

St. Michael the Archangel, defend us in battle. Be our protection against the wickedness and snares of the devil; May God rebuke him, we humbly pray; And do thou, O Prince of the Heavenly Host, by the power of God, thrust into hell Satan and all evil spirits who wander through the world for the ruin of souls. Amen.



The mystery of our salvation includes the whole Bible, the whole life of Christ, and the whole history of the Church. But we can't possibly keep all those things in mind all the time. So we focus on different aspects of them at different times of the year. In Lent we focus on the reality of sin and mercy and the need for repentance; during Easter we focus on the power of God and the Resurrection; during Ordinary Time we focus on the everyday life and teachings of Christ and the wisdom they impart for our everyday lives; and now, during Advent, we focus on God's faithfulness. In the

middle of life's problems, we can sometimes forget to trust in God's promises. The example of the saints and martyrs is always there to remind us, putting our own difficulties in perspective, and giving us courage to trust God no matter what.

In 1987 Pope John Paul II beatified three nuns who were martyred during the Spanish Civil War, in 1936. When the communist soldiers took over their city of Guadalajara, the eighteen nuns in the convent of St Joseph scattered through the streets disguised in secular clothes. Sisters Maria of the Angels, Maria Pilar, and Teresa hid in the basement of the Hibernia Hotel. Two days later, they left the hotel to look for better shelter. A soldier eating lunch in a parked jeep saw them walking down the street, recognized them, and shouted to her companions: "Shoot them! They are nuns!" Sister Maria of the Angels died instantly with a bullet through her heart. Sister Maria Pilar, also hit, cried out, "Viva Cristo Rey (Long live Christ the King)!" The soldiers, furious at the pious exclamation, shot the unarmed nun repeatedly and slashed her with a knife. She died, having lost most of her blood, saying, "My God, pardon them. They don't know what they are doing." Sister Teresa was not harmed, and a soldier, pretending concern, gathered some of his companions and led Teresa to a nearby cemetery, apparently intending to rape her. As they went, she spoke out fearlessly against them, and they angrily insisted that she praise communism. To each of their commands, she cried, "Viva Cristo Rey!" Told to walk a few steps ahead, she spread her arms in the form of a cross and was shot in the back. These nuns outdid their captors in courage, mercy, and nobility, because they knew God well enough to know that he would keep his promises: "Even if you have to die, keep faithful, and I will give you the crown of life for your prize" (Revelation 2:10).

Most of us may not be ready to give such life-giving witness to our Lord but we can do a lot. As we begin this sacred season, let's make an at least an act of faith in letting God clean up our dark corners, so that we can **eniov his presence** as we prepare for the great commemoration of Christmas Day.



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

Our diocese will soon take up the national collection for the Retirement Fund for Religious. Your support for this collection December 9/10 provides financial assistance for retirement needs for 297 U.S. religious communities.

Catholic sisters, brothers and religious order priests—collectively known as women and men religious—have selflessly served for decades without significant financial compensation. However, due to escalating health-care costs, numerous U.S. religious communities face a substantial gap between their elderly members' needs and the financial resources available for their care. Many religious orders currently experience insufficient retirement savings.

The 2022 appeal demonstrated Catholics' tremendous generosity by raising \$27.6 million. Diocese of Joliet parishioners contributed \$286,788.25 to the collection.

The senior religious in our diocese never retire from their vows, and they play a crucial role in conveying the faith from one generation to the next. In their younger years, they laid the foundation for Catholic schools, hospitals, and works of mercy. Today, many serve in volunteer ministry as ongoing witnesses to the Gospel. Others are frail and need assistance, yet all remain wholly committed to their vocations by embracing the opportunity to spend more time praying for our Church and world.

Please support the retirement needs of our senior religious. And please join me in praying for God's continued blessing on our nation's elderly sisters, brothers, and religious order priests.

The Need is Great

- Religious communities are financially responsible for the support and care of all members.
- There are 24,005
 religious past age 70
 living in the United
 States. In 2022, the
 average annual cost for
 their care was roughly
 \$55,500 per person;
 skilled nursing care
 averaged \$82,700 per
 person.
- Since 2009, the annual cost to support senior women and men religious has exceeded \$1 billion.
- In 2022, 71 percent of the religious communities providing data to the National Religious Retirement Office had a median age of 70 or higher.
- The average annual Social Security benefit for a religious is \$7,679, whereas the average lay US beneficiary receives \$21,902.
