

WHY DO WE VEIL IMAGES?

The practice of veiling images alerts us that something is different, it can be startling at first, but the last two weeks of Lent are a time of immediate preparation for the celebration of the Sacred Triduum. The veils are hard to miss and they serve as a reminder to get ready!



The veiled images

build within us a longing for Easter Sunday. The veils seem out of place, and even counterintuitive. It can seem strange that images are covered up during Passiontide. Through this absence of images, our senses are heightened and we become more aware of what is missing. Similarly, the suppression of the Alleluia during Lent effectively demonstrates that we are in exile from our true Home, where the angels sing Alleluia without ceasing.

When images are unveiled before the Easter Vigil, we are reminded that we, in a sense, live in a veiled world. It is through our own death that we are able to see our true home, and the veil is lifted. Christ lifts the veil through His Resurrection.


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PALM SUNDAY of the PASSION of the LORD

Season of Lent was meant to prepare us to be amazed of what God did for us in order to redeem us from the grip of evil and everlasting death. He didn't just ask us to change our ways from wrongdoing into righteousness, but He became one of us and showed us the way, so we can follow it. He didn't crumple up the fallen world like a rough draft, throw it into the trash, and start again. No, He "emptied himself" coming down into the mess of this sinful world. He took upon himself the suffering and pain that mankind had unleashed through its sins, even though He himself had never sinned.



Imagine a man carrying an important message through the jungle. Off the path he sees something moving through the trees. It shines like gold. He doesn't want to leave the path, because the message is urgent, and the jungle is dangerous - there are tribes of cannibals around. But then he sees the flashing gold again. His curiosity is piqued. He wants the gold. He abandons his mission, leaves the path, and goes after the gold. He follows it far from the path. Suddenly he feels the ground beneath him give way. It's an enemy's trap. He finds himself in a pit. The walls are too sheer for him to climb. They are too high for him to pull himself out. He is doomed. This is Adam from the garden of Eden. He had been given a mission by God, to fill and cultivate the earth. But lured by the devil, he had abandoned his mission and his God and had thrown mankind into the pit of sin.

Now imagine another man finding the pit with Adam inside. He can't save Adam with his arm or with a branch, because the walls are too slippery and high. So he climbs down into the pit himself. Now the trapped man can climb onto his shoulders, reach the edge of the pit, and escape. But the second man has to stay behind. This second man is Christ. He came among us and freely took upon himself our own sufferings, restoring our friendship with God and giving us a fresh chance to fulfill our mission. We can continue climbing on Jesus' shoulders because, even though He suffered and died for our sins, He rose from the dead and as Risen Lord is always there for us. Evil and death has no more power over us. This is the victory we celebrate.

We all have an opportunity to relive this again in the services of Holy Triduum, not just only His Resurrection on Easter Day but also His Last Supper on Holy Thursday (7pm) and His Passion and Death on Good Friday (7pm). On Holy Saturday we have an extended celebration of Easter Vigil (7:30pm). Even though it's longer than Masses on Easter Sunday, it's worth to go to it, because it's so much more profound experience. I encourage you to come and celebrate these with the rest of our parish family.

OUR FASCINATING FAITH The Sacred Paschal Triduum

Christians observe Easter on the first Sunday after the first full moon that follows the vernal equinox. For Christians, Easter is the anniversary of the creation of the world.

Did you know that the full moon rises just as the sun sets? And that it sets when the sun rises? On the night of a full moon there is no moment of the night when the moon isn't shining. Christians think that this phenomenon makes a wonderful image of heaven's perpetual light. Easter is our sacramental entrance into the light of Christ, the light of eternity.

The Sacred Paschal Triduum, the three-day Passover of the Lord, is our Easter festival. It begins on Holy Thursday at sunset. We count the days in the Jewish manner, from sunset to sunset. In this way the Triduum begins on the biblical "sixth day of the week," the day God created human beings. Its middle day is the "seventh day of the week," the Sabbath, the day of rest. And its final day is the "first day of the week," the day God began the work of creation by creating light and separating it from darkness. God the Father chose a "first day" to raise his Son from the dead. God the Spirit gave birth to the Church on a "first day" as well, the day of Pentecost.

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St. Michael the Archangel, defend us in battle. Be our protection against the wickedness and snares of the devil; May God rebuke him,



we humbly pray; And do thou, O Prince of the Heavenly Host, by the power of God, thrust into hell Satan and all evil spirits who wander through the world for the ruin of souls. Amen.
