

The JOY of NEW LIFE

When our first child was born, I felt such a deep joy, indescribable, words fail. Also in all family members around there was tremendous joy as if saying: "our story will go on!"; and in the wider community, our church, the joy was shared and celebrated, too: taking turns in holding the baby, having a look, making baby noises and so on, a delight!

With a newborn young parents are stepping into the unknown - lots of first-time doing, a bit like stepping into a newly remade world, hoping "we will grow with it". The young parents need to find their own new way with their newborn (even if older experience is helpfully offered).

The Christmas story is full of the Joy of new life and full of, "do not be afraid", both in the gospels of Luke and Matthew. When Jesus is born there are difficulties, challenges and dangers - but the joy wins out. Not Herod the despot's plans of control, not lack of shelter, not being refugee determine everything - but the love of God and the openness of Mary and Joseph to God's prompting.

'Magnify the joy, listen to God', then, could be the underlying motto around Jesus birth. How can that be a guide for each of us? How can it be a guide for everyone being church together to magnify the joy, to listen to God.

Taking part in the 'Growing Young' programme is helping us to re-prioritise and we have met with some young people to hear of their needs and vision, and there will be more listening to younger generations. Magnify joy, hearing more of Jesus - telling more of Jesus, as this adventurous courageous boundary-breaking mature Jesus was a baby only at the very start. He is life-changing, world-changing to this day, an inspiration and a great joy today: Jesus gives new life.

Ukranian Family Concert

After a series of temporary stops in Poland and Canada, the Aftanaziv family from Ukraine has recently set up home in Longforgan.

They arrived with few possessions, but the Carse community rallied round with hospitable enthusiasm and donated many items to help them. They have already made friends in the village and the children are settling in to their schools.

In return for this generosity, they staged a highly enjoyable musical concert to an audience of about 60 in the comfortable surroundings of Longforgan Bowling Club on the afternoon of Saturday 15th November.

They turned out to be wonderfully talented musicians, able to play a wide range of musical instruments!

The concert was followed by a buffet of traditional Ukrainian food.

Growing Young

I recently attend a service in another church. I arrived about 15 minutes before the service with a couple of friends and sat in a pew in the near empty church. Soon we were asked to move along as first one, then a second and finally a third lady squeezed into the same pew despite there still being many other empty pews available. The vibe we got was we were in their pew, and apart from asking us to move they did not try to engage us in conversation.

In Matthew 19 v 13 (Message version) we read 'One day children were brought to Jesus in the hope that he would lay hands on them and pray over them. The disciples shooed them off.'

Had I been looking for a new church to join (I'm not!), or if this was the first time I had felt brave enough to enter the unknown and enter a church I definitely would have been shooed off by the actions of these ladies.

This was the theme for the second of our Growing Young Conferences....what does the culture, and our actions, say to the young people in our community if they dare cross our threshold? Will it shoo them off or entice them to join us the next week?

Do we make them feel welcome? Does what they wear matter (God doesn't mind jeans) If a child is crawling around the chancel, do we glower at the parents or do we smile and rejoice in the fact a new family has joined us for worship? Do we hide the nice biscuits away in case the children eat them, or do we say' take two'? Do we squeeze into 'our pew' beside them, or do we sit in the pew behind, lean over and introduce ourselves?

Our actions, and the culture of our church is important if we want to attract and keep young people in our church. Over the next few months our group will be thinking more about this aspect.

As well as having a bit of fun with our food we do want to hear their views and concerns. If you know of anyone who might be interested, then ask them to get in touch with me.

THE COMMUNITY GROUP

is there to meet people and exchange how life is going, often (but not necessarily) by meeting in a Café or by doing an outing together. There is also the idea of freeing up a care-giver from their responsibility (which can be non-stop) so they can catch up with themselves. HOUSEBOUND AND IN CARE

Invergowrie brings from among its church people a 'pastoral care convener' and visitors. The focus here is on staying in contact with people who have moved into care homes or who are housebound. This happens by telephone, by card, by flowers or by visiting as deemed appropriate. For more info, contact Fiona Smart.

HOSPITAL VISITING

Hospitals and care homes can only share information with the closest family - not with your church friends nor ministers. That's why you or one close to you needs to contact us if you want us to know. And hospitals move on patients as quickly as possible, so the speed of your communication is essential. For minister visiting the hospital, contact Marc.

TALKING WITH A MINISTER

Your ministers, too, are here for you to talk with, very happy to do so. As ministers move between different places of worship it is hard to keep track of who is there, who on holiday, who not there, ... as ministers cover a wider area, they do not see the same congregation sometimes for 3 weeks - this simply means your getting in contact is vital.

FOR ALL PASTORAL CONTACTS:

We encourage you to be in contact, please do not sit waiting for 'someone' to find you or your loved one. Don't rely on 'the word going round'. Please do **communicate:** You yourself - or a family member or friend - an get in contact with your **elder**, or with your **pastoral visitor**, or with the **minister**; speaking in person, by phone, email, letter, facebook, whatsapp, website contact form; it's always good to hear from you.
