

Big Question: What did Jesus do to save human beings?

Prior Learning

Pupils will:

- -Offer suggestions about what the narrative of the Last Supper, Judas' betrayal and Peter's denial might mean.
- -Give examples of what the texts studied mean to come Christians.
- -Make clear links between Gospel texts and how Christians remember, celebrate and serve on Maundy Thursday, including Holy Communion.
- -Describe how Christians show their beliefs about Jesus in their everyday lives: for example, prayer, servicing, sharing the message and the example of Jesus.
- -Raise and answer questions about how serving and celebrating, remembering and betrayal, trust and standing up for your beliefs might make a difference to how pupils think and live.

Key Knowledge

Pupils will know that:

- -Christians read the 'big story' of the Bible as pointing out the need for God to save people.
- -Salvation includes the ongoing restoration of humans' relationship with God.
- -The Gospels give accounts of Jesus' death and resurrection,
- -The New Testament says that Jesus' death was somehow for us.
- -Christians believe that Jesus calls them to sacrifice their own needs to the needs of others, and some are prepared to die for others and for their faith.
