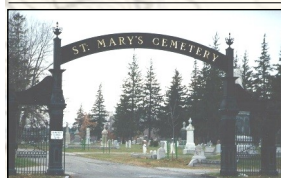

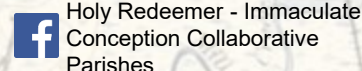
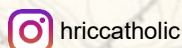

From the Pastor

Dear Parishioners,

Easter is the celebration of the resurrection of Jesus Christ. It is a concrete event in human history that happened approximately 2000 years ago just outside the walls of ancient Jerusalem. After being dead and buried in His tomb for three days, God resurrected Jesus and gave Him new life. But this new resurrected life is way beyond our understanding of what our earthly life is like.



Many years ago, I recall standing in my grandmother's kitchen with my mother who was about to make a phone call. Just before picking up the handset that was tethered to the base unit which was bolted to the wall, my grandmother reminded her that the line was a "party line" and that she needed to first check and see if anyone else was using it before she started dialing. Many decades ago, when phones were first being installed in people's houses and the technology was brand new, it was considered by some a luxury to have a private phone line. Instead, many people opted for the cheaper option of sharing a single phone line and number between several nearby houses. Only one person could use it at a time, but anyone could pick up the receiver and listen in, as, no doubt, some extra nosy neighbors occasionally did!

We might recoil in horror at the thought of our neighbor listening in on our private conversations, but that was the way many were introduced to telephones. In the beginning, central switchboards were used to complete calls through an operator, who could hear everything anyone said, if they wanted to. Real progress was made when phones became capable of dialing numbers directly. These were rotary phones, with a circular disc that had to be "dialed" or rotated for each number in sequence. Get one number wrong, and you had to hang up and start all over again. Further progress was achieved when these individual phones swapped the rotary dial for digital numbers—a key pad. And the phone revolution was off and running! Soon, phones of every imaginable design, color, and shape could be purchased from secondary stores, like Sears, rather than be rented each month from the phone company. Then, AT&T broke off into a number of smaller companies, each offering their own regional phone service. Soon, these began to compete nationwide with each other to offer consumers the best possible "plan" for local and long-distance dialing. That's right...it used to cost extra to call across the country or even a few towns over! Finally, phones became wireless, using a radio or walkie-talkie-like connection between the battery-powered hand-held unit and the base station, which was plugged into the wall. Amazingly, free from the tangle of cords that often plagued the average homeowner, one could walk anywhere in the house, even out into the back yard, while chatting on the phone! Wow! Progress! Heaven! (...well, not quite.)

At the end of the day, while technological advances certainly transformed the telephone and phone call experience, a phone was just that: a device that enabled you to make a phone call. You still had to speak into the device, and then listen when someone on the other end spoke back to you. And that was basically all they did. Made and received phone calls. But starting in the 1980s and exploding into vogue by the 2000s was the cellular phone and what ultimately became known

today as a “smart phone.” It is light years beyond what even the most sophisticated landline ever could be. Today’s smart phone is a phone—it actually can make a voice call, which on most days is crystal clear and can reach any place on earth in microseconds, usually with no additional surcharges or tolls. But that is just the beginning! Smart phones are also mini-computers, calculators, music players, TV’s, movie theaters, flashlights, currency converters, language translators, game players, book readers, health monitors, weather forecasters, search engines, clocks, maps, navigation systems, rolodexes, newspaper readers, cameras, video cameras, note-takers, photo libraries, banking terminals, word processors, and a briefcase for a whole filing cabinet worth of files and records. They offer video conferencing, connect us with social media and can actually enable us to buy and sell houses, cars, stocks and bonds and so, so, so much more...all from the tiny screen in our hand! They can even make a hot pizza appear at your exact location in a matter of minutes after just a few “clicks” of haptic-enabled virtual buttons! Good Lord Almighty!

On this holiest day of the year, though I seriously digress and spend way too much time parsing out the history of the phone, I want to emphasize the contrast between resuscitation and resurrection.

There were a number of incidences in the Gospels where Jesus brought people back to life. There was Jairus’ daughter: “Talitha Koum! Little girl, I tell you, arise!” There was the young man who Jesus called from his very casket as it was being brought to the cemetery for burial in Nain. Then, of course, there was Lazarus at Bethany...“Lazarus come out! Untie him and let him go free.” But in all of these cases, those “raised from the dead” simply resumed their earthly life for a while and eventually died again.

