St. Michael the Archangel, defend us in battle. Be our protection against the wickedness and snares of the devil; May God rebuke him, we humbly pray; And do thou, O Prince of the Heavenly Host, by the power of God, thrust into hell Satan and all evil spirits who wander through the world for the ruin of souls. Amen.



I believe we are all busy preparing for just another celebration of our Lord's Birthday. I myself have plenty of time to get ready spiritually, because I don't have so much to do as you do regarding getting ready all the stuff that are associated with Christmas (putting up decorations, making arrangements for family gatherings, cooking, buying and wrapping gifts, cleaning the house, just to name some of them). I pray every day not just for you as members of my parish family, but for you to also find time to slow down and spend some time with the Lord either in private prayer, or going to confession, or adora-

tion before the Blessed Sacrament, reading the Bible and spiritual books.

As many of you know, I like to share a story that can lift our spirits or give us opportunity to dig deeper into our souls. Here is just another one. It speaks of how important for us the friendship with Christ should be. It's a story about the priest who lives in Latvia. His name is Viktors. He had to go through difficult times when, after World War II, the Soviet communists forcibly imposed their communist rule on Latvia and other surrounding countries. Part of their policy was the systemic elimination of all religion. They arrested Protestant pastors, as well as Catholic priests and bishops, intimidated them, bribed them, and did everything they could to separate them from spreading faith in God among people. They even made it a crime to possess the Bible, which was considered an anti-Communist book.

Fr. Viktors was arrested for possessing the Bible. When they arrested him, the Soviet agents threw the Holy Scriptures on the floor, right in front of the priest. Then they ordered the priest to step on it as a sign of scorn for the Christian faith. But the priest refused. Instead, he knelt down and kissed the sacred book. For doing this, he was condemned to 10 years of hard labor in Siberia.

Ten years later, when Fr. Viktors returned to his parish and celebrated the holy Mass, he read the Gospel. Then he held up the lectionary and said, "The Word of God!" The parishioners cried and thanked God in the silence of their hearts - they did not dare to applaud him, because that would be taken as another provocation. Fr. Victors understood that the only lasting joy in life, the only thing worth living for, is friendship with Jesus Christ, which is nourished by God's inspired Word, and nothing was going to make him compromise that.

I am not worried about you who have friendship with Christ, a good relationship with Triune God. I am more concerned about all the others. Message of Christmas is especially for them. Some of them have never heard the Gospel - they think Christmas is about parties with big punch bowls and presents with big credit card debts. Others used to have faith, but they left it aside. For them, Advent and Christmas are bittersweet seasons: surrounded by so many signs of joy, when they look into their hearts they don't find any reason for joy, because they don't know Christ. God wants to do for them what he has already done for us; and he wants us to help Him. We can do this first of all by stirring up our own Christian joy - the devil wants to keep us so busy that we can't do that; let's outsmart him. Let's also reach out to someone who needs our joy so they can find hope in their troubled lives. Christmas acquires much more meaning to me when I witness people coming to their senses and find peace in returning to God and his Church.

Rose-colored vestments may be worn because rose is a liturgical color; a "brightening" of the ordinary violet and thus symbolizes joy

There will be no RE / FF classes on Sunday, December 24 and Sunday, December 31. Classes resume on the Solemnity of the Epiphany, Sunday, January 7, 2024. We hope to see all families at Mass during the Christmas season and beyond.

EUCHARISTIC REVIVAL AND SYNODALITY, TOGETHER





ARE YOU A CUBS FAN? OR ARE YOU A WHITE SOX FAN? If you have any roots in Chicagoland, you instinctively understand that you must declare one or the other. It is common practice to choose one team — one is never a fan of both!

During these past two years, throughout our country and within the Catholic Church, that same principle seems to have been applied to the National Eucharistic Revival and the Synod on Synodality. As you know, the Eucharistic Revival is a three-year initiative of the Church to enkindle a living relationship with Jesus Christ in the holy Eucharist. The Synod on Synodality is an international, multiyear undertaking during which Catholics give feedback and deeply listen to each other — so, as a Church, we can all discern together where the Holy Spirit is leading us.

