to Be Faithful in Big Matters**

“‘Come after me, and I will make you fishers of men.’ At once they left their nets and followed him.”(Mt 4:19)

WORD OF LIFE

The account of the calling of the first apostles invites us to meditate on our own vocation, the concrete way we should follow the Lord. Some people are or will be called to marriage. Others to the priesthood or to be consecrated religious. All are called to become Christ's disciples and to strive for sanctity. However, simply considering a vocation is of no use, even when it is discerned, if we are not prepared to assume the consequences that derive from it. There is little point in asking the Lord, as Saint Francis did, “What do you want me to do?” if we are not in a position to carry out what the Lord asks of us. Frequently, in fact, in order not to feel overwhelmed by what the Lord is asking of us, we end up convincing ourselves that the Lord really is not asking for that at all.

To be faithful in little matters means to prepare or train ourselves in order to hear the voice of God, whatever He asks. And we should not only look at it from the point of view of vocations. It is also important in other areas, for example, concerning pain, sickness, or suffering. Often, our problems seem huge until even larger problems arise by comparison. If we have not learned to endure small trials, we will fall apart when the bigger ones appear.

Purpose: Train yourself in the face of your hardships by thinking that they are nothing in comparison with others. Ask the Lord what He wants you to do and do whatever He asks.

PALABRA DE VIDA

El relato de la vocación de los primeros apóstoles nos invita a meditar sobre nuestra propia vocación, sobre la forma concreta en que debemos seguir al Señor. Unos están o estarán llamados al matrimonio. Otros a la consagración religiosa. Otros al sacerdocio. Todos a ser discípulos de Cristo y a intentar ser santos. Sin embargo, el planteamiento vocacional resulta inútil –incluso cuando teóricamente se produce– si no se está preparado para asumir las consecuencias que de ese planteamiento se deriven. De poco sirve preguntarle al Señor, como hizo San Francisco: “¿Qué quieres que haga?”, si luego no se está en condiciones de llevar a la práctica lo que el Señor te pide. De hecho, con frecuencia, para no sentirse agobiado por lo que el Señor solicita de uno mismo, se termina por autoconvencerse de que eso no lo está pidiendo el Señor.

Ser fieles en lo poco es prepararse, entrenarse, para escuchar la voz de Dios, pida éste lo que pida. Y no sólo hay que verlo en el campo vocacional. También es importante en otros ámbitos; por ejemplo, en lo concerniente al dolor, a la enfermedad, al sufrimiento. Con frecuencia tus problemas te parecen gigantescos, hasta que surgen problemas mayores que los relativizan. Si no has aprendido a soportar pequeñas pruebas, sucumbirás ante las grandes.

Propósito: Entrenarse ante las dificultades, pensando que no son nada comparadas con otras. Preguntarle al Señor qué quiere que hagamos y hacer lo que Él nos pida.

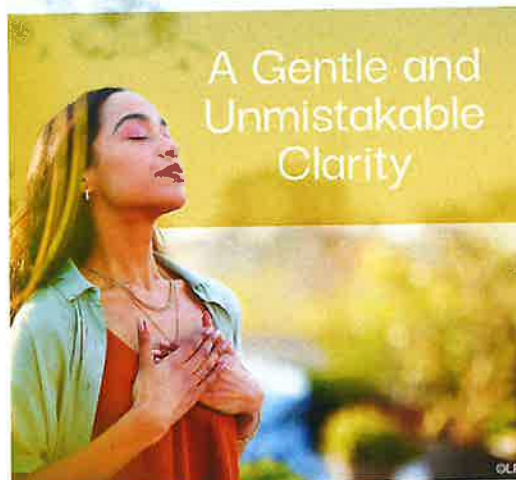

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Gospel Meditation

Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

I was 22 years old, lying in bed one night while on a pilgrimage, when I suddenly sensed an idea in my mind: "Go to the seminary." There was no voice, no vision, but a gentle and unmistakable clarity. I simply prayed, "Lord, if that's from you, let me find great joy in it." Three days later, my heart was bursting with joy. I dropped everything and entered the seminary. The older I get, the stranger my rather careless and hasty departure seems to me. I followed not because it made sense, or because I was especially brave. I went because the Lord called me.

Something like this happens in today's Gospel. Jesus walks by Simon, Andrew, James, and John and says, "**Come after me**" (Matthew 4:19). And *immediately* they leave their nets and follow. There's no explanation, no hesitation ... just movement. Why? As St. John says, "**In this is love: not that we have loved God, but that he loved us**" (1 John 4:10). They do not leave their nets because his call made perfect, calculable sense. They left them because they were called. And Jesus' call is powerful.

Take a moment this week to remember when Christ first called you. However small or quiet it was, recall it, and give thanks. The more we marvel that Christ has called us personally, the more passionately and freely we will follow him.

JOURNEY TO THE FOOT OF THE CROSS: BISHOP RICKEN OFFERS 10 THINGS TO REMEMBER FOR LENT

Bishop David L. Ricken of Green Bay, Wisconsin, former chairman of the Committee on Evangelization and Catechesis of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), offers "10 Things to Remember for Lent":

1. Remember the formula. The Church does a good job capturing certain truths with easy-to-remember lists and formulas: 10 Commandments, 7 sacraments, 3 persons in the Trinity. For Lent, the Church gives us almost a slogan—Prayer, Fasting, and Almsgiving—as the three things we need to work on during the season.

