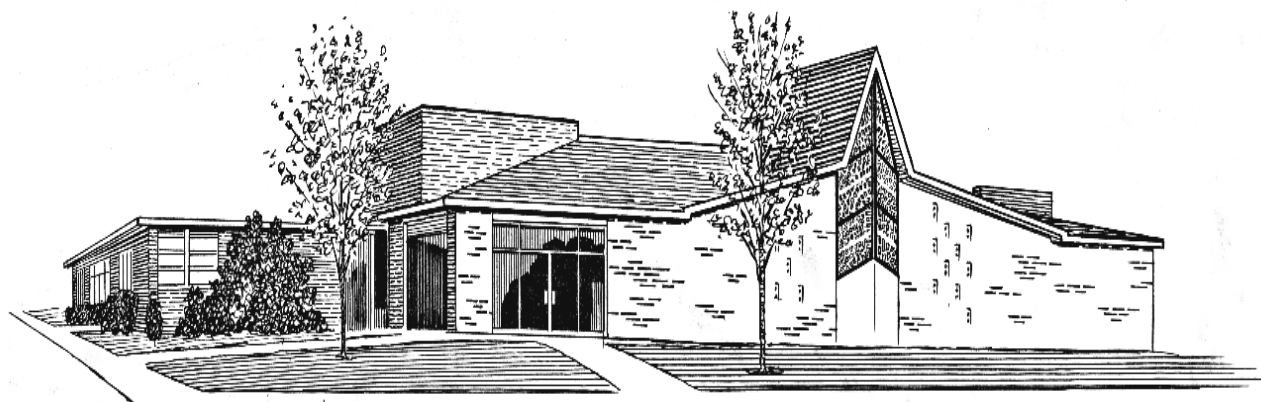

This month, parishes around the Diocese will conduct the **"October count,"** a measure of attendance at Sunday Mass. The measure has been taken for many centuries, and in some European dioceses it is possible to measure the level of engagement in worship by the population over the course of many centuries. Long ago, it was also the custom to track "Easter duty" by a statistical report. Penitents would receive a kind of chit at confession, which they would then turn in at their parish church when they received Holy Communion during Easter time.

Long ago, of course, Communion was fairly rare in the life of a Catholic Christian, perhaps only once a year. The chits would be tallied by parish priests and reported to the chancery, which in turn would hold on to the records and include the statistics in a report to the Vatican every five years. Nowadays, the **October count** has proved especially critical in the life of our Church as bishops use the figures to measure the vitality of church life, to sketch parish boundaries, and even to decide when to close, merge, or form new parishes.

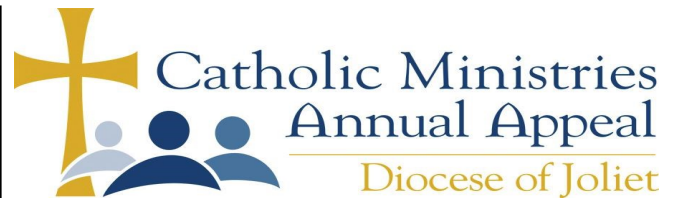

A Pastoral Letter for the People

When I arrived as your bishop five years ago, I laid out a vision of catechesis, evangelization, and faith into action, emphasizing that a thriving Church is one where we truly know, love, and serve God. The big question remains: how do we actually do that? How do we move from just having a vision to putting it into real practice?

This is why I wrote the pastoral letter *MAKE!* and launched it just this month. It builds on [Bishop Conlon's 2018 pastoral letter GO!](#), which draws on the Great Commission in Matthew's Gospel ([Matthew 28](#)): "Go and make disciples." *MAKE!* vulnerably reflects my heart. I love Jesus, and I want you to love Him too. It expresses my desire to give everyone a practical, loving roadmap to becoming disciples and making disciples, with a hands-on guide for passing our faith from one generation to the next.

Right before publishing it, I have to admit that I was filled with some self-doubt. I wondered, "There are so many other issues I could be writing about: the Eucharist, Pro-Life concerns, Vocations, Care of Creation, Immigration, Violence, and more. Is making disciples really the best topic?"

