Twenty-Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time Kgs 5:14-17; 2Tm 2:8-13; Lk 17:11-19

The story of the ten lepers in today's Gospel is a rich passage that offers several profound themes for reflection, focusing on faith, obedience, and especially gratitude.



All ten lepers demonstrated an initial act of faith by crying out to Jesus for mercy. Their faith, however, was most clearly manifested in their obedience to his seemingly illogical command: "Go, show yourselves to the priests." At the time Jesus spoke, they were still lepers and had not yet been healed. Going to the priests was a legal requirement after a leper was cleansed, for the priest to declare them clean and allow them back into society (Levi 14:1–3). Even before their healing they trusted and obeyed the words of Jesus. Their healing happened on the way, confirming that their obedience was an expression of their trust in Jesus' words. The result of obedience to the will of God is something greater than we expect. Obeying God's commands even when we can't yet see the result is the manifestation of our faith.

The central point of the passage is the contrast in response after the healing. Only one man, a Samaritan, returned to Jesus. He didn't just feel thankful; he acted on it by turning back, glorifying God with a loud voice, and falling at Jesus' feet, thanking him. The other nine, having received their physical blessing, simply continued on their way to the priests to complete the ritual and re-enter their lives. They moved on as if the healing was something they deserve. This makes us think about the many blessings we received but the question remains, did we thank him? Did I return to him with gratitude? Do we stop at simply receiving a blessing, or do we return to the Giver with gratitude? Is our thankfulness an act of public worship and humility, or merely a private feeling?

Jesus' final words to the Samaritan are crucial: "Rise and go; your faith has made you well." All ten men were physically healed, but only the Samaritan who returned in grateful faith was described as being made well or saved. The Greek word Jesus used is $s\bar{o}z\bar{o}$, which can mean to save, heal, or make whole. This implies that the Samaritan received a double miracle: physical healing as well as spiritual wholeness/salvation through his active faith expressed in gratitude. Most of us are happy if we get a physical healing which we ask for. We are to look for our inner healing as well as our temporal "gifts." Do we pray for our inner healing which makes us whole?

Evangelist Luke often highlights Jesus' compassion for the marginalized. Lepers were already social outcasts, but the returning man was a Samaritan, a foreigner and enemy to the Jews. His double marginalization makes his return even more significant. He was less likely to be "expected" to be faithful or grateful, yet he was the one who was. This points to the expansive nature of God's grace, which reaches across all social, racial, and religious boundaries.
