God. It challenges us to live with an eternal perspective, investing in what truly lasts, and being "rich toward God."






