



OUR FASCINATING FAITH — Ashes

There are three major Biblical traditions concerning ashes: repentance, mourning, and mortality, and they are interrelated. Repeatedly throughout the Bible we encounter the use of ashes (often together with sackcloth) as a penitential practice. A similar practice is seen when someone is in mourning or distress. And ashes are a metaphor for human life, which is seen as brief and destined to end in death:

Ashes are the result of fire, the complete burning of something that was alive. They are ephemeral; the slightest puff of air can send them away into nothingness. It is easy to see how ashes came to symbolize fleeting human life or the humility of repentance.

Ashes can represent other things as well. For example, ashes are often used to fertilize our gardens and fields. Ash is therefore necessary to bring about and nourish life.

We can now begin to see how appropriate a symbol ashes are for the season of Lent. For Lent is not only a time of repentance, of sorrow for our sins. It is a baptismal season of preparation for the new life of our catechumens and of recalling the new life of our own baptism. We start Lent in ashes, and end it in Easter. What will the ashes mean to you this Lent?

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What every human heart needs to know is that we are loved by God even though we are sinners and don't deserve it. That makes the difference between a meaningful life and an empty life. Let me share with you an example of this truth as I recently read about certain event that happened 16 years ago. It was fall 2008. There was a high school football game in Texas. The game was played between Gainesville State School and Grapevine Faith Christian School. Grapevine Faith is a private Christian school. Gainesville State is a high school prison, a maximum-security state correctional facility for 285 teenage criminals. Gainesville State lost to Grapevine Faith 33-14 to



finish their season 0-9. But ever since that game, the Gainesville State campus hasn't been the same. Teacher Chris Styles put it concisely: after that game, he said, "The culture just switched." Why? Because of how Grapevine Faith hosted the players from the prison: they treated them like they would treat anybody and not like hopeless outcasts.

First, student fans at Grapevine Faith formed a 40-yard spirit line for the Gainesville players to run through before the start of the game. Then, half the Grapevine fans sat behind the Gainesville sideline and cheered them on - by numbers and even names - throughout the game. Grapevine Faith even loaned the Gainesville State Tornadoes their junior high cheerleaders. Gainesville lost, but they ended up scoring as many touchdowns in that one game as they had in their eight previous games combined.

Gainesville State became suddenly a different place. "It's like people's hearts have really changed," the superintendent explained. And not just the hearts of the inmates, but area residents too. They think of the correctional facility differently now; they encourage the young men there; they even come out to their games. All because a group of Christians decided to follow Christ's example and touch the leper instead of condemning him.

I understand that not everybody find that courage to really exemplify Christ's attitude in their lives. Pretty often, following Jesus's example of love and respect towards others, seems to be politically incorrect, if not just plain unreasonable (crazy) in the eyes of many. So I pray that we, proclaiming with our words to be Jesus's disciples, show it more often in our deeds.



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Throughout his pontificate, our Holy Father, Pope Francis, has often spoken of the need for Christians to evangelize others through accompaniment. Through listening patiently, building trust, and being mindful of others' dignity, we can help one another encounter Christ's merciful love, especially those who suffer from emotional wounds, loneliness, and doubt. For Central and Eastern Europeans living in countries that experienced 70 years of communist oppression, the Church especially needs to accompany people to an encounter with Christ that is patient, understanding, and filled with hope instead of fear, anger, and anxiety.

In Slovakia, the Alexis Counseling Center has accompanied nearly 2,500 women and their loved ones with devotion. Since 2010, the center has provided counseling to women experiencing the anxieties of an unplanned pregnancy or the grief of pregnancy loss, as well as to their partners, family members, and friends. In addition to promoting psychological healing, the center also helps vulnerable women who have experienced miscarriages and abortions to find housing, material and financial assistance, and support groups.

In Albania, lay people are preparing for lay ministries as catechists and extraordinary



ministers of Communion through a three-year study program that provides in-depth knowledge of the Gospel, the Church, and sacraments, liturgy, and spirituality. This formation program equips participants to be active, faith-filled agents of evangelization and accompaniment to those who desire to know Christ and the Church.