2. It's a time of prayer. Lent is essentially an act of prayer spread out over 40 days. As we pray, we go on a journey, one that hopefully brings us closer to Christ and leaves us changed by the encounter with him.

3. It's a time to fast. With the fasts of Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, meatless Fridays, and our personal disciplines interspersed, Lent is the only time many Catholics these days actually fast. And maybe that's why it gets all the attention. "What are you giving up for Lent? Hot dogs? Beer? Jelly beans?" It's almost a game for some of us, but fasting is actually a form of penance, which helps us turn away from sin and toward Christ.

4. It's a time to work on discipline. The 40 days of Lent are also a good, set time to work on personal discipline in general. Instead of giving something up, it can be doing something positive. "I'm going to exercise more. I'm going to pray more. I'm going to be nicer to my family, friends, and coworkers."

5. It's about dying to yourself. The more serious side of Lenten discipline is that it's about more than self-control—it's about finding aspects of yourself that are less than Christ-like and letting them die. The suffering and death of Christ are foremost on our minds during Lent, and we join in these mysteries by suffering, dying with Christ and being resurrected in a purified form.

6. Don't do too much. It's tempting to make Lent some ambitious period of personal reinvention, but

it's best to keep it simple and focused. There's a reason the Church works on these mysteries year after year. We spend our entire lives growing closer to God. Don't try to cram it all in one Lent. That's a recipe for failure.

7. Lent reminds us of our weakness. Of course, even when we set simple goals for ourselves during Lent, we still have trouble keeping them. When we fast, we realize we're all just one meal away from hunger. In both cases, Lent shows us our weakness. This can be painful, but recognizing how helpless we are makes us seek God's help with renewed urgency and sincerity.

8. Be patient with yourself. When we're confronted with our own weakness during Lent, the temptation is to get angry and frustrated. "What a bad person I am!" But that's the wrong lesson. God is calling us to be patient and to see ourselves as he does, with unconditional love.

9. Reach out in charity. As we experience weakness and suffering during Lent, we should be renewed in our compassion for those who are hungry, suffering, or otherwise in need. The third part of the Lenten formula is almsgiving. It's about more than throwing a few extra dollars in the collection plate; it's about reaching out to others and helping them without question as a way of sharing the experience of God's unconditional love.

10. Learn to love like Christ. Giving of ourselves in the midst of our suffering and self-denial brings us closer to loving like Christ, who suffered and poured himself out unconditionally on the Cross for all of us. Lent is a journey through the desert to the foot of the Cross on Good Friday, as we seek him out, ask his help, join in his suffering, and learn to love like him.

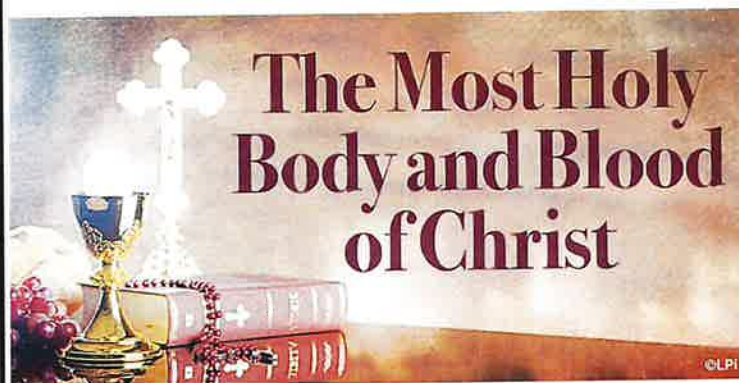

Guidelines for Receiving the Eucharist

You are not to eat or drink anything except for water or required medicine, for one hour before actually receiving communion. This is called the Communion or Eucharist fast. It is meant to help us focus on our Lord and what we are about to receive. Chewing gum, candy, mints, etc. during Mass is therefore inappropriate. Both forms for receiving the host are acceptable, in the palm of one hand with the other hand underneath, or on the extended tongue. Extend your hands palm-side up toward the priest and stand as close to the priest as possible when receiving Communion. Never take the host from the priest. After receiving the Eucharist, you say **Amen**. Proper reverence and respect is most important, hands should be reverently folded while waiting to receive the Sacrament.

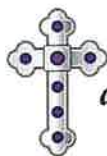

Active Parishioner Status

Even though you attend Mass, if you are not registered with the Parish, we have no information about you and you are not eligible to be Sponsors, God-parents, etc. While assessments of an inquirer's status will be made individually, the above are the main factors that will be considered in making that determination. For a child to be baptized, you must be attending Mass regularly, attend a Baptism class and fill out a registration form. **Classes are held the last Sunday of every month at 1pm and must be completed prior to scheduling baptism date.** One Godparent must be an active Catholic and attend class as well. A copy of the Child's Birth Certificate is needed at time of registration. Please contact the Office for scheduling.

Anointing of the Sick

Even though you attend Mass, if you are not registered with the Parish, we have no information about you and you are not eligible to be Sponsors, Godparents, etc. While assessments of an inquirer's status will be made individually, the above are the main factors that will be considered in making that determination.
