# Spiritual Advisor



### **Good Old Summertime: Sacred Time, Through 'Ordinary'**

Summer is here, and the long days with all the accompanying hot and humid weather lets us know it for sure! Many will be fortunate during this time to take a vacation and relax a bit with family and friends. During the good old summertime, we might take the opportunity to recharge and even begin to evaluate our spiritual life and devotional life and how it impacts our day-to-day routine — our ordinary life.

It so happens that much of the summer falls into "Ordinary Time" of the liturgical year. Ordinary Time is defined as a liturgical "season" that occurs a couple of different times of the year: between the Solemnity of the Epiphany and Lent, and between the Solemnity of Pentecost and Advent. Pope Benedict XVI had this to say about Ordinary Time: "The beauty of this season lies in the fact that it invites us to live our ordinary life... as a journey of holiness, that is, of faith and friendship with Jesus continually discovered and rediscovered as Teacher and Lord, the Way, the Truth and the Life of man." (Angelus Address, 25 January, 2006) These days after Epiphany and days after Pentecost are a good time to consider how we spend our days, i.e., how we use our time.

As Christians, time matters and so does the liturgical year. The Catechism of the Catholic Church helps give us some insight into why when it teaches that "Beginning with the Easter Triduum as its source of light, the new age of the Resurrection fills the whole liturgical year with its brilliance. Gradually, on either side of this source, the year is transfigured by the liturgy.

It really is a 'year of the Lord's favor.' The economy of salvation is at work within the framework of time, but since its fulfillment in the Passover of Jesus and the outpouring of the Holy Spirit, the culmination of history is anticipated 'as a foretaste,' and the kingdom of God enters into our time." Chronological time, years, months, days, hours and minutes of our lives are impacted by God's kingdom and transformed by God's sanctifying grace received in and through the "ordinary" (regular, consistent and fitting) sacramental life. Indeed, time — the time we have been given — can become "sacred," being set apart for God's use.

Preface V of the Sundays in Ordinary Time helps make this idea clear: "It is truly right and just, our duty and our salvation, always and everywhere to give you thanks, Lord, holy Father, almighty and eternal God. For you laid the foundations of the world and have arranged the changing of times and seasons; you formed man in your own image and set humanity over the whole world in all its wonder, to rule in your name over all you have made and for ever praise you in your mighty works, through Christ our Lord." We have been given a beautiful and awe-inspiring duty to praise God and build his kingdom of merciful love every day of our lives.

During these summer days, perhaps we can look at how we might liturgically and devotionally shape our days, months and years as we prepare for heaven. In addition to participating in the sacramental life of the Church, e.g., Holy Mass and the Sacrament of Penance, what might we be doing to bolster our devotional life? The document "Directory on Popular Piety and the Liturgy" suggests that it is crucial that popular devotions be in harmony with the liturgy, drawing inspiration from it and ultimately leading back to it because "the liturgy and popular piety are two forms of worship which are in mutual and fruitful relationship with each other." (No. 58) In order to worship well, something to consider is the customary dedications for the months of the year. Since at least the 16th century, Catholic piety has assigned entire months to special devotions. Here are the more common ones:

January: The Holy Name of Jesus

February: The Holy Family

March: St. Joseph

**April:** The Most Blessed Sacrament

May: The Blessed Virgin Mary

June: The Most Sacred Heart of Jesus

July: The Most Precious Blood

**August:** The Immaculate Heart of Mary

September: Our Lady of Sorrows or

The Holy Guardian Angels

October: The Holy Rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary

**November:** The Holy Souls in Purgatory **December:** The Immaculate Conception

We could even consider how we focus on spiritual matters each day of the week. We are reminded by Eucharistic Prayer III how we are called to give praise and thanks to God daily, "You are indeed Holy, O Lord, and all you have created rightly gives you praise, for through your Son our Lord Jesus Christ, by the power and working of the Holy Spirit, you give life to all things and make them holy, and you never cease to gather a people to yourself, so that from the rising of the sun to its setting a pure sacrifice may be offered to your name." Traditionally, the days of the week have a customary devotional focus that might inspire our prayer:

