Accept our grateful thanksgiving for what you have given us


in the Word made flesh,

What are they dreaming of for their child?

What looks are they getting from those nearby?

Open your eyes.

We know the world is not always an easy place to welcome new life.

And yet, babies are born every day, and new families are formed.

What must those moments have been like for Mary and Joseph searching for a place to be?

Now, just like then, exhausted expectant parents,

far from home, are searching for safe spaces to settle.

What must that be like for displaced families today?

Now, just like then, faithful families trust that somehow,

each seemingly impossible situation will work out.

Mary and Joseph held on to hope when their options seemed to be in short supply.

It was a hope that things would get better.

We light the candle of hope

because hope creates a path for a new,

unknown story to unfold.

## **Placing of the Ornaments**

After the reading, you are invited to help decorate the tree. All of the ornaments are laid out for you. Each Chrismon was made by a member of All Saints many years ago.

A Chrismon is a gold and white ornament with Christian Symbols and gets its name from "Christ - Monogram". The Chrismon tree was first used by North American Lutherans in 1957.

#### Lord Jesus,

All: Hang symbols and signs of Christ —

Hang stars, crosses, triangles, the "alpha" and the "omega"

Decorate the tree – soft music will play in the background.

Please use this time to reflect on the symbols and what they might mean.

We encourage everyone to come forward and take turns placing a Chrismon on the tree.
