A Few Words From Fr. Dariusz

This coming Monday we will celebrate Labor Day. I would like to wish you and your family members and friends Happy Labor Day. The 1st Labor Day was celebrated on September 5, 1882 in New York City. In the aftermath of the deaths of a number of workers at the hands of the U.S. military and U.S. Marshals during the 1894 Pullman Strike. President Grover Cleveland put reconciliation with Labor as a top political priority.



Fearing further conflict, legislation making Labor Day a national holiday was rushed through Congress unanimously and signed into law a mere six days after the end of the strike. Cleveland was also concerned that aligning an American labor holiday with existing international May Day celebrations would stir up negative emotions linked to the Haymarket Affair. By the 20th century, all U.S. states, the District of Columbia, and the territories have made it a statutory holiday.

Traditionally, Labor Day is celebrated by most Americans as the symbolic end of the Summer.

Reflections on the readings for this weekend.

In the First Reading Moses gives God's commandments to his people. The Israelites are told to pay attention to the statutes and ordinances so they may live, enter, and occupy the Promised Land. As commanded by God, Moses also tells the people that they must not add anything nor take anything from the commandments of God. This was to ensure that the commandments would remain intact generation after generation. Moses also explained to the Israelites that obedience to the commandments of God was mandatory.

The Second Reading reminds us that all good actions that we perform, we do so by the grace of God through the power of the Holy Spirit who dwells within us. God's laws have not changed since the day of creation. As His creation, we are called to obey Him and serve Him in all humility and all righteousness.

In the Gospel Reading, we read how the Pharisees and some of the scribes questioned Jesus as to why His disciples eat without washing their hands. In those days, their traditions demanded that all kinds of rules be followed regarding washing. Jesus responds by quoting the prophet Isaiah. "This people honor me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me; in vain do they worship me, teaching human precepts as doctrines." In other words, it is more important to obey the commandments of God than to hold on to human traditions.

In His teaching to the crowd, Jesus added that there is nothing outside of a person, that if he does it, he is defiled. It is the things that come out that defile. All human actions have their origin in the heart. That is where evil intentions are planted and executed.

Also, I would like to thank the Garden Committee and volunteers for keeping the grounds and gardens beautiful and clean. We have had many very hot days and the task was very hard and demanding to keep everything watered and weeded out.

Healing Mass with Anointing of the sick Saturday September 21st @ 10:00am



THE SACRAMENT OF THE SICK

We know of Jesus' deep compassion for the sick as we read the many healing stories in the Gospel. Jesus commissioned the apostles to continue His ministry and we are told that "they went off, expelled many demons, anointed the sick with oil and worked many cures".

The Church today continues the ministry of Jesus in many ways: in prayers, out-reach to the homebound, care and concern to the ill and their families. The Sacrament of anointing reminds us that God is alive. He cares when we suffer and we can only overcome the tough times together.

This is not a "crisis" Sacrament to be requested once in a lifetime at the hour of death. By the 14th Century, the anointing of the sick had become reduced to a Sacrament to be used only in a time of grave illness. Anointing, therefore, became Extreme Unction, last rites. At the Second Vatican Council, Church leaders recommended a restoration of the Sacrament to its original purpose. In 1972, Pope Paul VI promulgated the revised rite under the title, Pastoral Care of the Sick.

The Sacrament then, should be requested by people for themselves or for loved ones who have a serious illness, who are facing surgery, or who experience the chronic pain and limitations of old age. It is also appropriate for those who suffer from mental or emotional illness. Anointing can be celebrated as often as needed and is a source of healing, peace and acceptance for all who participate.

On September 21st, the parish will celebrate this Sacrament for the community, Mass will be at 10:00am a Reception will follow. NO BRUNCH.

Invited are all who seek the grace of the Sacrament and all who wish to join in to pray with the sick.
