

The Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

Gen 14:18-20 | 1 Cor 11:23-26 | Lk 9:11b-17

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Today's feast is set apart to reverence the gift of Jesus in the Eucharist. In our limited human capacity, this concept can feel abstract, and we may struggle to understand it. In these moments, I find that pondering the person of Jesus Christ in the Gospels illuminates my mind and heart. Hearing the familiar story of the multiplication of the loaves and fishes in today's Gospel, I'm particularly struck by the first line of the passage: "Jesus spoke to the crowds about the kingdom of God, and he healed those who needed to be cured." Notice that Luke doesn't say that Jesus heals everyone, rather, he heals those who need to be cured. This is not an act of favoritism, but a revelation of his perfect divine wisdom and a glimpse into the true person of Jesus Christ. In his great mercy and perfect love, Jesus knew instantly what each person needed. And this Jesus, who came to heal and cure, is the one we receive in the Eucharist today.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Today's feast is a reminder of the staggering truth that 2,000 years later, at every Eucharistic celebration in Catholic churches around the world, Christ becomes truly present. The same Jesus of the Gospels who taught the crowds, multiplied the loaves, and gave himself completely on the cross, gives himself to us today: body, blood, soul, and divinity. We are not unlike the crowds in today's Gospel — we have come with our hopes and needs to encounter Jesus. Today, at this table, no one goes hungry; Jesus meets our needs by giving us his unconditional love while nourishing us both physically and spiritually. We can be reassured that God is always present in our lives.

REFLECT

In a special way today, reflect on the Eucharist, the "source and summit of the Christian life." The word Eucharist comes from Greek and Latin words for "thanksgiving." Pray with a grateful heart today that Jesus, the Bread of Life, makes himself truly present to us.

"I am the bread of life; whoever comes to me shall not hunger, and whoever believes in me shall never thirst." (Jn 6:35)



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Gospel Meditation

Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

A Catholic friend of mine occasionally says, "The Eucharist is not a noun. It's a verb." In so saying, he is making the point that the Eucharist isn't simply Jesus' bodily presence given to us in holy Communion. It also manifests the dynamic pattern by which Christ actively loves and saves us. He teaches us to cooperate with that pattern. This Eucharist actually embodies four verbs: Jesus takes, blesses, breaks, and gives. Let's consider each one.

He **takes:** Do we acknowledge that we are totally in God's hands? Do we receive everything in our lives as a gift, and act responsibly with it?

He **blesses:** Do we actively reflect that Jesus makes us holy in our baptism? Do we embrace our bodies and souls as temples of God, worthy of love, peace, and joy?

He **breaks:** Do we run from failure and disappointment, from getting old or being ignored? Are we too worried about getting hurt or sick? Do we embrace our sufferings with confidence?

He **gives**: Are we willing to make our lives a gift for others? Are we confident that we will always have enough love to give to others, that God will always provide enough for us? Do we rejoice in giving away what we have to others, expecting nothing in return? This is the dynamic life the Eucharist empowers us to live.

Journey of THE SOUL

The Transformative Power of Pilgrimage

HE CONCEPT OF pilgrimage deeply rooted in the Bible. From the very beginning of the Old Testament (Ex 23:14-17; Dt 16:16), and throughout the New Testament

(Lk 2:41-42; Acts 2:5-11), we see the people of Israel journeying to Jerusalem, regularly traveling to the temple. In our faith, the idea of pilgrimage is significant because, as the Church, we are a pilgrim Church. We are on a journey toward the Kingdom of Heaven. Our life in this world is a kind of wandering – it is not the end, but merely a transitional stage on the way to eternal life. So, the concept of pilgrimage is truly beautiful and theologically rich.

Growing up in Poland, I would often see pilgrims passing through my hometown, making their difficult journey to Częstochowa where there is a sanctuary with a miraculous image of the Black Madonna. It was a tradition to go out and watch the pilgrims walk by, sometimes offering them water and supporting them along the way. It was a beautiful witness, especially for those who do not believe, but also for those who believe yet may not be physically

able to undertake such a demanding journey themselves.

My own experience with pilgrimage came after I was grown up, at the age of 32. For me, a pilgrimage represents the beginning of a new life. I embarked on my first pilgrimage in 2016 as a lost and lonely individual, someone who struggled to understand why happiness seemed out of reach and why so many aspects of life felt uncontrollable. Despite having everything seemingly in order on the outside, I was

my soul but feeling unheard. This was my state when I set out on my journey.

A pilgrimage is not only a matter of your physical capacity: A pilgrimage requires self-denial and confrontation with the deepest and most significant weaknesses of one's heart. On the pilgrimage, you reach a point where you feel utterly exhausted, and the only thing that keeps you moving forward is your intention. People embark on their journeys with various intentions, often praying for their vocation, a good spouse, health for themselves and their families, conception, conversions; others pray for priests, the Church, the country. Most embark to draw closer to God and to live the Gospel through their lives. The stronger your motive, the better, because it becomes the source of your strength. Your intention is what enables you to take the next step. Moreover, when you are on a pilgrimage, there is a sense of detachment from the world. While walking, you focus solely on survival, having enough water to drink, food to eat, and finding a good place to pitch your tent. You cling to God and trust entirely in his grace and providence. Without his grace, even the first day would seem impossible. Even though you may be marching with thousands of other people, there is time for personal reflection and contemplative prayer. Moments of silence on the pilgrimage allow you to reach places in your heart that would be inaccessible amidst the noise and distractions of everyday life. It feels as though you leave your ego at home, setting out with a backpack of intentions, dedicating this journey to God, yourself, and others. This is how something as simple as walking can change someone's life profoundly; this is why people have gone on pilgrimages for millennia.