Now, life here on earth can be pretty good on some days. On some very rare days, it can be excellent and even awesome. But most days it is average or OK or boring or just “meh.” We all have our routines, patterns and habits, most of which are helpful, some are not. And then we have some bad days, some days filled with frustration, grief, and sorrow, some painful and even agonizingly unbearable days, that we have no choice but to suffer through them. And then, there are some worse than those. So, that was what Jairus’ daughter, the young man from Nain and Lazarus were restored to...the crazy, varied, and often unremarkable day-to-day life as we know it. It is like a phone call of old. On a really good day, it is static-free and included in your local dialing area.

But resurrection...well that is a whole different matter! Like the contrast between an old Ma-Bell rotary monster and a sleek, shiny new iPhone...Jesus’ resurrection from the dead is that much beyond Him simply coming back to the earthly life that He willingly sacrificed for us on the Cross. Resurrection means a whole new kind of life that completely redefines what it means to truly live. “I have come that they may have life, and that they may have it more abundantly.” (Jn 10:10) In His glorified body, Jesus is not bound by space and time the way that we currently are. Though He retains His corporality, His glorified body is beyond pain and suffering, beyond decay, beyond the limitations that our earthly bodies have. Jesus is free to come and go as He pleases, despite locked doors and solid walls. He apparently can move freely between locales, walking along the way with his traumatized disciples on the road to Emmaus, meeting them in Galilee, fishing and preparing breakfast for them on the Sea of Tiberius, breathing

on them and sending the Holy Spirit back in Jerusalem and confronting Saul of Tarsus on the way to Damascus. He looks differently to everyone who encounters Him, recognized more by His actions and words than by His personal voice and past appearance. His wounds remain, but they are no longer lethal. He is present and in the room, even when no one sees Him, as St. Thomas would find out the hard way! “Put your finger here and see my hands, and bring your hand and put it into my side, and do not be unbelieving, but believe.” (Jn 20:27) Mysteriously, He is alive and present, living in and through all those who believe, whenever we are gathered by His love. Cleopas, his companion, and all who would follow will encounter Him intensely through the Breaking of the Bread.

This is Good News for us today because the prismatic transformation of Jesus Christ from His earthly life and death to the pure glory that is His Resurrection is our inheritance through Christ as well. As the Church prays on the Fourth Sunday of Easter: “Almighty ever-living God, lead us to a share in the joys of heaven, so that the humble flock may reach where the brave Shepherd has gone before.” The Book of Revelation also anticipates this joy: Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth.... I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, “Behold, God’s dwelling is with the human race. He will dwell with them and they will be his people and God himself will always be with them [as their God]. He will wipe every tear from their eyes, and there shall be no more death or mourning, wailing or pain, [for] the old order has passed away.” The one who sat on the throne said, “Behold, I make all things new.” (from chapter 21) It is through our common Baptism that we have been given a share in the new, eternal, resurrected life that Christ won for us.

In our present moment, we can barely conceive of what our own resurrection will be like. As St. Paul once wrote, “What eye has not seen, and ear has not heard, and what has not entered the human heart, what God has prepared for those who love him.” (1 Cor 2:9), I often wonder what my grandmother would have thought of seeing a smart phone for the first time. I can picture her shaking her head, shrugging her shoulders and uttering the truism, “What will they think of next?!” Fortunately for us, God has done all the thinking for us. This Easter, let us open our hearts to ponder the new life that we have received in Christ. It will be beyond our wildest imagining, yet comfortingly familiar! As Isaiah once wrote when entertaining a vision of heaven, “On that day it will be said: “Indeed, this is our God; we looked to him, and he saved us! This is the LORD to whom we looked; let us rejoice and be glad that he has saved us!” (Is 25:9) Finally, St. Paul reminds us that as we live our present lives, we must always look forward to the life of Heaven, our true destiny. “But our citizenship is in heaven, and from it we also await a savior, the Lord Jesus Christ. He will change our lowly body to conform with his glorified body by the power that enables him also to bring all things into subjection to himself.” (Phil 3:20–21)

So, the next time you reach for a phone, whether it is to make a simple phone call from a legacy landline or do one of the many thousand other things that modern technology makes possible through the latest smart phone: think of the glory of Heaven, think of Christ risen from the dead, think of our own call to holiness and the promise of what our own resurrection from dead will be like. (Hint: it will be glorious!)
