CONSIDER YEAR-END GIVING WITH A TAX-ADVANTAGE GIFT

We know that many of you will carefully consider your charitable giving plans as we near the end of the calendar year. This is also an important time to meaningfully support congregations and ministries to equip them for future ministry. As you plan ways to give, we encourage you to consider opportunities that can help you make the most of tax policies and your assets.

Donating appreciated Assets - If you have appreciated assets (stocks/property) that you have owned more than one year you can donate the assets and avoid paying the capital gains on those assets. This is a much more tax effective way of giving than selling the asset and donating the proceeds on those assets.

Required Minimum Distributions (RMDs) – These distributions are ones you must take each year from most traditional IRAs once you reach a certain age (73). These Required Minimum Distributions can be directed to a charity which can limit taxable income from your IRA. This can be a great tax-savings way to donate to your favorite charity. A RMD given to charity is called a Qualified charitable distributions (QCD), QCDs are limited to \$108,000. Most IRA custodians allow you to make regular QCDs to your favorite charity if you desire. You can start donating QCDs from your IRA at age 70 ½.

- Please discuss options with your financial advisor or CPA before deciding what makes the most sense for you.
- Consider adding an additional gift to the QCD that would go to one of our endowment Funds
 Resurrection Life Fund or Legacy Ministry Fund. If you do this make sure you let Judy Moore, LCRs bookkeeper, how you would like your gift distributed.

This idea and many other ideas/strategies for charitable giving and gifting to family will be presented at the Giving smarter luncheon on Nov 9th. 

OVERWHELMING RESPONSE TO OCTOBER HELPING HANDS!

Once again, Resurrection members stepped up and surpassed expectations! Our goal, which was not shared, was to provide 50 new duffel bags to The Gathering Inn for their overnight guests to carry their sleeping bags and personal items. We blew past that goal with **86 duffel bags** purchased! This includes 10 that we purchased with money that was donated this month to Helping Hands. That is incredible – what a gift to them! No longer needing to carry black trash bags each night. The duffel bags give them integrity. Plans are in place to number the bags and attach a tag for their name. One Sunday in November the bags will be blessed.

COUNCIL CORNER



Our total income from giving and rental continues to be close to the budget level (98% YTD). The total expenses also have run close to budgeted level (98% YTD). We have spent about \$20,000 more on maintenance than budgeted due to HVAC and other deferred maintenance. Our campus continues to be utilized at a very high rate, which is

great but will increase some maintenance costs.

The vision team continues to make progress, and the council should see a preliminary report before the November council meeting.