One of the most profound moments I experienced on my pilgrimage was during a meditation on the prophet Ezekiel (36:26-27). In this reflection, God promises, "I

will give you a new heart and put a new spirit in you; I will remove from you your heart of stone and give you a heart of flesh. And I will put my Spirit in you and move you to follow my decrees and be careful to keep my laws." continued on back





This reflection perfectly captured my experience: God transformed my hardened heart into a new one, vibrant with life and filled with love. Upon returning, I was a changed person, and I received the call to the priesthood from him. Reflecting on my life, what hurts me most is my past when, as a young person, I strayed from the Church, believing I could find happiness elsewhere on my journey. I see young

people today searching for fulfillment, love, and happiness everywhere except in the Church and Jesus Christ. This breaks my heart, but pilgrimages bring me hope.

As you walk through Poland towards

Article taken from the June issue of the Southern Cross, the Official Magazine of the Diocese of Savannah. Częstochowa, you pass through villages where people come out of their homes to wave and greet the pilgrims. Many of these people are moved to tears – not just because they cannot join, but because they see young people still walking, still on the path to salvation. It gives them hope that the country is not lost because, as Pope John Paul II often said, young people are the future of the world and the hope of the Church. The path to salvation is arduous, demanding sacrifices and the dedication of our entire selves – body, heart, and strength – to take each step forward, always looking ahead and upward to God.

I dream of the day when, looking toward my future priest-hood and ordination, I can take young people from the United States on this pilgrimage to show them the power and strength of this devotion. The pilgrimage is a symbol of the health of the Catholic Church. It is a rich tradition that should not only be maintained but actively promoted. More and more young people should experience this spiritual transformation, which will impact their future in this world and shape their eternal life.










The feast of Corpus Christi was instituted to focus special attention on the real presence of Christ in the eucharist. In a sense it is a repeat of Holy Thursday's Mass of the Last Supper. The sad memories associated with Holy Week tend to overshadow the Lord's breaking of bread and his farewell promise that he would be with his church all days until the end of time. It is a celebration of the generosity of the Lord to us, in offering himself as food to satisfy our spiritual and material hunger as we journey through life. On this day, the church makes us sit down, stop and consider the great miracle of God's presence among us. We thank the Father for the gift of his only Son as our redeemer and Savior, as our Lord and friend. God has given us everything he could in the life of his Son.

The feast is not only about the eucharist - it is also about the community that assembles to celebrate the eucharist. Hospitality is at the heart of the gospel message. If our hearts are not open and ready to share with those in need in our ordinary life we cannot be united in our celebration. There is no way we can offer the eucharist and not reach out to the poor as Jesus did. It is the daily life that we live during the week that gives us something to bring to the community Mass on Sunday. We cannot take a worldly lifestyle to the altar and celebrate it as Christians. By living lives of service for others, we begin to appreciate what the eucharist is all about. It sends us out to touch the lives of neighbors as the healing presence of a helping hand or a sympathetic voice, changing despair into hope and suspicion into trust.

One cannot be truly present at the eucharist without a desire to change and set out on the road travelled by Christ, trying to live as he did in a caring and sharing way. Every celebration is an invitation to give ourselves as completely as possible to Jesus, and to surrender ourselves to his power of love, which will change us and bring us to eternal life. When we are deeply scarred by sin the eucharist binds up our wounds, restores our strength and pours peace into our troubled souls. The very fact that we celebrate this feast indicates that we are a people of thanksgiving, a community which knows how to praise God for the basic gifts of life, family, friends, food and clothing. Above all we thank God because of what he has done for us in Christ.





The classes are also for those Catholic adults and high schoolers that have not completed their sacraments. The classes begin in September and will be completed by Easter. Religious Education

Saint Stephen the First Martyr Catholic Church provides opportunities for each person to receive the Sacraments and grow in greater communion with our Lord. Classes are available starting with 1st graders and meet Sundays Sept. through May, must attend all sessions to receive sacraments.

Matrimony

Arrangements must be made at least 6 months in advance of the proposed date. Participation in a marriage preparation program is required. Couples contemplating marriage MUST meet with the priest before setting a date.

Baptism

For a child to be baptized, you must be attending Mass regularly, attend a Baptism class and fill out a registration form. Classes are held the last Saturday of every month at 6pm and must be completed prior to scheduling baptism date. One Godparent must be an active Catholic. A copy of the Child's Birth Certificate is needed at time of registration and the child should have a Christian name in their name, if not on the Birth Certificate it will be added to the Baptismal Certificate and should be listed on the registration form. Active Parishioner Status

Each year we receive many requests from parishioners to qualify for weddings, be godparents or sponsors for the Sacrament of Confirmation, Communion and Baptism. An active member is one who is properly registered with the Parish office, regularly gives offertory, attends parish activities when possible and most importantly faithfully attends Mass on Sunday's and Holy days of Obligation. Even though you attend Mass, if you are not registered with the Parish, we have no information about you and you are not eligible to be Sponsors, Godparents, etc. While assessments of an inquirer's status will be made individually, the above are the main factors that will be considered in making that determination.