Ministries of accompaniment such as these are made possible with grant monies raised through the Ash Wednesday Collection for the Church in Central and Eastern Europe. When you participate in the collection, you help the Church in Slovakia, Albania, Ukraine and more than 24 other countries accompany people who still experience the hardships and wounds caused by communism. Your support for and promotion of the Collection for the Church in Central and Eastern Europe is crucial to the success of ministries that affirm the dignity of children, youth, and other vulnerable people and show them the love and mercy of Jesus.

Queridos hermanos y hermanas en Cristo,

A lo largo de su pontificado, nuestro Santo Padre, el papa Francisco, nos habla con frecuencia de la necesidad de los cristianos de evangelizar a los demás mediante el acompañamiento. Unos a otros, podemos ayudarnos a encontrar el amor misericordioso de Cristo, escuchando pacientemente, generando confianza y siendo conscientes de la dignidad de los demás, especialmente, de los que sufren debido a heridas emocionales, la soledad y las dudas. Para las personas en Europa Central y Oriental, que viven en países que pasaron 70 años bajo la opresión comunista, la Iglesia, especialmente, necesita acompañar a las personas a un encuentro con Cristo, un encuentro paciente, comprensivo y lleno de esperanza en vez de temor, ira y ansiedad.

En Eslovaquia, el *Alexis Counseling Center* ha acompañado devotamente a cerca de 2,500 mujeres y sus seres queridos. Desde el 2010, el centro ha brindado asesoramiento a mujeres que sufren las ansiedades de un embarazo no planificado o el dolor por la pérdida de un embarazo, así como a sus parejas, familiares y amigos. Además de promover la sanación psicológica, el centro ayuda también a mujeres vulnerables que experimentaron una pérdida o un aborto, a encontrar una vivienda, ayuda material y económica y grupos de apoyo.



En Albania, personas laicas se están preparando para ministerios laicos como catequistas y ministros extraordinarios de la comunión mediante un programa de estudios de tres años, el cual les proporciona un conocimiento profundo del Evangelio, la Iglesia, los sacramentos, la liturgia y la espiritualidad. Este programa de formación equipa a los participantes para ser agentes activos y llenos de fe para la evangelización y el acompañamiento de aquellos que desean conocer a Cristo y la Iglesia.

Los ministerios de acompañamiento, tales como estos, son posible con subvenciones del dinero recaudado a través de la Colecta del Miércoles de ceniza para la Iglesia en Europa Central y Oriental. Cuando ustedes participan en la colecta, están ayudando a la Iglesia en Eslovaquia, Albania, Ucrania y más de 24 otros países a acompañar a personas que aún están experimentando las penurias y las heridas causadas por el comunismo. El apoyo de ustedes y la promoción que le den a la Colecta para la Iglesia en Europa Central y Oriental es crucial para el éxito de los ministerios que afirman la dignidad de los niños, de la juventud y de otras personas vulnerables y les demuestran el amor y la misericordia de Jesús.

LENTEN REGULATIONS

- 1. Everyone 14 years of age or over is bound to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent.
- 2. All from the age of 18 years up to the beginning of their 60th year are bound to fast on Ash Wednesday & Good Friday.
- 3. On these two days of fast and abstinence, only one full meatless meal is allowed. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted on these two days, but liquids, including milk and fruit juices are allowed. When health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law does not oblige.
- 4. To disregard completely the law of fast and abstinence is sinful.
- 5. Lent is the principal season of penance in the Church year. Therefore, all of the faithful are strongly urged to develop and follow a program of voluntary self-denial. All Catholics are encouraged to support generously the charitable works of the whole Church, pray and perform works of charity and mercy.
- 6. Those who are sick, pregnant, or nursing, or whose health would adversely be affected by fasting or abstinence, should not consider themselves bound by these norms.
