2026 Youth Formation Summer Internship – Diocese of Joliet, Crest Hill, IL

The Department of Catechesis & Evangelization in the Diocese of Joliet is offering an 8-week summer internship for four (4) adults aged 21 and up. The purpose is to support youth formation programming across the diocese, while helping the interns learn more about diocesan and parish structures to better discern where God may be calling them in the life of the church. Responsibilities will include participating in trainings, department meetings, and other relevant events. Will help to lead formation events, one overnight retreat for high school youth, and one



youth conference for high school youth. Interns will research a project on a ministry area of interest, will perform clerical work as needed and other duties as assigned. The internship will begin on Monday, June 1, 2026, and conclude on Friday, July 24, 2026. The interns will report to the Department of Catechesis and Evangelization and be expected to work during office hours at the Blanchette Catholic Center: 8am to 4:30pm Monday through Thursday, and 8am to 1pm on Fridays. Applications will be accepted until April 15, 2026, and the four (4) openings will be filled on a rolling basis, first-come, first-served for qualified candidates.

Thirty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time Mal 3:19-20a; 2Thes 3:7-12; Lk 21:5-19

The First Reading from Malachi is a powerful, climactic passage that concludes the prophetic message with a vivid image of ultimate separation and final jus-

tice. It addresses the ancient struggle of faith: the confusion and discouragement felt when the wicked seem to prosper and serving God feels pointless.

"The Day is Coming" refers to the Day of the LORD and is a recurring prophetic theme signifying God's direct intervention in history to execute justice. It is a day of reckoning. The phrase 'Burning Like a Furnace' is an image of purifying and destructive heat. This is not a gentle correction; it is a final, comprehensive judgment that separates

the worthy from the worthless. This is a sobering reminder that God will not ignore unrepentant injustice and arrogance forever. It compels us to examine our own life: do our actions align with the fleeting prosperity of the proud, or are we striving for the lasting righteousness that honors God? It validates the suffering of the faithful, assuring them that the apparent temporary victory of the wicked is a mirage soon to vanish in the light of God's justice.

"The Sun of Righteousness" is the beautiful, central image of hope. It is widely interpreted as a direct messianic prophecy referring to Jesus Christ. Just as the physical sun brings light, warmth, and life, the Messiah brings perfect divine justice and salvation.

Today's Gospel passage gives the prediction of the end of world. It explains a framework for faithful endurance in the midst of real-world trials, both personal and global. The splendor of the Temple is a symbol of Jewish identity, worship, and God's presence. Jesus' prediction that "not one stone will be left on another" is a radical statement asserting that no earthly institution or structure is permanent. Jesus warns his disciples about false messiahs, wars, natural disasters, and pandemics events that cause fear and instability. He clarifies that these events are part of the world's reality but do not immediately signify "the end." Jesus' command "Do not be terrified" is an

invitation to spiritual calm. Jesus warns that following him will bring persecution, betrayal even by family members, and hatred. Persecution isn't just a trial to be survived; it is an opportunity for you to bear witness. Our suffering for Christ's sake becomes a powerful platform for sharing the Gospel.

Jesus promises to give his followers the strength to endure sufferings and persecution. Our preparation should be spiritual faithfulness. The passage culminates in the powerful assurance: "By your endurance you will gain your souls." This is the heart

of the message, it is not to avoid suffering, but to remain faithful through it. Endurance is not passive waiting; it is active, persistent trust in God's ultimate victory. Our focus should shift from when the end will come to how I will live now. I am called to turn away from dependence on temporary things. Reject fear and deception when the world seems to be falling apart. View suffering not as a curse, but as a crucible for testimony and a chance to experience the Holy Spirit's immediate help. The ultimate promise is not a life without trouble, but a life secured forever through steadfast endurance in Christ.

U.S. Bishops Issue a "Special Message" on Immigration

BALTIMORE, NOVEMBER 12, 2025—As the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) gathered for their Fall Plenary Assembly in Baltimore, the bishops issued a Special Message addressing their concern for the evolving situation impacting immigrants in the United States. It marked the first time in twelve years the USCCB invoked this particularly urgent way of speaking as a body of bishops. The last one is sued in 2013 was in response to the federal government's contraceptive mandate.

Under the regulations pertaining to statements and publication sof the Conference, a "Special Message" may only be issued at plenary assemblies, and they are statements which the President of the Conference, the Administrative Committee, or the general membership consider to be appropriate in view of the circumstances at the time. To show the consensus of the body, a Special Message must receive two-thirds of the Conference members present and voting at the plenary in order to pass. In a vote of 216 votes in favor, 5 votes against, and 3 abstentions, the bishops overwhelmingly approved the Special Message, with sustained applause of the body following the vote. The full text of the bishops' Special Pastoral Message follows:

As pastors, we the bishops of the United States are bound to our people by ties of communion and compassion in Our Lord Jesus Christ. We are disturbed when we see among our people a climate of fear and anxiety around questions of profiling and immigration enforcement. We are saddened by the state of contemporary debate and the vilification of immigrants. We are concerned about the conditions in detention centers and the lack of access to pastoral care.

We lament that some immigrants in the United States have arbitrarily lost their legal status. We are troubled by threats against the sanctity of houses of worship and the special nature of hospitals and schools. We are grieved when we meet parents who fear being detained when taking their children to school and when we try to console family members who have already been separated from their loved ones.

Despite obstacles and prejudices, generations of immigrants have made enormous contributions to the well-being of our nation. We as Catholic bishops love our country and pray for its peace and prosperity. For this very reason, we feel compelled now in this environment to raise our voices in defense of God-given human dignity.

Catholic teaching exhorts nations to recognize the fundamental dignity of all persons, including immigrants. We bishops advocate for a meaning ful reform of our nation's immigration laws and procedures. Human dignity and national security are not in conflict. Both are possible if people of good will work together.

We recognize that nations have a responsibility to regulate their borders and establish a just and orderly immigration system for the sake of the common good. Without such processes, immigrants face the risk of trafficking and other forms of exploitation. Safe and legal pathways serve as an antidote to such risks.

The Church's teaching rests on the foundational concern for the human person, as created in the image and likeness of God (Genesis 1:27). As pastors, we look to Sacred Scripture and the example of the Lord Himself, where we find the wisdom of God's compassion. The priority of the Lord, as the Prophets remind us, is for those

who are most vulnerable: the widow, the orphan, the poor, and the stranger (Zechariah 7:10). In the Lord Jesus, we see the One who became poorfor our sake (2 Corinthians 89), we see the Good Samaritan who lifts us from the dust (Luke 10:30–37), and we see the One who is found in the least of these (Matthew 25). The Church's concern for neighbor and our concern here for immigrants is a response to the Lord's command to love as He has loved us (John 13:34).

To our immigrant brothers and sisters, we stand with you in your suffering, since, when one member suffers, all suffer (cf. 1 Corinthians 12:26). You are not alone!

We note with gratitude that so many of our clergy, consecrated religious, and lay faithful already accompany and assist immigrants in meeting their basic human needs. We urge all people of good will to continue and expand such efforts.

We oppose the indiscriminate mass deportation of people. We pray for an end to dehumanizing rhetoric and violence, whether directed at immigrants or at law enforcement. We pray that the Lord may guide the leaders of our nation, and we are grateful for past and present opportunities to dialogue with public and elected officials. In this dialogue, we will continue to advocate for meaningful immigration reform.

As disciples of the Lord, we remain men and women of hope, and hope does not disappoint! (cf. Romans S: S) May the mantle of Our Lady of Guadalupe enfold us all in her maternal and bying care and draw us ever closer to
