

Shepherd's Thoughts

Several questions came into my mind upon reflecting on the first reading for today, how do we treat the marginalized in our society or at some point in the less fortunate countries? Do we treat them with honesty, justice and respect? Prophet Amos condemns the greed of dishonest merchants who saw religious holidays as obstacles in making profits. They even wanted the sacred days to end quickly so they could resume their dishonest business to the extent of falsifying their scales to cheat the poor and the needy in their pursuit of money.

We are now in the NFL season. Whenever we attend Sunday Mass, do we also have that desire for the Mass to end quickly so we could watch the Packers game right away? Or do we prioritize sporting events more than our Sunday obligations? Remember, there is always a time for everything — a time to relax, a time for joy, a time to work and a time for our family. But we should not take for granted our time with the Lord and it should always be done consciously, completely and religiously.

At the same time, prophet Amos denounces the social injustices and exploitation of the poor by the wealthy in ancient Israel. This translates to what is rampant nowadays in our society with unjust wages, maltreatment of workers and deprivation of their rights and privileges. Thus, it illustrates the extreme devaluation of human life, where the poor and needy are treated as commodities, sold for trivial amounts of money or even for something as insignificant as it is written, "We will buy the lowly for silver, and the poor for a pair of sandals" (Am 8:6).

Moreover, he had revealed God's abhorrence towards those who took advantage of the lowly and the poor. It teaches us therefore that God wants us to deal with honesty to those who are already struggling and treat them with honesty, justice and respect for "the Lord has sworn by the pride of Jacob: Never will I forget a thing they have done!" (Am 8:7).

Much like our first reading, our responsorial Psalm tells us about God's love for the poor which is the basis of the Catholic Church social teachings on the preferential option for the poor. "He raises up the lowly from the dust; from the dunghill he lifts up the poor to seat them with princes, with the princes of his own people" (Ps 113:1-2, 4-6, 7-8).

May this be our aim in solidarity with the poor and the victims of injustices to unite ourselves in prayer as Paul in the second reading tells us, "that in every place the men should pray, lifting up holy hands, without anger or argument" (1 Tm 2:8). Paul was calling for all leaders to unite in prayer that we may lead a quiet and tranquil life in all devotion and dignity. This is true to the experience of St. John Marie Vianney about praying, stating that "If you pray and love, that is where a man's happiness lies." Thus, we can ponder today if we have been active responders to this same call.

Meanwhile, our Gospel today is a strict reminder for us to be faithful in our dealings with regard to acquiring material possessions. Luke is calling us to mind that, while it is good to be wealthy, we must be prudent enough to use them for God's greater glory in order for us to attain true eternal treasures of heaven.

All the "dishonest wealth" or "mammon" that we have are just temporary and ultimately we cannot take them with us into the afterlife. Thus, we must learn to use all these resources to help others, especially the poor, thereby creating a spiritual "account", our good deeds that will be recognized by God and lead us to His "eternal dwellings" in heaven.

As we draw closer to end this Jubilee year of hope, let this be a constant reminder for all of us that we are accountable for all that God has entrusted to us. "The person who is trustworthy in very small matters is also trustworthy in great ones." (Lk 16:1-13). Indeed, we cannot truly serve God if our hearts are attached to earthly profits.

Gathering Space