The Holy Spirit answered that question for me last month during a meeting at the headquarters of the [United States Conference of Catholic Bishops \(USCCB\)](#) in Washington, D.C. Our committee was presented with the results of a large national survey of thousands of priests across the country. One question asked, "Out of all the issues in the world, which one most needs to be addressed by our Church?" The number one response from priests nationwide was clear: passing the faith on to the next generation.

The statistician went on to explain that this does not mean priests consider the other issues unimportant. Rather, they recognize that if we do not have people in the pews, if this generation and the next are not alive in their faith and participating in the life of the Church, then all of those other issues will

eventually lose their voice in the Church. We first need to form disciples who are rooted in Christ, so that they in turn can carry the mission forward and address these other urgent concerns with faith and courage.

This is why *MAKE!* is so important. It is not just another document, and it is certainly not meant to sit on a shelf and collect dust. It is a living invitation to every Catholic in our diocese to move from simply managing decline to boldly embracing mission. We all want to belong to a Church that is alive, thriving, and centered on the salvation of souls. That future depends on how seriously we take this call to be made into disciples so that we can go out and make disciples.

The letter offers a clear path: conversion, confession, communion, commission, all held together by prayer. These are not abstract concepts but real, concrete steps that anyone can begin today. I both invite and urge you to read the letter. And then read it again. Pray over it, discuss it with your family, your friends, or a group in your parish. Choose one small action and begin.

If each of us takes this seriously, with the guidance of the Holy Spirit, the Diocese of Joliet can become a Church on fire with love for Jesus. Boldly, I want our diocese to be the most evangelizing diocese in the country, not out of competition, but because I love Jesus, and I want you to love Him and be saved through Him too. This is our time, and this is our mission. Let us first be disciples, men and women of all ages who know, love, and serve Jesus, so that together we can go out with joy and courage to *MAKE* disciples, starting now.

HACER

Cuando llegué como su obispo hace cinco años, presenté una visión de catequesis, evangelización y fe en acción, enfatizando que una Iglesia próspera es aquella en la que verdaderamente conocemos, amamos y servimos a Dios. La gran pregunta sigue siendo: ¿cómo lo hacemos realmente? ¿Cómo pasamos de tener una visión a ponerla en práctica?

Es por eso que escribí la carta pastoral *HACER!* y la lancé este mes. Se basa en la carta pastoral del obispo Conlon de 2018 *GO!*, que se basa en la Gran Comisión del Evangelio de Mateo (*Mateo 28*): "Id y haced discípulos." *HACER!* refleja mi corazón de manera vulnerable. Amo a Jesús, y quiero que tú también lo ames. Expresa mi deseo de darles a todos una ruta práctica y amorosa para convertirse en discípulos y hacer discípulos, con una guía práctica para transmitir nuestra fe de una generación a la siguiente.

Justo antes de publicarlo, tengo que admitir que estaba lleno de algunas dudas. Me pregunté: "Hay tantos otros temas sobre los que podría estar escribiendo: la Eucaristía, las preocupaciones Pro-Vida, las Vocaciones, el Cuidado de la Creación, la Inmigración, la Violencia y más. ¿Hacer discípulos será realmente el mejor tema?"

El Espíritu Santo me respondió esa pregunta el mes pasado durante una reunión en la sede de la Conferencia de Obispos Católicos de los Estados Unidos (USCCB) en Washington, D.C. A nuestro comité se le presentaron los resultados de una gran encuesta nacional de miles de sacerdotes en todo el país. Una pregunta era: "De todos los problemas del mundo, ¿cuál es el que más necesita ser dirigido por nuestra Iglesia?" La respuesta número uno de los sacerdotes de todo el país fue clara: transmitir la fe a la próxima generación.

El estadístico continuó explicando que esto no significa que los sacerdotes consideren que los otros temas no son importantes. Más bien, reconocen que si no tenemos personas en las bancas, si esta generación y la siguiente no están vivas en su fe y

no participan en la vida de la Iglesia, entonces todos esos otros temas eventualmente perderán su voz en la Iglesia. Primero necesitamos formar discípulos que estén arraigados en Cristo, para que ellos a su vez puedan llevar adelante la misión y abordar estas otras preocupaciones urgentes con fe y valentía.

Es por eso que *HACER!* es muy importante. No es un documento más, y ciertamente no está destinado a sentarse en un estante y acumular polvo. Es una invitación viva a todos los católicos de nuestra diócesis para que pasen de simplemente manejar el declive a abrazar audazmente la misión. Todos queremos pertenecer a una Iglesia viva, próspera y centrada en la salvación de las almas. Ese futuro depende de qué tan en serio tomemos este llamado a convertirnos en discípulos para que podamos salir y hacer discípulos.

La carta ofrece un camino claro: conversión, confesión, comunión, comisión, todo unido por la oración. Estos no son conceptos abstractos, sino pasos reales y concretos que cualquiera puede comenzar hoy. Le invito a leer la carta. Y luego la lea de nuevo. Ore por ello, discútalo con su familia, sus amigos o un grupo de su parroquia. Elija una pequeña acción y comience.

Si cada uno de nosotros toma esto en serio, con la guía del Espíritu Santo, la Diócesis de Joliet puede convertirse en una Iglesia encendida de amor por Jesús. Audazmente, quiero que nuestra diócesis sea la diócesis más evangelizadora del país, no por competencia, sino porque amo a Jesús, y quiero que lo amen y se salven a través de Él también. Este es nuestro momento y esta es nuestra misión. Seamos primero discípulos, hombres y mujeres de todas las edades que conocen, aman y sirven a Jesús, para que juntos podamos salir con alegría y valentía a HACER discípulos, a partir de ahora.

Twenty-Seventh Sunday in OT
Hb 1:2-3; 2:2-4; 2Tm 1:6-8, 13-14; Lk 17:5-10

The passage begins with the apostles asking Jesus to "Increase our faith!" They recognize a need for greater spiritual capacity to follow his demanding teachings, particularly those on forgiveness that precede this section. Jesus' response, however, is striking. He doesn't say their faith is too small; instead, he emphasizes the immense power of even the smallest amount of true faith: "If you had faith like a mustard seed, you could say to this mulberry tree, 'Be uprooted and planted in the sea,' and it would obey you." The mustard seed is a common biblical metaphor for something tiny that possesses the potential for extraordinary growth. The mulberry tree has deep roots, making it an image of the impossible or the deeply entrenched.

This teaching suggests that the issue is not the quantity of faith, but its quality and direction. Faith, even if minute, when placed fully in God, has the power to overcome obstacles that appear insurmountable. Our focus should not be on having a lot of faith, but on using the faith we do have to connect with God's limitless power. True faith, like a seed, has inherent, powerful life within it.

Jesus then shifts to a parable about the relationship between a servant and his master to illustrate the proper attitude toward service and reward. The master does not thank the servant for doing what was commanded, nor does the servant expect gratitude after a day of work. Instead, the servant prepares his master's meal first and then eats: "So you also, when you have done everything you were commanded to do, should say, 'We are unworthy servants; we have only done what was our duty.'"

This parable challenges the human tendency toward self-congratulation and entitlement in spiritual life. Jesus emphasizes that serving God is not a transaction where we earn favor or credit; it is a duty that flows naturally from our relationship with Him as Creator and Lord. When we serve, we are not doing God a favor; we are simply fulfilling the purpose for which we were created.

Last Sunday I mentioned that Bishop Hicks has written a pastoral letter for the diocese of Joliet. This letter called, *MAKE*. The title comes directly from the Great Commission: "Go and make disciples." Bishop Hicks is encouraging all of us, the members of the Diocese of Joliet, as Paul encouraged Timothy in today's second reading, to do the same.

This is to deepen our own discipleship and to help others encounter Christ. Bishop Hicks gives us a roadmap with four clear steps: **conversion, confession, communion, and commission, all held together by prayer.** These are not abstract ideas. They are real practices that we can begin right now in our daily lives.

Recently, Bishop Hicks shared the results of a national survey of thousands of priests. The number one priority identified was clear: passing the faith on to the next generation. This does not mean other issues are unimportant. In fact, October is filled with major concerns for Catholics: Respect Life Month, the Season of Creation, and the World Day of Migrants and Refugees. But if we want to be a Church alive enough to address these urgent issues with strength and conviction, we need to strengthen our own faith.

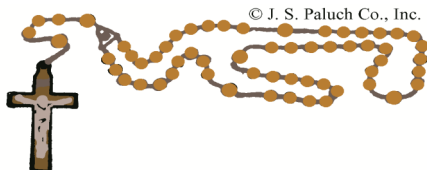
