Be a Regular Reader! ★

Be a Word Whizz! ★

Practise the spellings you are given every Friday. You will need to look at these several times a week. We will test on the following Fridays (as a dictation.)

Be a Mathematician! ★

Log on to TIMES TABLE ROCK STARS and answer a minimum of 100 questions a week. We will check this on a Friday along with your average accuracy score. We will be looking for this to be above 90%. If you have trouble accessing TTRockstars at home, you can use an iPad at break or lunch times.

The Transatlantic Slave Trade and Australia

The Transatlantic Slave Trade		Australia	
transatlantic slave trade	Responsible for the forced migration of millions of people from Africa to the Western Hemisphere from the middle of the 15th century to the end of the 19 th century.	industry	Activity where raw materials are changed into goods that can be used and traded.
enslaved Africans	A human being classed as property , who is owned by another person and who is forced to work for nothing (to refer to a person who was enslaved as a 'slave' strips them of their identify - therefore, the term 'Enslaved Africans' should be used.)	Aboriginal People	People living in Australia from the earliest times , before the arrival of settlers or colonists.
Atlantic passage	Sometimes known as the 'Middle Passage', refers to the part of the trade where enslaved Africans, densely packed onto ships, were transported across the Atlantic to the West Indies.	colony	a country, or an area, under the control of another country and often occupied by settlers from that country.
plantation	Usually a large farm or estate , especially in a tropical or semitropical country, on which cotton, tobacco, coffee, sugarcane, or the like is grown.	settler	A person who has moved, with other people, to live in a new country or area.
abolitionists	An abolitionist was someone who wanted to end slavery.	mining	Where a raw resource is extracted from the earth , e.g., coal.
		The Commonwealth	A group of countries that used to be part of the British Empire , but now voluntarily work together on issues such as human rights.
		Biome	A community of plants and animals that have shared characteristics due to the environment they live in.
		Uluru	A massive sandstone rock in Australia's Northern Territory : Uluru is sacred to indigenous Australians and is thought to have started forming around 550 million years ago.