**Sundays:** Resurrection and the Holy and Undivided

Trinity

**Mondays:** The Holy Spirit and the Souls in Purgatory

Tuesdays: The Holy Angels Wednesdays: St. Joseph


Thursdays: The Most Blessed Sacrament

Fridays: Christ's Passion and His Most Sacred Heart

Saturdays: The Most Blessed Virgin and her

Immaculate Heart

# FROM OUR Treasurer Diane Zayechek

#### Charitable Giving

A qualified charitable distribution (QCD) from a traditional individual retirement account (IRA) is generally a nontaxable distribution, when made directly from IRA trustee to a qualified charity. A qualified charity is a 501(c)3 organization; MACCW is a 501(c)3 organization. The rules are the IRA owner must be at least 70½ years of age when the distribution is made. The maximum QCD per year is \$100,000. A married couple, filing a joint return, each must be at least 70½ years, and each have their own IRA; each can give \$100,000. You must receive an acknowledgment from the charity of your donation. MACCW sends out a thank you letter. This acknowledgment should be



dated either 60 days after donation, or January 31 the following year; whichever is earlier. For IRA donations to MACCW, contact Treasurer, Diane Zayechek at 414-545-6062.

MACCW cannot provide tax or legal advice. You should consult your attorney or qualified tax advisor regarding your situation. This content should not be depended upon for other than broadly informational purposes. Specific questions should be referred to a qualified tax professional.

### Golden Rose Award Program

The goal of the Golden Rose Award Program is to recognize and promote the value of young women who make a difference in their parish and community. Every parish in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee is invited to participate in this program. Letters will be sent to each pastor to recognize one teen girl for the award. The Golden Rose nominees will be honored at a special reception with their families and MACCW members. Each nominee will be presented with the Golden Rose Award and an individual Student Membership in the Milwaukee Archdiocesan Council of Catholic Women.

#### Criteria

- High school woman who is residing within the Diocese of Milwaukee
- Practicing Catholic, attending Sunday Mass regularly
- Active member of her parish, showing leadership in activities and service projects (youth groups, ministries, volunteer work)
- Exhibits spirituality and reflects the Gospel values in her everyday life

As we recently marked three years since the overturning of Roe v. Wade, we see some very disappointing developments here in Wisconsin.

The overturn of Roe returned the regulation of abortion back to the individual states. At that point Wisconsin's pre-Roe abortion ban (940.04) was recognized, saving countless lives while it was adhered to for 15 months. At that point a rogue Dane County judge illogically ruled that 940.04 only banned feticide, not abortion. While challenges to that ridiculous opinion began, Planned Parenthood and Affiliated abortion mills resumed the slaughter of precious preborn babies. All along our pro abortion Attorney General Kaul worked toward getting 940.04 completely overturned. He obviously recognized that it did indeed ban abortion with a broad "life of the mother" exception.

On July 2, 2025 a politicized Wisconsin Supreme Court ruled in Kaul v. Urmanski that Wisconsin's (near total) ban 940.04 is no longer in effect. Basically the pro abortion judge majority, ignoring precedent, ruled that post Roe v. Wade Wisconsin laws enacted to merely regulate abortion (while we were subject to Roe's federal mandate) were intended by our legislature to nullify 940.04. They falsely hold

that those minor regulations are all that now control abortion in our state, and not the 940.04 ban.

As abortion continues in full force in Wisconsin, the baby killers are so emboldened that they opened a third abortuary in Milwaukee at 35th Street and Wisconsin Ave., in a low-income neighborhood. Ironically the nonprofit mill is named Care for All WI.

As you can see, we have our work cut out for us. Protecting the pre-born and helping their parents is more important here than ever. Some simple ways to help that you might consider are:
