### FEBRUARY 4, 2024 FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

A message from our pastor Fr. Robert Ni Ni, MF

In today's scripture readings, we see the striking contrast between Job's frustrations and Jesus' enthusiastic ministry. Most likely, you can relate to both emotions! Job complains about the drudgery and futility of life, yet God gives him the grace to offer up his suffering. Eventually, Job realizes that God has a greater plan for his life, and the suffering will end. Likewise, Jesus overturns human suffering to heal and bring hope to the people of His time - and today.

## **Selfless Service & Solitary Prayer**

In the second reading, St. Paul tells of his selfless service to answer Jesus' call to spread the Gospel. Lastly, in today's Gospel, St. Mark describes a day in the life of Jesus which involves selfless acts of healing and teaching. The following morning, Jesus goes to a quiet place for solitary prayer.

## **Recharge Your Spiritual Life**

I see a few themes in today's scripture passages. First, we are all called to look beyond ourselves. By unselfishly serving others like Jesus did, we share God's love, mercy, and forgiveness. Second, by seeking God's healing touch, we help ourselves and others heal, so we all can live life to the fullest. Third, if we have a zeal for God's glory, life is dynamic and exciting - not dull. Lastly, when we make time for solitary prayer, we recharge our spiritual life so we can continue to grow in relationship with God and others.

# **Embrace Jesus' Teachings**

I pray that you take these messages to heart and earnestly embrace Jesus' teachings. This week, find ways to demonstrate healings and selfless service to others. Also, find a quiet place to pray and spend time with Jesus.

# Understanding the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick

The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is for people who are very ill, old, or dealing with big health problems. This includes people who are baptized in the Catholic faith and need spiritual strength and grace during their illness.

It can be given before surgery, to elderly people who are very weak, and to sick children who can understand and benefit from it. It can also be given to those who have lost consciousness or the ability to think but would have wanted it. Also, people with serious mental illness who would be strengthened by the sacrament can receive it.

The purpose of this sacrament is to offer a special grace to those going through the difficulties of serious illness or old age. It aims to connect the sick with the suffering, death, and resurrection of Christ, providing them with the healing presence and love of the Lord, strengthening their faith, and offering the support of the Church.

The sacrament of Anointing of the Sick gives a special grace to the Christian experiencing the difficulties of serious illness or old age. It is best received at the start of serious illness or a setback in old age, and it can be repeated during a prolonged illness or as the elderly struggle with the infirmities of age.

In the Church's Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick, it is Jesus who touches the sick to heal them from sin – and sometimes even from physical ailment. His cures were signs of the arrival of the Kingdom of God. The core message of his healing tells us of his plan to conquer sin and death by his dying and rising.

The Rite of Anointing tells us there is no need to wait until a person is at the point of death to receive the Sacrament. A careful judgment about the serious nature of the illness is sufficient.

When the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick is given, the hoped-for effect is that, if it be God's will, the person be physically healed of illness. But even if there is no physical healing, the primary effect of the Sacrament is a spiritual healing by which the sick person receives the Holy Spirit's gift of peace and courage to deal with the difficulties that accompany serious illness or the frailty of old age.

We hope this helps to understand the importance of the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick for those who are ill or elderly in our community.
