



2023 Forest Park Planning Group Brief

Background and Purpose

Forest Park, GA has historically been marginalized regarding resources despite having a vibrant and active community. In 2023, multiple local agencies and organizations focused on addressing the needs of this community through funding and elevating their voices to advocate for actionable changes. As such, these entities partnered with the Hand Heart + Soul Project (HHSP) to establish and convene the Forest Park Planning Group.

[On establishing the Forest Park Planning Group]: *"It's really important to have qualitative assessments, qualitative data, having these conversations so that we can also just be able to capture some of these moments. I think a lot of times that our work gets lost like we have these calls, and then it's one {and} done."*

Activities and Action

In the early Spring of 2023, members of the Forest Park Planning Group were solicited through established networks and by reaching out to other community organizations. The priority for group involvement included:

- Community-based organizations with a focus on housing, workforce development, and education
- Residents
- Non-profit organizations
- Youth
- Community Activists, and
- Local business owners
- Anchor partners



While an attempt was made to include youth, the Planning Group was ultimately unsuccessful in having representation, despite outreach.

Activities and Action (cont.)

The Bridgespan Group—a global social impact consulting group—initially led the Forest Park Planning Group, which met monthly starting in Summer 2023. Members introduced themselves, created a group agreement, and discussed shared visions for their community. Ultimately, they developed a vision and three action-orientation goals for education, economic inclusion, and housing in Forest Park. The planning group then held a social event on November 14th showcasing their progress, building relationships with new individuals and organizations, and generating ideas on how to execute their vision and goals.

Forest Park Vision and Goals

“Forest Park will be a safer place where residents can afford to live, where residents have job security, and where there is a strong and connected nonprofit ecosystem that is resourced to provide wrap-around services within the community, in order to increase economic mobility, so residents can thrive and prosper.”

They intend to leverage relationships and community assets to implement the goals created, work with elected officials to advocate for policies that promote their three goals, and establish a tailored policy agenda with the support of HHSP.
