

Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul, Apostles

Acts 12:1-11 | 2 Tim 4:6-8, 17-18 | Mt 16:13-19

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Too often, we conceive of our earthly pilgrimage as a convoluted maze we must travel by ourselves. Consequently, many of us either ignore the question altogether or become overwhelmed by how ill-equipped we are for the task. But in today's Gospel, Jesus indicates that confusion was never part of his plan. Responding to Peter's profession of faith, Jesus says, "You are Peter, and upon this rock I will build my Church." From the mouth of Eternal Wisdom comes words which establish a Church on Peter's God-given faith. Already a leader among the disciples, Peter now receives his vocation to be the foundation of unity among the Apostles. Their successors, the bishops, would be recognizable by their union with Peter's successors, the popes. Over time, the Church's understanding of Peter's authority would mature and deepen. From the beginning, however, Peter's role as shepherd meant that navigating the path to heaven was not something we were to do in isolation. We aren't asked to decipher the meaning of the Scriptures ourselves or to untangle centuries of theological speculation in order to follow Jesus. God, who knows we cannot make the journey alone, has given us a visible Church to be our guide.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Jesus established the Church so that we would have a sure and safe means of transit on our earthly pilgrimage. Convinced though we may be of this truth, we nevertheless have to contend with the storms that buffet her from within and without. Yet we can rest in Jesus' assurance to Peter: "the gates of the netherworld shall not prevail against it." The Church has survived for millennia as empires have risen and fallen around her. Even in her darkest hours, Christ has continued to speak through her and, by his sacraments, to touch us intimately with his love.

PRAY

Today's first reading, which takes place when Peter is in prison, contains an interesting detail: "Prayer by the Church was fervently being made to God on [Peter's] behalf." As members of Christ's Church on earth, we are not meant to be passive players. This week, pray for *Peter* — that is, for his successor, the pope — that he may fulfill his lofty and difficult vocation to lead the world to Christ.





Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture


What do you call brothers who are born on the same day? Twins, of course. That is what we celebrate today in the inestimable saints, Peter and Paul. Wait: twins? Yes. The early Church believed that Peter and Paul were martyred in Rome on the same day. Since the day of martyrdom is celebrated as a saints' birth into eternal life, the result is striking: Peter and Paul are twins in God's family, the Church.

Who should care about this? Well, anyone who longs to live in a world marked by love and peace. Remember, the Romans believed that twins, Romulus and Remus, founded their city through an act of fratricide, the former murdering the latter. Sadly, the structures of this fallen world emerge through violence between those who should love each other. But in the Church, a new city has been founded upon this new set of twins, embodying the non-violent power of Jesus' cross and resurrection.

That's why traditional icons represent Peter and Paul in a fraternal and warm embrace. Contrasted with the violence of Rome's founders, it challenges us with a bold claim: do we believe that structures of merciful love are more powerful and lasting than those based on power, violence, and domination? Am I willing to see others in my life as my "twin," with whom I am called to give my life for Christ, or as my rival? Am I committed to living what is embodied in Romulus and Remus, or in Peter and Paul?

Thirteenth Sunday of the Year

The call and the cost of Christian commitment are heavily emphasized in this gospel where the life of discipleship and its qualities are laid out before us. There is nothing about being a follower of Jesus that does not demand effort. As all existing responsibilities have to take second place, discipleship is not something to be entered into casually. On his journey to Jerusalem, Jesus meets three men who are anxious to follow him but who are unfit and unprepared for the challenge involved. The young man bursting with enthusiasm who, with whole-hearted response, vowed to be a follower wherever he would go, must have been surprised to hear Jesus dampen his spirits and warn him off with the caution, that the Son of Man did not have a home to call his own. Jesus is only being fair when he makes it clear in very direct speech what is expected of those who wish to join his group. If we want to accompany him we must know what we are doing and be aware of the harsh realities of life. To follow Jesus to Calvary can be no casual accompaniment of a wandering preacher. The message is harsh but clear - if anything at all stands in our way or takes priority over Jesus in our lives, then we are not free to follow him.

Every day we are faced with a situation similar to these three young volunteers. In the midst of our work, as we are hurrying about our business, we encounter Jesus who beckons us to come and serve. He longs for us to acknowledge his loving presence in silently carrying out his will. It's an on-going challenge requiring practical daily choices which are not always easy to make. Sometimes it may involve a serious conflict of loyalty or it may be a simple call to be friendly or neighborly. Our journeying with Christ began at baptism with the promise to make his way of life our own. Growing in closeness to him is the result of making daily sacrifices, but the grind of monotonous living gets to us all and is evident in our half-hearted responses.

