


to pick up any donation you may have.

#### Twenty-Ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time Ex 17:8-13; 2Tm 3:14-4:2; Lk 18:1-8

Today's Gospel is often called "The Parable of the Persistent Widow," is a powerful teaching on the necessity of constant and unwavering prayer. The passage

begins with Jesus' explicit purpose for the parable: "to show them that they should always pray and not give up". Prayer is a discipline of persistence and faith. The widow's ceaseless pleas eventually wear down the judge, a man who "neither feared God nor cared what people thought". Her success illustrates that if persistence works with a bad judge, how much more will it work with a good God?

Unjust Judge is an example of human corruption, acting only out of self-interest. He grants justice only to be rid of the nuisance. Jesus contrasts this "unjust judge" with God, who is inherently just and eager to vindicate His "chosen ones". If the judge grants a request he is reluctant to grant, imagine how readily God will respond when He desires to grant it. The lesson is that God is not like the judge; He is not put off by our prayer, nor does He need to be pestered. It reminds us that our cries for justice and deliverance—whether personal or global—are not unheard or ignored.

The parable ends with a sobering, penetrating question: "However, when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on the earth?" This shifts the focus from God's faithfulness to human faithfulness. The greatest challenge is not God's willingness to answer, but our capacity to keep praying and believing while waiting.

The widow's persistence is a metaphor for a deep, abiding faith that refuses to be discouraged by silence or

delay. It challenges us to reflect: are we maintaining that persistent, simple, demanding faith, or do we "give up" when answers do not arrive on our timeline? The persistence is not meant to change God's mind, but to change our heart, shaping it into one that truly trusts in God's timetable and goodness, despite the waiting.

This passage calls us to: (1) Pray without ceasing for spiritual and temporal needs. (2) Trust in God's perfect character, knowing He is the opposite of the judge—He is good. (3) Continue the wait, letting persistence be the proof of genuine faith

Today is World Mission Sunday. The Church is, by nature, missionary. It is not just about what a few people do "overseas," but about the call each baptized person receives to proclaim

the Good News—through prayer, sacrifice, and the witness of a loving life. It reminds us of three things. (i) Renewed Commitment: Recommitting ourselves to sharing God's love and salvation with those who have not yet encountered it, both far away and right in our own communities. (ii) Solidarity: Uniting in prayer and financial support for the vital work of missionaries and the young, poor, or persecuted local Churches around the world. (iii) Holistic Mission: Recognizing that mission involves both spiritual proclamation and responding to human needs through loving service—bringing the Gospel and hope to those facing poverty, conflict, and injustice.

In short, Mission Sunday challenges us to look beyond ourselves and participate actively in God's mission to bring the light of the Gospel to the whole world.