Curiously, many people seem to be taking sides; they are in favor of one, but not the other.

The week before Thanksgiving, I joined over 250 bishops in Baltimore for a week of meetings hosted by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. We began the meetings with prayer, adoration, benediction, and Mass. The first address to the assembly was given by Cardinal Christophe Pierre, the Papal Nuncio. When it comes to the Eucharistic Revival and the Synod, he encouraged us to move away from an "either/or" approach, and to instead embrace and promote both. The special connections between the Eucharistic Revival and the Synod prevailed through our week of meetings.

At one point, Cardinal Pierre beautifully reflected on the road to Emmaus story from the Gospel of Luke (24: 13–35). Along their journey, the disciples debated their theological points of view while Jesus listened to them. "Listening, corresponds to the humble style of God," said the cardinal, quoting Pope Francis. "God loves humanity: that is why he addresses his word to them, and why he 'inclines his ear' to listen to them."

You see, *listening* is essential for a synodal Church because it is a dimension of love. Through this Emmaus moment, Jesus accompanies, listens, and discerns with His disciples. Then, their hearts were set on fire because they recognized His true presence in the Eucharist. After this Eucharistic encounter, they go

back to the other disciples and proclaim that Jesus is alive and — with missionary zeal — are committed to sharing the risen Christ with the world.

Cardinal Pierre concluded his presentation with these moving insights: "Our people need us to be adventurers for the Lord. They need us to be united with one another. They need to see how our diversity, harmonized, displays the beauty of the Church and of the Catholic faith. They need to be reminded that salvation comes not from one idea or another, but through a shared encounter with the living person of Jesus, who is love."

Most of us can agree we are a stronger Church when we both listen *and* keep the Eucharist as our source and summit. Let's look for ways to stay united with each other and with Christ.

From the onset, I announced that the Diocese of Joliet was going to participate in both the National Eucharistic Revival and the Synod on Synodality. Walking in numerous Eucharistic processions and attending many talks about the Eucharist, I am proud of how robustly our clergy and parishioners have promoted and embraced this Eucharistic Revival. I look forward to participating in our continued celebrations of the Eucharist in the Diocese of Joliet, and will joyfully attend the Eucharistic Congress in Indianapolis in July 2024. That event will launch us into the next phase of the revival by enthusiastically taking the Eucharistic Lord into the world and putting our faith into action as missionary disciples.

At the same time, I am also proud of how we have participated in the Synod on Synodality. For over six months, groups gathered throughout every deanery of our diocese to listen intently to each other. The themes from these listening sessions were gathered and compiled into a report sent to Rome. The first half of the synod concluded in the Vatican this October. With faithful hope, we await the next steps for the second half next October.

As a baseball fan, I am fiercely loyal to my team, while politely ignoring the other. Gratefully, that's not what our Church does when it comes to the National Eucharistic Revival and the Synod on Synodality. Like you, I love Jesus so much — especially in the Eucharist — and at the same time — through Him, with Him, and in Him — I desire a *listening* Church that calls us to be on mission! With faith and trust in God, I look forward to walking on this all-connected journey with you ahead.

AVIVAMIENTO EUCARÍSTICO Y SINODALIDAD, JUNTOS





¿ERES FAN DE LOS CUBS? ¿SIGUES A LOS WHITE SOX? Si tienes alguna raíz en la región metropolitana de Chicago, instintivamente comprenderás que debes inclinarte por uno u otro. Elegir uno de estos equipos es una práctica habitual, ¡no es posible seguir a ambos!

Durante estos dos últimos años, en todo nuestro país y en el seno de la Iglesia Católica, parece haberse aplicado ese mismo principio al Avivamiento Eucarístico Nacional y al Sínodo sobre la Sinodalidad. Como saben, el Avivamiento Eucarístico es una iniciativa de tres años de duración que lleva adelante la Iglesia para promover una relación viva con Jesucristo en la Sagrada Eucaristía. El Sínodo sobre la Sinodalidad es una iniciativa internacional de varios años durante los cuales los católicos dan a conocer sus opiniones y se escuchan atentamente entre sí —para que, como Iglesia, podamos discernir juntos hacia dónde nos guía el Espíritu Santo.