We love the call but we quibble about the cost to our personal freedom. Sunday Mass affords us a wonderful opportunity to deepen and renew the relationship which we have established with Christ as a believing community. It's a time to pray for the grace to follow him whole-heartedly without wavering or reservation. The Lord's call requires an immediate response and is not just something to be fitted in after we have attended to all the important business; like maintaining our status, our popularity and all the other goals we set ourselves. Whatever invitation comes our way, our reply should always be: 'You are my God. It is you who are my portion'.

La llamada y el costo del compromiso cristiano están fuertemente enfatizados en este evangelio donde la vida de discipulado y sus cualidades se presentan ante nosotros. No hay nada en ser un seguidor de Jesús que no exija esfuerzo. Como todas las responsabilidades existentes tienen que ocupar un segundo lugar, el discipulado no es algo en lo que se deba entrar casualmente. En su viaje a Jerusalén, Jesús se encuentra con tres hombres que están ansiosos por seguirlo, pero que no son aptos ni están preparados para el desafío que implica. El joven, rebosante de entusiasmo, que, con una respuesta sincera, juró ser un seguidor dondequiera que fuera, debe haberse sorprendido al oír a Jesús desanimarse y advertirle con la advertencia de que el Hijo del Hombre no tenía un hogar al que llamar suyo. Jesús solo es justo cuando deja claro en un discurso muy directo lo que se espera de aquellos que desean unirse a su grupo. Si queremos acompañarlo debemos saber lo que estamos haciendo y ser conscientes de las duras realidades de la vida. Seguir a Jesús al Calvario no puede ser un acompañamiento casual de un predicador errante. El mensaje es duro pero claro: si algo se interpone en nuestro camino o tiene prioridad sobre Jesús en nuestras vidas, entonces no somos libres de seguirlo.

Todos los días nos enfrentamos a una situación similar a la de estos tres jóvenes voluntarios. En medio de nuestro trabajo, mientras nos apresuramos a nuestros asuntos, nos encontramos con Jesús que nos hace señas para que vayamos y sirvamos. Él anhela que reconozcamos su presencia amorosa para llevar a cabo su voluntad en silencio. Es un desafío continuo que requiere decisiones prácticas diarias que no siempre son fáciles de tomar. A veces puede implicar un grave conflicto de lealtad o puede ser un simple llamado a ser amigable o de buena vecindad. Nuestro camino con Cristo comenzó en el bautismo con la promesa de hacer nuestro su camino de vida. Crecer en cercanía a él es el resultado de hacer sacrificios diarios, pero la rutina de la vida monótona nos afecta a todos y es evidente en nuestras respuestas poco entusiastas.

Nos encanta la llamada, pero nos quejamos del costo para nuestra libertad personal. La Misa dominical nos brinda una maravillosa oportunidad para profundizar y renovar la relación que hemos establecido con Cristo como comunidad creyente. Es un tiempo para orar por la gracia de seguirlo de todo corazón, sin vacilaciones ni reservas. El llamado del Señor requiere una respuesta inmediata y no es solo algo que hay que encajar después de haber atendido todos los asuntos importantes; como mantener nuestro estatus, nuestra popularidad y todos los demás objetivos que nos propongamos. Cualquiera que sea la invitación que se nos presente, nuestra respuesta siempre debe ser: 'Tú eres mi Dios. Eres tú quien es mi porción'.



Religious Education

Saint Stephen the First Martyr Catholic Church provides opportunities for each person to receive the Sacraments and grow in greater communion with our Lord. Classes are available starting with 1st graders and meet Sundays Sept. through May, must attend all sessions to receive sacraments.

Matrimony

Arrangements must be made at least 6 months in advance of the proposed date. Participation in a marriage preparation program is required. Couples contemplating marriage MUST meet with the priest before setting a date.

Baptism

For a child to be baptized, you must be attending Mass regularly, attend a Baptism class and fill out a registration form. Classes are held the last Saturday of every month at 6pm and must be completed prior to scheduling baptism date. One Godparent must be an active Catholic. A copy of the Child's Birth Certificate is needed at time of registration and the child should have a Christian name in their name, if not on the Birth Certificate it will be added to the Baptismal Certificate and should be listed on the registration form. Please contact the Office for scheduling.

Anointing of the Sick

Fr. Estrada is offering Anointing of the Sick Tuesday's during the 12p Mass. If needed at another time please contact the office or Father Estrada directly.
