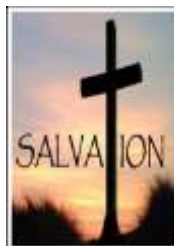
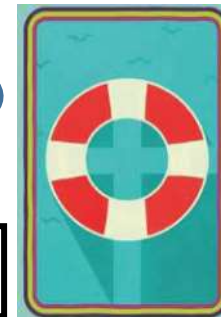


Key Vocabulary	
<b>The Old Testament</b>	The Old Testament is the first division of the Christian biblical canon, which is based primarily upon the 24 books of the Hebrew Bible or Tanakh, a collection of ancient religious Hebrew writings by the Israelites.
<b>Restoration</b>	Restoration can be defined as the act of returning something to its former condition. Making something new again.
<b>Salvation</b>	The act of saving or being saved.
<b>Crucifixion</b> <b>Crucifixion</b>	Referring to the death of Jesus on a cross. A Roman punishment.
<b>Maundy Thursday</b>	The day before Good Friday; the day of the Last Supper.
<b>Holy Communion</b>	<b>Communion</b> means, simply, 'togetherness' and this is a ritual to show the togetherness of Christians and God.



Jesus' resurrection is one of the most important beliefs for Christians.



## Salvation

**Big Question:** What did Jesus do to save human beings?

### Prior Learning

Pupils will:

- Offer suggestions about what the narrative of the Last Supper, Judas' betrayal and Peter's denial might mean.
- Give examples of what the texts studied mean to some Christians.
- Make clear links between Gospel texts and how Christians remember, celebrate and serve on Maundy Thursday, including Holy Communion.
- Describe how Christians show their beliefs about Jesus in their everyday lives: for example, prayer, servicing, sharing the message and the example of Jesus.
- Raise and answer questions about how serving and celebrating, remembering and betrayal, trust and standing up for your beliefs might make a difference to how pupils think and live.

### Key Knowledge

Pupils will know that:

- Christians read the 'big story' of the Bible as pointing out the need for God to save people.
- Salvation includes the ongoing restoration of humans' relationship with God.
- The Gospels give accounts of Jesus' death and resurrection,
- The New Testament says that Jesus' death was somehow for us.
- Christians believe that Jesus calls them to sacrifice their own needs to the needs of others, and some are prepared to die for others and for their faith.
