

Shepherd's Thoughts

God is good, all the time! And all the time, God is good!

As we approach the end of the Church's liturgical year, we are reminded of a truth that is both challenging and consoling: God will come to judge the world with justice and mercy. Many acknowledge this truth, yet not all live with it in their hearts. Sometimes we become too comfortable, too distracted, forgetting that our lives are meant for holiness and conversion. This makes us even more complacent of our current situation thus becoming unwilling to improve or change from old sinful ways to newness of life.

The prophet Malachi comforts the faithful: "For you who fear my name, there will arise the sun of justice with its healing rays." (Mal 3:20). God's judgment is not simply punishment — it is purification. For those who walk in faith, it brings light, healing, and renewal.

The Psalm proclaims: "The Lord comes to rule the earth with justice and the peoples with equity." (Ps 98). God's justice is not about vengeance but about setting things right. It assures us that truth, love, and goodness will have the final word. Justice will surely come in God's time. It is therefore with certain hope that God will judge us according to His mercy.

In the Second Reading, St. Paul reminds us that faith must be active: "If anyone is unwilling to work, neither should that one eat." (2 Thes 3:10). We are called not to idleness or fear but to meaningful service and perseverance in doing good.

Paul in this manner instructed his followers to address specific behavior. It was meant to emphasize that while the community should work and support themselves, they should also be encouraged to perform good deeds and support those in need.

In the Gospel, Jesus warns that trials, persecution, and confusion will come — yet He gives us courage with this promise: "By your perseverance you will secure your lives." (Lk 21:19). The end times are not meant to terrify us but to strengthen our faith and readiness.

God's justice is always tempered by mercy. His judgment is not meant to condemn but to redeem. As this liturgical year draws to a close, may we live each day as a gift — persevering in love, standing firm in faith, and trusting that the Lord who judges with mercy will embrace us with everlasting peace.

Reflection Line:

"God's justice restores what sin has broken; His mercy heals what the world cannot."

Takeaway Thought:

Live each day with a faithful heart — working, loving, forgiving — so that when the Lord comes, He may find you ready and radiant with hope.

What makes a Christmas celebration unique and different?

Let me share with you our traditional ways of preparing and celebrating Christmas. When the month of September comes, we Filipinos, full of excitement, start to decorate our houses with our primary Christmas lanterns like "Belen" or statues of Nativity scene, Christmas lights and "Parol" -a starlike signifying the guiding star to the Magi in finding the Baby Jesus, commonly made from native and recycled materials.

Moreover, what makes our celebration more meaningful is no other than our "Misa de Aguinaldo". The Most Rev. Rex Andrew Alarcon, Archbishop of Caceres, Bicol Region, Philippines clearly explained with his expertise in Church History, that "Misa de Aguinaldo" is a privileged votive Mass, that is, a Mass that does not correspond to the liturgical calendar but has a special intention. It is celebrated for a 'grave or weighty reason' (pro re gravi) and with massive attendance of the faithful. The prayers are not strictly those of the Advent Season, but in honor of the Blessed Virgin Mary. The color of the vestments of the priests during the Misa Aguinaldo is white, instead of violet that is proper of advent.

Among the characteristics of the Misa de Aguinaldo are:

- It is a 'novena-mass', nine-day masses from December 16 to December 24.
- It is celebrated very early in the morning (summo mane); at dawn (adauroram); before daybreak (antequam dies illuxerit)
- Its mood is festive. The Gloria is sung.
- It is attended by a large number of people.

Based on the study of the historian Fr. Fidel Villarroel, the Misa de Aguinaldo is one of the oldest, if not the oldest, religious traditions in the Philippines. The tradition of the Misa de Aguinaldo originated from Spain, particularly Seville and Granada; and also from Mexico. But the practice of the Misa de Aguinaldo has disappered in Spain and Mexico as the privilege was withdrawn. The Philippines, in 1961, was granted by the Vatican an extension of five years. The permission was not revoked. The practice continues up to this day.

The reasons for allowing the Misa de Aguinaldo were: 'for the perseverance of the natives in the faith and for the preservation of Religion in this part of the world; certainly for a very weighty reason - the advancement of Religion. 'The word Aguinaldo originally referred to gifts given during the Christmas Season until Epiphany, also known as the Feast of the Three Kings. Gifts given at other time of the year are not called Aguinaldo. Thus, the Misa de Aguinaldo, is like a gift of the faithful to the Lord. In Tagalog, the Mass is called 'Simbang Gabi' as the mass is celebrated while it is still dark.

The Misa de Gallo, in Spain, refers to the Midnight Mass of December 24. Thus, the Misas de Aguinaldo culminate with the Misa de Gallo. However, one finds that the terms are often interchanged in current usage in the Philippines. New forms of the Misa de Aguinaldo or Simbang Gabi have been added, like the mass in the evening, anticipating the dawn mass, for example, December 15 evening Mass. This is to cater to those who find it difficult to attend the dawn masses, yet wish to celebrate the novena in preparation for Christmas.

The celebration of Misas de Aguinaldo prepares the faithful, with Mary the expectant Mother, to enter into the mystery of the Birth of the Son of God into the world, -a very important historical event that even secular historians took notice of. In fact, even the reckoning of dates has reference to the birth of Jesus. The initial B.C. signifies Before Christ and A.D., Anno Domini, means 'In the year of the Lord.'

For many Filipinos, the start of the celebration of the Aguinaldo Masses sparks a heightened sense of anticipation for Christmas, the birth of Jesus - the Messiah.