Extrañamente, muchas personas parecen tomar partido; están a favor de uno, pero no del otro.

La semana anterior a Acción de Gracias, me reuní con más de 250 obispos en Baltimore durante una semana de encuentros organizados por la Conferencia de Obispos Católicos de los Estados Unidos. Comenzamos las reuniones con oración, adoración, bendición y misas. El primer discurso ante la asamblea estuvo a cargo del Cardenal Christophe Pierre, nuncio papal. En lo que se refiere al Avivamiento Eucarístico y al Sínodo, nos propuso alejarnos de un enfoque de "uno u otro" y, en su lugar, abrazar y promover ambos. Las conexiones especiales entre el Avivamiento Eucarístico y el Sínodo prevalecieron a lo largo de nuestra semana de encuentros.

En un momento dado, el Cardenal Pierre hizo una hermosa reflexión sobre la historia del camino a Emaús que se menciona en el Evangelio según San Lucas (24:13–35). A lo largo de su viaje, los discípulos debatieron sus puntos de vista teológicos mientras Jesús los escuchaba. "La escucha corresponde al estilo humilde de Dios," dijo el cardenal, citando al Papa Francisco. "Dios ama al hombre: por eso le dirige la Palabra, por eso 'inclina el oído' para escucharlo."

Como ven, *la escucha* es esencial para una Iglesia sinodal, porque es una dimensión del amor. En este fragmento sobre el camino a Emaús, Jesús acompaña, escucha y discierne con sus discípulos. Entonces, sus corazones ardieron porque reconocieron su verdadera presencia en la Eucaristía. Tras este encuentro eucarístico, regresan con los demás discípulos y proclaman que Jesús está vivo y —

con celo misionero— se comprometen a compartir a Cristo resucitado con el mundo.

El Cardenal Pierre concluyó su presentación con estas conmovedoras reflexiones: Nuestro pueblo necesita que seamos aventureros para el Señor. Necesita que estemos unidos unos con otros. Necesita ver cómo nuestra diversidad armonizada refleja la belleza de la Iglesia y de la fe católica. Necesita que se le recuerde que la salvación no proviene de una idea u otra, sino de un encuentro compartido con la persona viva de Jesús, que es amor.

La mayoría de nosotros está de acuerdo en que somos una Iglesia más fuerte cuando escuchamos y mantenemos la Eucaristía como nuestra fuente y cumbre. Busquemos formas de permanecer unidos entre nosotros y con Cristo.

Desde el principio, anuncié que la Diócesis de Joliet iba a participar tanto en el Avivamiento Eucarístico Nacional como en el Sínodo sobre la Sinodalidad. Al participar en numerosas procesiones eucarísticas y asistir a muchas charlas sobre la Eucaristía, me siento orgulloso de la firmeza con la que nuestro clero y nuestros feligreses han promovido y abrazado este Reavivamiento Eucarístico. Espero participar en nuestras continuas celebraciones de la Eucaristía en la Diócesis de Joliet y asistiré con alegría al Congreso Eucarístico que se llevará a cabo en Indianapolis, en julio de 2024. Ese acontecimiento nos lanzará a la siguiente fase del avivamiento, llevando con entusiasmo al Señor Eucarístico al mundo y poniendo en práctica nuestra fe como discípulos misioneros.

Al mismo tiempo, también estoy orgulloso de la manera en que hemos participado en el Sínodo sobre la Sinodalidad. Durante más de seis meses, los grupos se reunieron en todos los decanatos de nuestra diócesis para escucharse atentamente unos a otros. Los temas de estas sesiones de escucha se recabaron y recopilaron en un informe que fue enviado a Roma. La primera mitad del Sínodo concluyó en el Vaticano el pasado mes de octubre. Con fe y esperanza, esperamos los próximos pasos para la segunda quincena del próximo mes de octubre.
