

Shepherd's Thoughts

As a continuation of prophet Amos' denunciation of the social injustices and exploitation of the poor by the wealthy in ancient Israel, we heard from the first reading today how he described their self-complacency. He likewise condemned their self-indulgences and indifferences which were characterized by their luxurious lifestyles failing to address the needs of the poor.

"Woe to the complacent in Zion!" This passage is a warning of divine judgment because they were not grieved by the ruin of their people, Israel. "They drink wine from bowls and anoint themselves with the best oils; yet they are not made ill by the collapse of Joseph! Therefore, now, they shall be the first to go into exile, and their "wanton revelry" (their excesses, feasting, and singing) shall be done away with" (Am 6:1a, 4-7).

There is nothing wrong with wealth and abundance. In fact, we need to be prosperous enough so we can live a decent way of life , provide the needs of our families and have more opportunities to help others. However, we must be prudent in how to use them and utilize them for the greater glory of God and not to destroy others and our future. What prophet Amos is telling us today is that our selfish ways of life and refusal to care for others would surely prevent us from attaining the true treasures of heaven

For the past few days I enjoyed your company celebrating my birthday. Yes, we had a wonderful time but this brought to my attention with the following questions: how about my family and loved ones, are they also enjoying themselves being away from me? How about the victims of wars whose source of basic necessities, such as food, water, clothing and shelter have been stripped off from them. What about the families who have nothing to eat at this very moment because of ill distribution of wealth in their communities? How do we give justice to them while we are basking in our pleasantries and convenience? Is there really a way to be in solidarity with them?

Sometimes life becomes unfair because of our selfishness. However, there are simple acts that we can do in order to empathize with our brothers and sisters in Christ who are challenged in so many ways. First, let us make sure to finish eating what we have on our plate so that no food is wasted. Let us drink every drop of water in our glasses. Let us be prudent in our purchases; Buying only what we need, deviating from our ceaseless wants not just saves us money but enables us to have a greater resource to share with the rest of the world.

Praise the Lord my soul! This must be the cry of our soul! Praised be His Holy name and not our self-complacency and selfishness. Like prophet Amos, our responsorial Psalm today demands for justice "Blessed he who keeps faith forever, secures justice for the oppressed, gives food to the hungry. The Lord sets captives free" ((Ps 146:7, 8-9, 9-10)).

Meanwhile, Paul instructs Timothy, as a "man of God," to flee from harmful desires like greed and selfishness and instead to actively "pursue righteousness, devotion, faith, love, patience, and gentleness. Compete well for the faith" (1 Tm 6:11-16). Thus, we are also called to seek virtues in our pursuit to holiness and righteousness as we entrust all our endeavors to God while serving the less fortunate brothers and sisters.

This is how the Gospel for today presents what our lives might be on the last day if we continue to be apathetic to the needs of others. Jesus' story about the rich man and the poor Lazarus teaches a moral lesson on the dangers of wealth and the importance of compassion for the poor. "My child, remember that you received what was good during your lifetime while Lazarus likewise received what was bad; but now he is comforted here, whereas you are tormented" (Lk

16:19-31). May this be a constant reminder for all of us not to neglect our social responsibility to our communities.

Every neglectful act of kindness is a sin of omission. Thus, whenever we deprive the poor of their rights even in the smallest matters, that would result in eternal damnation.

We are now moving towards the end of our Jubilee Year of Hope. So far, I can say that our church community has done so well in being responsible stewards of our resources, always ensuring that each is a channel of charity and compassion. Thus, I thank you and continue to encourage you to pursue the true wealth that God offers us that comes from doing and following Jesus' ways.
