





Epiphany Blessing

The Greek word “*Epiphanias*” means “surprise appearance”, i.e. appearance of the Lord, which was celebrated in the early Christian centuries on January 6. In the 4th century, this holiday was shifted to December 25, and January 6 obtained the name of The Three Kings (the “Wise Men,” the Magi), or simply Twelfth Day. According to an old legend based on a Bible story, these three kings saw, on the night when Christ was born, a bright star, followed it to Bethlehem and found there the Christ child. They presented him with gold, frankincense, and myrrh. On this day, the doorways would be sprinkled with holy water and the initials of the Three Kings – **C+M+B (Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar)** – plus the year are inscribed in chalk over doorways on the eve of January 6 to protect house and home. Although historically, the three letters are supposed to come from the Latin phrase “*Christus mansionem benedicat*” – “Christ bless this house.”

Epiphany of the Lord
Is 60:1-6; Eph 3:2-3a, 5-6; Mt 2:1-12

The very word "Epiphany" comes from the Greek 'epiphaneia', meaning "manifestation" or "showing forth." It marks the moment Christ's light was revealed to the Gentile world, represented by the Magi. Once the Christ is born, the God of Israel is not just for the people of Israel, but for all nations.

Today as we reflect on the Epiphany of the Lord, we need to focus on its core themes: the journey, the adoration, and the gifts. The story of the Magi is a powerful parable for every person's journey of faith. It is seeking God's Light. The Magi were "wise men from the East"—foreign scholars, possibly astronomers or astrologers—who followed a celestial sign. Their journey teaches us about the determination and cost of seeking God.

The star was not a local phenomenon; it was a 'Sign for the World.' It spoke to those outside the Jewish nation, fulfilling the prophecy that all nations would walk by God's light (Is 60:3). It shows that God calls people from every culture, background, and path of knowledge. The Magi left comfort and certainty to follow a celestial sign into the unknown. They faced a difficult journey, risked the political intrigue of King Herod, and were guided only by faith. This requires great courage and determination. When the star seemed to disappear, they sought guidance from the Scriptures in Jerusalem. This shows the importance of using reason and revelation (the Star and the Scriptures) in our search for God. We need to leave our comfort zone and face the challenges and difficulties in our journey to find a deeper encounter with Christ.



When the Magi finally arrived, they did not find a palace or a powerful king, but a child in a humble house. Their knowledge and the guidance of internal senses told them that this is the king they are searching for. Their reaction provides the ultimate model of worship. Despite the humble setting, they recognized the Child's divine royalty. True faith allows us to see God's glory even when it is wrapped in poverty and vulnerability. *"They prostrated themselves and did him homage."* (Matthew 2:11). They fell down in total, humble surrender. Their act of worship was complete—they offered their minds, their bodies, and their treasures to the Christ Child. In other words, they surrendered themselves totally to this king, who is the Lord of all. When we encounter Christ—in prayer, in the Eucharist, in the poor—we too must have the same profound reverence and total submission. Adoration is not just kneeling; it is the humble acknowledgment that Jesus is King of our entire life.

The three gifts Gold, Frankincense, and Myrrh are not just treasures, but profound symbols of Jesus' identity and our personal offering. It is not enough to simply worship; we are called to give Him our entire lives: our King (gold), our God (frankincense), and our Redeemer (myrrh). The Epiphany invites us to be like the Magi: constantly seeking Christ, humbly worshipping Him when we find Him, and offering Him the entirety of our lives.
