Over the past few months, the committee has been working with website designers to build a new website for the society. It incorporates the latest in web design,




including a shop where you can purchase books, membership or pay for events by either PayPal or bank card. You will also find our newsletters and programmes.




The Masonic Hall in Chambers Street was opened for the first time as a Heritage day event and they were pleased with the attendance.





Book Shop

Queen Eleanor cycle riders' annual visit

More than 30 cyclists recently travelled the route of the twelve original Eleanor Crosses, erected by King Edward I following the death of his Queen, Eleanor of Castile, in 1290 at Harby in Nottinghamshire. Crosses were originally erected at the overnight stopping places when her body was brought back from Harby to be buried in Westminster Abbey.

At the cyclists' Grantham stop this year they visited the memorial plaque erected in 2015 on the front of Grantham Guildhall, which was designed by Grantham Civic Society Vice Chairman Graham Cook and sculpted by stonemason Derren Rose of local firm Skillington Workshop.

It is known that there was an Eleanor Cross erected in the area of St Peter's Hill but it has long been lost.

The annual ride is organised by St Martin in the Fields church in London to raise sponsorship money to help the homeless and they raised money this year for The Connection, a charity at the heart of London's response to homelessness.

Before heading off to Stamford, Geddington and Northampton, their next stops, the cyclists had a night in the town, including a trip to the Blue Pig pub, and then spent the night sleeping in St Wulfram's church.
